




Population Growth and Urbanization in Texas, 1850 - 2010


Change in Urban/Rural Population in Texas, 1900-2010







Population Density of Selected Counties, 2010 and Projected to 2050








Population Change in United States Counties April 1, 2010 - July 1, 2014





Median Age in the United States and Texas, 1900-2010




Texas Crude Birth and Crude Death Rates, 1942 - 2010


Youth, Old-Age, and Total Dependency Ratios for Texas, 2000-2050








Percentage Change in Licensed Drivers in Texas by Age, 1990-2010





NH White and Hispanic Populations as a Percent of the Total Population in 2000, 2010, and Projected in 2050





Median Household Income, Family Income, and Per Capita Income by Race/Ethnicity for Texas, 2010




Mean Household Income in 2010 and Projected for 2050 Under Alternative Assumptions of Socioeconomic Closure Between Minority and NonHispanic White Households




Numeric Change in Population (in Thousands) by Race/Ethnicity for Texas, 2000-2010








Counties Classified by Population Change in the Anglo (non-Hispanic White) Population, 2000-2010




Counties Classified by Population Change in the Hispanic Population, 2000-2010









Counties Classified by Population Change in the Non-Hispanic White Population, 2000-2010




Counties Classified by Population Change in the Hispanic Population, 2000-2010




Counties Classified by Population Change in the Non-Hispanic Black Population, 2000-2010



Counties Classified by Population Change in the Non-Hispanic Asian Population, 2000-2010




NonHispanic White Population as a Percent of the Total Population in Selected Metropolitan Statistical Areas in Texas in 2000 and 2010




Hispanic Population Aged 18 and Older in Texas by Origin and Citizenship Status



Foreign Born as a Percent of the Total Population, 2006-2010







Estimates of the Unauthorized Immigrant Population in the United States, 2000-2012





Estimates of the Unauthorized Immigrant Population in Texas, 2000-2012





Children Ever Born by Race/Ethnicity Among Women Ages 40 to 44, 2008




Texas Age Distribution by Race/Ethnicity and Sex






Percent of Texas Population by Age Group and Ethnicity, 2000



Percent of Texas Population by Age Group and Ethnicity, 2010




Percent of Texas Population by Age Group and Ethnicity, 2050
