Secretary Foxx's Mayor's Challenge Approaching 100 Cities

In January, Transportation Secretary Foxx announced the *Mayor's Challenge for Safer People and Safer Streets*. Since announcing the initiative, <u>86 cities have joined</u> the Challenge to improve bicycle and pedestrian safety. There is still time to sign up, the Challenge officially begins March 12.

Environmental Justice 2014 Implementation Report

This report highlights the U.S. DOT's activities and accomplishments related to Environmental Justice throughout 2014. In 2014 the U.S. DOT, and each of its modal agencies, focused its efforts on Ladders of Opportunity to create economic growth and increase development in underserved communities as well as addressing climate change challenges.

The *U.S. Environmental Protection Agency* (EPA) re-opened a <u>request for nominations</u> to the National Environmental Justice Advisory Council. The EPA is seeking a diverse range of qualified candidates who can provided advice on a broad range of multi-disciplinary issues related to environmental justice. There are eight vacancies for terms through September 2017. Nominations are due March 6, 2015.

Obama Administration Launches "Every Kid in a Park" Initiative

Every fourth grade student and their families will receive free admission to all National Parks and other Federal lands for a full year, starting with the 2015-2016 school year.

USDA Request for Applications for Community Food Projects Program

The *U.S. Department of Agriculture* (USDA) announced the availability of \$9 million to support the <u>Community Food Projects</u> program. This program assists with the food needs of low-income populations and seeks to increase the food self-reliance of low-income communities through funding for infrastructure improvements and developments. Grant applications are due March 17, 2015.

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) has a new website devoted to livable communities. As part of the AARP's mission to improve the quality of life for older adults, the website provides resources for users on livable community issues; such as: land use, housing, and transportation.

Coordination between State Transportation Agencies in Multi-State Metropolitan Planning Areas: A Survey of State Practice

The Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) released a report examining how other States address multi-State metropolitan planning organization (MPO) oversight. With Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century's (MAP-21) emphasis on performance-based planning, there is a need for $\underline{greater\ coordination\ with\ MPOs}$, particularly if its jurisdiction covers more than one State.
