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Abstract

Supplementary Notes

In an attempt to combat recent increases in crashes, injuries, and fatalities, the Transportation Safety Administration of the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) entered into an agreement with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in October 1985, to initiate the Comprehensive Community-Based Traffic Safety Program. The comprehensive program relies on problem identification and program assessment in combining state and local resources to target traffic safety problems.

Two DMV districts, District 2 and District 7, were selected as pilot areas for implementation of the comprehensive program. In June 1986, Phase I, the problem identification phase, was completed. Phase II, the program assessment phase, is designed to identify community resources and address the recommendation made in Phase I, that initial countermeasures should target the program areas of occupant protection, alcohol, selective enforcement, and pedestrian safety. INTRODUCTION

Traffic safety efforts have been quite successful over the years in reducing the death toll on Virginia's roads and highways. The average number of persons killed annually in traffic crashes was down from 1,183 in the latter half of the 1960's to 970 for the first half of the 1980's.(1) Moreover, because there are more vehicles logging more miles today than during the 1960's, the average annual death rate per 100 million vehicle miles of travel has been cut more than 50%, from approximately 5.02 during the latter 1960's to 2.45 during the early 1980's.(1) Clearly many factors are involved in this dramatic reduction in traffic fatalities, but much of the reduction is the result of a comprehensive effort to improve traffic safety through promoting emergency medical services and through promoting safer vehicles, roadways, and drivers.

While the history of traffic safety efforts is impressive, recent trends may signal that increased efforts are needed. From 1982 to 1984, traffic crashes in Virginia rose 9.7% and injuries and fatalities increased 16.2% and 15.1%, respectively.(1) In fact, between 1974 and 1984 annual traffic injuries rose more than 40%, from 48,144 to 69,306.(1)

Unfortunately, these recent increases have occurred at a time when traffic safety dollars, along with monies for many governmentally supported programs, are at a premium. Hence, targeting monies where they will have the greatest potential impact has become of paramount importance.

Currently, highway safety programs are initiated at the local level, which, in theory, gives localities the freedom to match countermeasure programs to local needs. Yet this approach dictates that localities have adequate data and resources available to identify crash problems and judge the impact of countermeasure programs. In fact, adequate data and resources historically have been either lacking or nonexistent. Thus, one failing of the current system is that it is

virtually impossible to determine whether priority traffic safety problems are being addressed in an effective manner, if at all.

In October 1985, the Transportation Safety Administration of the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (TSA/DMV) entered into an agreement with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to initiate the Comprehensive Community-Based Traffic Safety Program (CCBP). The CCBP is designed to combat the shortcomings of the current system by combining state and local resources to identify and locate crash problems in localities and to rank those problems according to the order in which they need to be addressed. Further, the CCBP relies on identifying current countermeasure programs and concerned organizations and individuals, as well as other potential resources, and then building upon the existing local base.

Two DMV districts, District 2 and District 7, were selected as the pilot areas for implementation of the CCBP. In June 1986, the initial problem identification phase of the CCBP was completed by the Virginia Highway and Transportation Research Council for the TSA/DMV using only data available at the state level.(2) In the current phase of the CCBP, local data and community resources are being identified to supplement the initial problem identification findings. Through knowing which programs and organizations are promoting traffic safety, the CCBP can build upon existing networks.

In a time of financial belt tightening, building upon existing resources is attractive in that it should provide a net savings. That is, community resources can be identified more easily and less expensively than they can be developed. In addition, an assessment of these community resources permits monies to be targeted where they might have the greatest potential impact through identifying programs and organizations which have shown an active interest in promoting traffic safety.

The major objectives of the program assessment phase of the CCBP are to supplement the recommendations of Phase I by --

- identifying local resources (e.g., programs, organizations, individuals) in DMV District 2 and District 7 which have the potential to promote traffic safety,
- 2. providing a brief administrative assessment of organizations and programs concerned with promoting traffic safety, and
- identifying local data sources which could help pinpoint high accident locations and other traffic safety problems in urban areas.

