Albert, William, *The Turnpike Road System in England 1663-1840*, Cambridge University Press, 2006.

Algeo, Matthew, *Harry Truman's Excellent Adventure: The True Story of a Great American Road Trip*, Chicago Review Press, 2009. (In June 1953, former President Truman, a man who loved cars and roads, embarked on his last great road trip - this is the story of that trip.)

Altshuler, Alan, and Luberoff, David, *Mega-Projects: The Changing Politics of Urban Public Investment*, Brookings Institution Press and Lincoln Institute of Land Policy, 2003. (A history of public investment in major urban projects, including the Central Artery/Tunnel Project in Boston, with emphasis on the consequences and the future of mega-projects.)

America's Highways 1776-1976, Federal Highway Administration, 1976. (Over 500 pages of history prepared as the FHWA's contribution to the Bicentennial. Out of print but available in libraries or through inter-library loan)

Angell, Roger, "Romance," *The New Yorker*, May 26, 2003. (The great sports writer's evocative memoir of childhood car trips in the 1930's. The blurb: "Car Trips in the nineteen-thirties took you to some unexpected places.")

Ascher, Kate, *The Works: Anatomy of a City*, Penguin Books, 2005. (The book combines text, maps, and graphics to describe how New York City functions. The first section, "Moving People," discusses streets, subways, bridges, and tunnels in New York City (pages 2-55), while the second section, "Moving Freight," covers rail freight, maritime freight, air cargo, and markets (pages 58-89).)

Avila, Eric, *The Folklore of the Freeway: Race and Revolt in the Modernist City*, A Quadrant Book, University of Minnesota Press, 2014. (Discusses the damage construction of the urban Interstates caused as well as the creative strategies devised by communities to fight them.)

Bain, David Haward, *The Old Iron Road: An Epic of Rails, Roads, and the Urge to Go West*, Viking, 2004. (Historian Bain and his family trace the great western roads-the pioneer overland trails, the transcontinental railroad, and the great western highways of the 20th century, including the Lincoln Highway and I-80. Invoking the literary tradition of William Least Heat-Moon and Ian Frazier, the book jacket refers to the Bain family's trip as "a quintessentially American journey.")

Ballon, Hilary, and Jackson, Kenneth T., *Robert Moses and the Modern City: The Transformation of New York*, W. W. Norton and Company, 2007. This book, which accompanies exhibitions at the Queens Museum of Art and the Miriam

and Ira D. Wallach Art Gallery at Columbia University, examines the works and impact of Robert Moses, one of the greatest builders of roads, bridges, and other public works in history, on New York City. It's the first major examination- in some ways a reexamination-of the works of Robert Moses since Robert Caro's 1974 biography, *The Power Broker* (see separate entry).

Barker, Theo, and Gerhold, Dorian, *The Rise and Rise of Road Transportation, 1700-1990*, Cambridge University Press, 1993. (A survey of road transportation in Britain over the past 3 centuries.)

Bay, Mia *Traveling Black: A Story of Race and Resistance*, The Belknap Press of Harvard University Press, 2021. (With chapters on Plessy v. Ferguson and travel by train, car, bus, and plane, the book tells the story of why the journey to racial equality often takes place on the road.)

Beckett, Derrick, *Bridges*, Paul Hamlyn, 1969. (Part of the Great Buildings of the World, this book focuses on British bridges.)

Belasco, Warren James, *Americans on the Road: From Autocamp to Motel, 1910-1945*, The MIT Press, 1981. (Classic work on the subject.)

Borgeson, Griffith, "Forerunner of the Freeway: The California Cycleway," *Automobile Quarterly*, Second Quarter 1983. (Amidst the Bicycle Craze of the 1890's, Pasadena became the home of the 2-mile Cycleway reserved for bicyclists.)

Borth, Christy, *Mankind on the Move: The Story of Highways*, Automotive Safety Foundation, 1969.

Brodsly, David, *L. A. Freeway, An Appreciative Essay*, University of California Press, 1981.

