Bicycle/Pedestrian



FHWA Announces the Development of a Transportation Alternatives Program Performance Management Guidebook

To align with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) national performance goals, *FHWA* expects to release a guidebook in the summer of 2015 on "<u>Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Performance Management.</u>" Right now, interested individuals can review the Literature Review Summary and Literature Review Matrix.

Impact of the Safe Routes to School Program on Walking and Bicycling

A new study, "<u>The Impact of the Safe Routes to School Program on Walking and Bicycling</u>," published in the Journal of the American Planning Association examined data from 801 school districts between 2007 and 2012. The comprehensive study found that the program increased walking and bicycling to and from school.

The Demographics of Bicycling in Memphis

Memphis was identified as the 14th fastest growing city for bicycle commuting in the U.S. The *Urban Studies Journal* published an article last week, "Behind a Bicycling Boom: Governance, Cultural Chance, and Place Character in Memphis," that examined the contributing factors of bicycling growth in the city. Additionally, the study looks at potential impacts and benefits the community may experience as this trend continues.



Request for Proposals: Economic and Social Equity Projects

PolicyLink and The Leadership Conference Education Fund, co-chairs of the <u>Transportation Equity Caucus</u>, are seeking transportation project proposals that advance economic and social equity. Applicants may be awarded up to \$25,000 and must attend a 1-day conference in Washington, DC. The <u>Request for Proposals</u> provides more information. Applications are due November 21, 2014.

Health Economic Assessment Tool for Cycling and Walking

The <u>Health Economic Assessment Tool (HEAT)</u> for cycling and walking is an online resource developed by the *World Heath Organization* was recently updated. HEAT allows active transportation experts to calculate the value of reduced mortality rates from regular walking and cycling. This tool can be used when planning new walking and bicycling infrastructure, assessing current and past investments, and completing comprehensive cost-benefit analyses.

FTA Recognizes Five Outstanding Rural Transit Agencies

As part of the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) annual Administrator's Awards for Outstanding Public Transportation Service in Rural Public Transportation, Acting Administrator Therese McMillan recognized five rural transit agencies. North Central Regional Transit District; Streamline Transportation; Crawford Area Transportation Authority; JAUNT, Inc.; and Roaring Fork Transit Authority were each recognized for their outstanding work in enhancing mobility and access for rural residents.

FTA Awards \$3.6 Billion in Grants to Help Sandy-Struck Agencies

The <u>FTA awarded \$3.6 billion</u> in grants to help areas struck by Hurricane Sandy with resilience projects. Nine applicants, covering 40 storm-resilience mitigation projects, were selected out of 10 applicants and 61 projects.
