## **Announcements**

### Final Rule on Metropolitan Planning Organization Coordination and Planning Area Reform

On December 20, 2016, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) jointly published a <u>final rule</u> which revises the transportation planning regulations to promote more effective regional planning by States and metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs). The goal of the revisions is to better align the planning regulations with statutory provisions concerning the establishment of metropolitan planning area boundaries and the designation of MPOs.

#### Bicycle-Pedestrian Count Technology Pilot Project Report Released

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) recently released a new summary report on its "Bicycle-Pedestrian Count Technology Pilot Project." The purpose of the pilot project was to increase the organizational and technical capacity of metropolitan planning organizations to establish and operate effective bicycle and pedestrian count programs, and to provide lessons learned for peer agencies across the Country.



#### Environmental Justice Fact Sheets on Tolling, and Connected and Automated Vehicles

#### **EPA Seeks Public Comments on Candidates for Science Advisory Committee on Chemicals**

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recently announced a search for candidates for its Science Advisory Committee on Chemicals, which will provide independent scientific advice and recommendations to the EPA on the scientific basis for risk assessments, methodologies, and pollution prevention measures and approaches for chemicals regulated under the Toxic Substances Control Act. Twenty-nine candidates have been identified for consideration. EPA is now soliciting public comments on those candidates. Public comments will be accepted through <u>public docket number EPA-HQ-OPPT-2016-0713</u> until January 8, 2017.

#### **Every Place Counts Design Challenge Final Report Released**

In December 2016, U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx announced the release of the <u>"Every Place Counts Design Challenge Summary Report."</u> The report summarizes the experiences and lessons learned from the four selected cities – Spokane, WA; Nashville, TN; Philadelphia, PA; and Minneapolis/St. Paul, MN – that participated in the Every Place Counts Design Challenge.

## **Secretary Foxx Announces "Ladders of Opportunity" Progress Report**

U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx announced the release of the "Ladders of Opportunity, Transportation Empowerment Pilot, LadderSTEP, 2015-2016 Report," which highlights the progress of seven cities that are attempting to achieve upward mobility through transportation decisions in their communities. The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) launched the "LadderSTEP" program in 2015 to foster sustainable economic development related to planned transportation projects in seven cities: Atlanta, GA; Baltimore, MD; Baton Rouge, LA; Charlotte, NC; Indianapolis, IN; Phoenix, AZ; and Richmond, VA.

### 'MPO Guidebook for Using Safety as a Project Prioritization Factor'

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) recently published a new resource titled "MPO Guidebook for Using Safety as a Project Prioritization Factor." The purpose of the guidebook is to identify the state of the practice of metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) using safety as a project prioritization criterion, and to identify potential methods for using safety as a factor in project prioritization. The project included a literature review, interviews with MPOs, and definitions of recommended approaches.

#### Smart Growth America Expands Complete Streets Consortium Series Eligibility

In Fall 2016, Smart Growth America launched the <u>Complete Streets Consortium Series</u>, a technical assistance opportunity for three communities from the same State to work together to implement Complete Streets that are safe and accessible for people of all ages and abilities. In response to feedback, Smart Growth America has expanded the eligibility requirements for this assistance. The Consortium Series is now open to any three units or subdivisions of local government, Indian tribe, or regional government. The deadline to submit applications is February 2, 2017.
