Building a Robust National Transportation Knowledge Network: Current Services and Next Steps



Abstract

The National Transportation Knowledge Network (NTKN) is a voluntary alliance of transportation organizations, which supports a network of transportation information professionals, who collaborate to expand, improve access to, and preserve the domain of transportation knowledge. The purpose of NTKN is to coordinate with transportation research centers, transportation libraries, information providers, and technical assistance centers to develop a comprehensive transportation information and knowledge network that supports the activities of its members.

Beginning in 2016, the NTKN began a strategic planning process to build a more robust knowledge network. Over 2017 and 2018, the NTKN has built up its infrastructure, hired its first dedicated staff member, and revitalized its web presence.

This poster will review the current state of the NTKN and discuss next steps to guide NTKN on its mission to "lead, support, and guide the nation's transportation knowledge networks in their efforts to organize, share, and preserve transportation information, data, and knowledge for their stakeholders in the transportation community."

A Brief History of TKNs

NTKN grew out of a need to coordinate the efforts of the Midwest, Eastern, and Western Transportation Knowledge Networks. In 2001, the National Transportation Library (NTL) provided funding for the establishment of the Midwest Transportation Knowledge Network. The Eastern and Western regional TKNs were formed in 2007. The first formal meeting of the National TKN was held at US DOT in 2009. By 2013 NTKN was fully established.

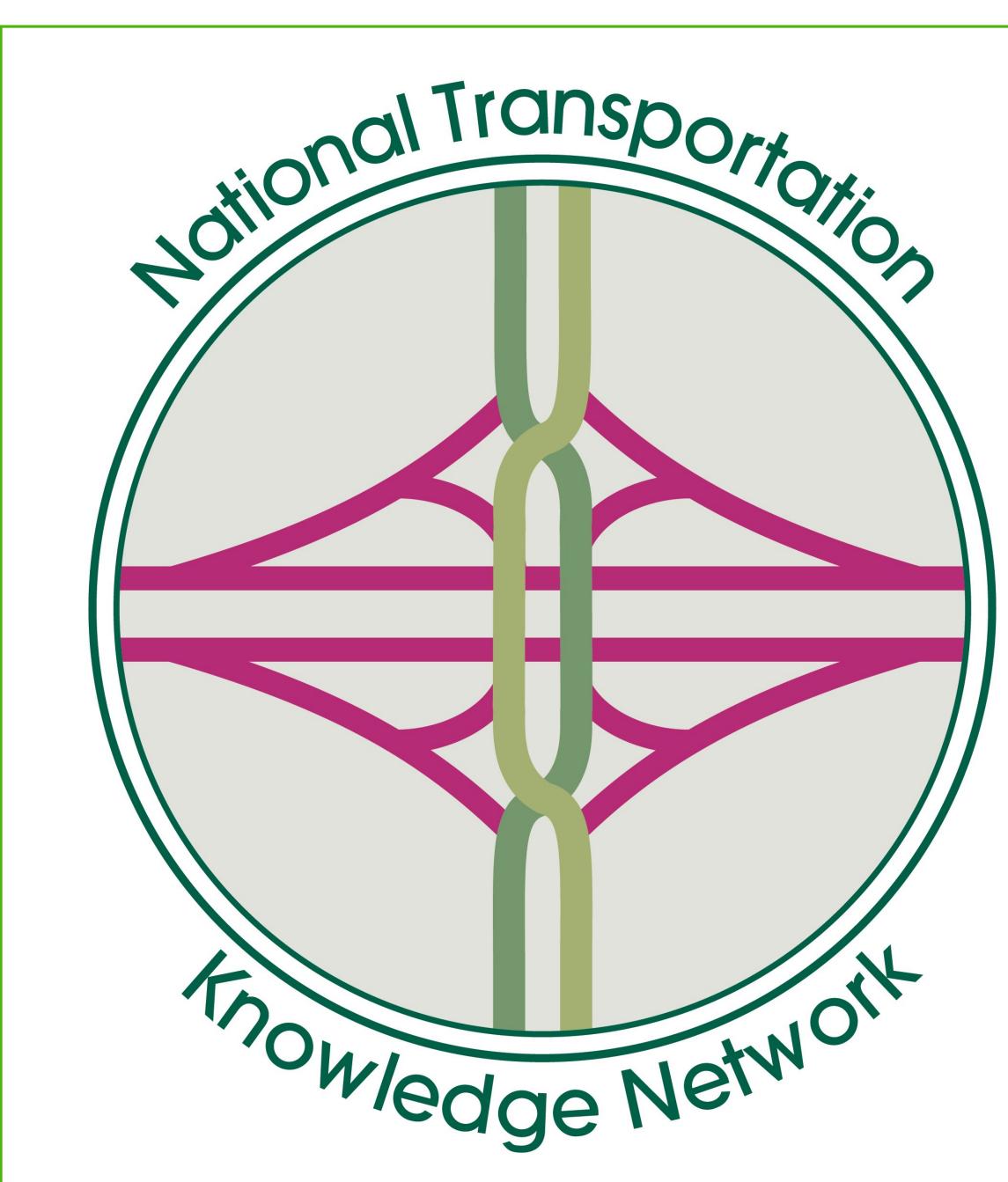

NTKN Mission & Purpose



The National Transportation Knowledge Network (NTKN) leads, supports, and guides the nation's transportation knowledge networks in their efforts to organize, share, and preserve transportation information, data, and knowledge.