METHODOLOGY

The initial step of this phase of the CCBP was to define an optimal set of data which could be used in meeting the objectives of this project and the CCBP. Referring to the needs identified in Phase I of the program, (2) and to guidelines established by the NHTSA, (3) the researcher developed a needs list for this phase of the CCBP. The transportation safety administrator, the transportation safety planner, the transportation program evaluation manager, and the DMV district managers and transportation safety field coordinators from the two pilot districts reviewed the list, collectively met with the researcher, and agreed upon the needs list contained in Appendix A. Further, it was decided that rather than develop and administer a questionnaire, telephone and in-person interviews should be used to supplement specific mailed requests in acquiring information. Key individuals from whom information would be requested would also be recruited to support the program during the initial contact. Hence, because of the critical dual role of the initial communication, it was decided that no effort should be made to acquire information from within the localities until after the state coordinator and catalyst positions of the CCBP had been filled. Thus, the data used in this report were acquired solely from statewide representatives of agencies and programs of interest, published sources, and the transportation safety field coordinators.

Because identifying local community resources is a primary concern of this study, one of the more important outcomes of this research would be an inventory of organizations, programs, and key individuals interested in promoting traffic safety. Appendix B and Appendix C display the program assessment resource inventories for District 2 and District 7, respectively. The resource inventories are subdivided into the different target areas in which each organization has an interest.

Because location-specific crash data for urban areas are available only at the local level, if at all, and because no local contacts have yet been made, high accident locations in urban areas are not identified in this report. After the CCBP state coordinator and catalysts begin work, attempts will be made to identify urban crash data and high accident locations.

INTERIM FINDINGS

The initial interviews, data requests, and data searches have concentrated on the areas of occupant protection, alcohol, selective enforcement, and pedestrian safety, which were targeted in Phase I.(2) Preliminary data indicate that occupant protection has received much attention in each of the two pilot districts. Hospitals, especially, are involved in programs making child safety seats available on loan. A recent report by the Virginia Commonwealth University Transportation

Safety Training Center identified 9 hospitals in District 2 and 8 in District 7 as having such a program. (4) Further, both districts have had some occupant protection activity involving public information and education.

Many alcohol countermeasures are ongoing and effective throughout these districts, and throughout the Commonwealth. Each locality is covered under an Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP), which represents one of the more comprehensive alcohol countermeasure efforts in the nation. In addition, both districts have community groups which promote activities aimed at reducing the incidence of drinking and driving.

Several communities within the pilot districts have received Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) grants in recent years. Since FY 1982, speed STEP grants have been awarded to Franklin County, Lynchburg, Roanoke County, and the towns of Rocky Mount and Vinton in District 2, and to Chesapeake, Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Virginia Beach in District 7. However, three successive years of speed STEP evaluations, for fiscal years 1982, 1983, and 1984, indicated that many projects failed to concentrate enforcement efforts on sites, days, and times which presented an identifiable crash problem. (5,6,7) Thus, while some localities may be familiar with selective enforcement projects, work may be needed to convince enforcement officials to target specific high accident locations, days, and times.

In both districts, the American Automobile Association (AAA) is heavily involved in promoting pedestrian safety. Because, nationwide, most pedestrian deaths occur in urban areas, the AAA has chosen to concentrate its efforts in pedestrian safety in urban areas only. Much of the pedestrian safety effort involves providing public information and education, particularly through the schools.

Other than the four aforementioned areas of emphasis, Phase I recommended that the CCBP work through citizen advisory committees and work toward establishing a traffic safety hot line accessible in each district. Though both districts are served by active local transportation safety commissions, citizen advisory committees should help in focusing the activities of the comprehensive program. Also, while the CCBP staff should try to establish and foster a close relationship with the media, it may be possible for a traffic safety hot line to be linked with the current help line operated by the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation (VDH&T). Because the VDH&T help line has only recently been created, a mutually beneficial arrangement may be possible if the CCBP staff is willing, and able, to address traffic safety questions and concerns. However, it is the opinion of the author that establishing hot lines in cooperation with the press would be the more beneficial strategy for the comprehensive program. That is, a hot line operated in cooperation with the press would provide a considerable amount of public exposure for the program,

as well as for traffic safety in general, which would not be provided through the VDH&T help line.

FUTURE OBJECTIVES

Between the writing of this interim report and the presentation of the final report, the researcher will --

- 1. contact local programs and organizations on behalf of the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{CCBP}}$,
- 2. investigate and assess the activities of identified programs and organizations actively promoting traffic safety, and
- 3. locate urban crash data and identify urban high accident locations.