The purpose of NTKN is to coordinate with transportation libraries, information providers, and transportation researchers to develop a comprehensive transportation knowledge network. NTKN tools, products, and activities provide stakeholders with access to knowledge assets, enabling faster progress toward meeting critical transportation challenges.

NTKN works to improve peer-to-peer information sharing about successful practices; provide more efficient access to information resources, and enable more efficient research by making it easier to build upon and reuse existing work.

NTKN operates as a collaborative alliance

with most of its organizational work accomplished by partners, committees, and task forces. Its coordinating committee comprises representatives from:

- ♦ Three regional Transportation Knowledge Networks
- ◆ American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials Research Advisory Committee Coordination and Collaboration Task Force Transportation Knowledge Network Working Group (AASHTO RAC CCTF TKN)
- ◆ Transportation Research Board (TRB) Information Services;
- ◆ AASHTO Information Services;
- ◆ Special Libraries Association Transportation Division (SLA DTRN)
- ◆ TRB Library and Information Science for Transportation Committee (LIST) ABG40
- ♦ National Transportation Library (NTL)

The coordinating committee's defined role is to provide oversight and development of an information-management agenda for transportation, coordinate activities between regional TKNs and partner groups, conduct planning and needs assessments with the user and stakeholder community, and communicate and engage in outreach activities.

Partnerships & Alliances

The work of organizing, cataloging, storing, and disseminating knowledge assets can occur only by the interdependent efforts of professionals in a variety of disciplines: librarians; researchers; knowledge, data, records, and research managers; authors; publishers; web and applications developers; and policy makers. Therefore, maintaining alliances and encouraging cooperation among the following entities is crucial to NTKN's sustainability:

- ♦ State Departments of Transportation (DOTs)
- ◆ Transportation libraries
- ♦ Academic libraries
- ◆American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO)
- ◆Transportation Research Board (TRB)
- ◆ Corporate partners

Services to the Transportation Community

Cooperative Digitization: NTKN seeks to eliminate duplication in the process of providing electronic access to assets by sharing digitization efforts.

Search & Retrieval Optimization:

Professional librarians apply vital metadata and indexing terms to ensure that knowledge assets can be more readily discovered.

Literature Searches: Transportation librarians are skilled at identifying and utilizing transportation information sources and compiling searches.

Information Management: NTKN members enhance the robustness of the transportation-information infrastructure by ensuring that once documents are released, they are housed and properly cataloged in print and electronic repositories.

Skills Improvement: Creating, or simply providing access to, resources that members can use to keep their skills sharp is a top priority.

Education: NTKN also works to provide the broader transportation community with opportunities to learn best practices in knowledge creation, management, and dissemination.

Preservation of Historic Record: One of the best ways to minimize duplication of costs and effort is to make sure that access to knowledge of past work is preserved.

Resource Guides: The NTKN website is home to a number of resource guides that provide access to the most up-to-date resources on various topics relevant to transportation researchers and the public. https://transportation.libguides.com/ntkn

Member Activities

Coordination

The NTKN coordinating committee meets monthly to discuss relevant issues and matters of governance. NTKN and NTL representatives attend the regular meetings of each of the regional TKNs. Most meetings are held virtually.

Communications

NTKN maintains a blog on the NTKN website, which reports on matters of interest to the transportation-knowledge community.

Professional Development

NTKN presents webinars, including occasional Transportation Librarian Roundtable presentations, that are of general interest to the transportation community and for the professional development of NTKN members.

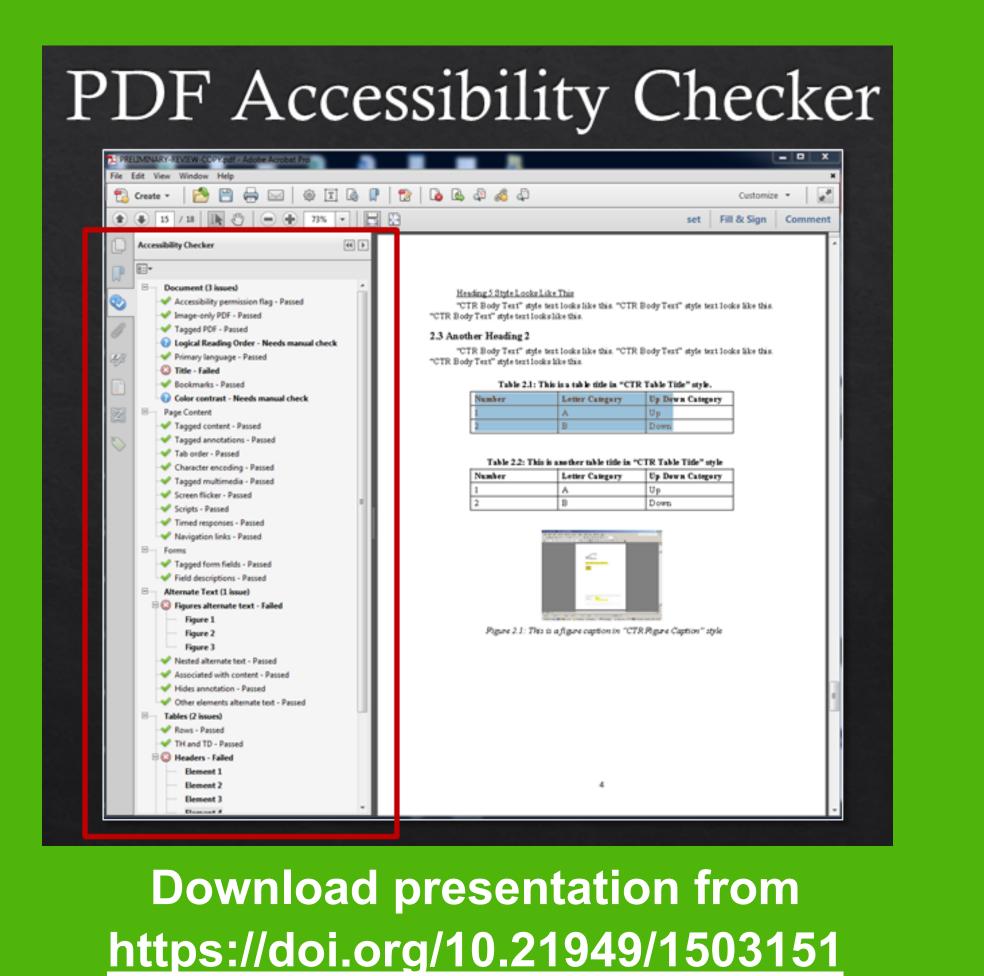
Knowledge and Information Sharing

Networking

Interpersonal networking is the prime driver of NTKN's success. Even though our networking is increasingly virtual, people supporting, cooperating with, and making connections among each other is the critical factor.

Activity Spotlight: Accessibility for Document Creators and Providers

The NTKN cosponsored the October 25 Transportation Librarians Roundtable entitled "Accessibility for Document Creators and Providers." This special TLR was scheduled to address the communities' need to conform to more inclusive Section 508c document accessibility requirements that went in to effect in early 2018.



NTKN's Challenges

♦ Volunteer Organization

With the exception of a paid, part-time secretariat, NTKN is made up entirely of volunteers, who do the important and challenging work of building a state-of-the-art knowledge network in addition to the tasks and demands of their full-time employment.

♦ Budget

And, although NCHRP Report 643 proposed a budget of \$13.5 million annually for five years to fully and successfully implement TKN and the regional TKNs. However, current annual funding is less than \$60,000.

♦ Shrinking Membership

Another critical challenge is the fact that transportation libraries – the past and current backbone of transportation knowledge networking – have been closing at a rate troublesome to the entire transportation knowledge community. This loss of professionals in our community makes it more important than ever that a strategic recruitment campaign be initiated to sustain and grow NTKN membership.

Next Steps

Communications and Outreach: NTKN is in the process of finalizing a communications plan that will guide NTKN leadership in telling NTKN's story and reaching out in service to not only the research community, but all who are affected by the many challenges of solving transportation's most pressing problems. Refining our message through the NTKN communications plan will be a key step in developing a strategy for expanding NTKN membership.

Digitization: One of the most high-value services that NTKN can render within the next year is to expand access to digital materials and reduce duplicative digitization work through its cooperative digitization project.

Education: We will seek out experts in the field who will help us to develop educational programs leading to a stronger understanding of best practices in building, enhancing, and expanding knowledge networks.

Next Steps Spotlight: Transportation Expert Locator

In 2017, the NTKN Strategic Plan set a Community Engagement Objective for the organization to: "Serve as a comprehensive clearinghouse for expertise in transportation information and data." In fulfillment of the objective, the NTKN is working to create a transportation expert locator.