Bromley, Michael L., *William Howard Taft and the First Motoring Presidency*, McFarland and Company, Inc., 2003. (From the back cover: "particularly (but not exclusively) on his relationship to the automobile and the role of the automobile in the turbulent politics of his day.")

Brouws, Jeffery T., Polster, Bernd, and Patton, Phil, *Highway: America's Endless Dream*, Stewart Tabori, and Chang, 1997. (Essays on the history of highways and their cultural impact, accompanied by photographs by Jeff Brouws.)

Bruce, Leonard C., *On The Move: A Chronology of Advances in Transportation*, Gale Research, Inc., 1993. (The chronology begins circa 30,000 B.C., when "Aborigines are believed to have reached Australia aboard some sort of seagoing craft." It ends on December 19, 1991, with agreement among local jurisdiction on completion of the last 13.5 miles of the Washington area's Metro rail system.)

Bryan, Mike, *Uneasy Rider: The Interstate Way of Knowledge*, Alfred A Knopf, 1997. (Noting that the U.S. numbered "blue" highways are a vision of the past, Bryan takes off on a "Blue Highways" type journey along the Interstate routes of the Southwest.)

Bryson, Bill, *The Lost Continent: Travels in Small-Town America*, Harper and Row, 1989.

Buck, Rinker, *The Oregon Trail: A New American Journey*, Simon and Schuster, 2015. (The author traveled the trail in a covered wagon and wrote this book about his experiences, a mix of memoir and history.)

Burns, John M., *Thunder at Sunrise: A History of the Vanderbilt Cup, the Grand Prize, and the Indianapolis 500, 1904-1916*, McFarland and Company, 2006. (Early auto racing, such as the Vanderbilt Cup, was a spur to the Good Roads Movement.)

Butler, John L., *First Highways of America: A Pictorial History of American Roads and Highways from 1900-1925*, Krause Publications (700 East State Street, Iola, Wisconsin 54990-0001), 1994.

Cantor, George, *Where the Old Roads Go: Driving the First Federal Highways*, Harper and Row, 1990 (Northeast) and Southwest (1992). (Mini-tours, similar to those in the American Guide Series (see below), along many of each region's U.S. highways.)

Cantor, George, *Old Roads of the Midwest*, The University of Michigan Press, 1997. (Continuation of Cantor's *Where the Old Roads Go* series).

Caputo, Philip, *The Longest Road: Overland in Search of America, from Key West to the Arctic Ocean*, Henry Holt and Company, 2013. (Caputo and his wife Leslie drive from Key West, Florida to the Deadhorse oil fields of Prudhoe Bay, Alaska, over 8,300 miles, mainly off the Interstates, with an Airstream in tow. The narratives of driving the Alaska Highway and Dalton Trail are especially interesting.)

Caro, Robert A., *The Power Broker: Robert Moses and the Fall of New York*, Knopf, 1974. (Highly critical biography of one of the most powerful road, bridge, and parkway builders of the 20th century.)

Cigliano, Jan, and Landau, Sarah Bradford, editors, *The Grand American Avenue 1850-1920*, Pomegranite Artbooks, 1994. (Collection of articles about the evolution of Fifth Avenue, Woodward Avenue, and 10 other grand avenues.)

Cima, Bill, *Rest Area Guide: To the United States and Canada*, College Publications, 5th Edition, May 1997

Cohan, Steven and Hark, Ina Rae, editors, *The Road Movie Book*, Routledge, 1997. (A study of the road in movies.)

Conover, Ted, *The Routes of Man: How Roads are Changing the World and the Way We Live Today*, Alfred A. Knopf, 2010. (Conover travels roads in Peru, India, Kenya, the West Bank, China, and Nigeria. *The New York Times* says, "His modesty and compassion make "The Routes of Man" less a series of travel adventures than an empathetic look at the contradictory effects of modernity.")

Coster, Graham, *A Thousand Miles from Nowhere: Trucking Two Continents*, North Point Press, Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 1995). (In which the author accompanies an English trucker from England to Russia and an America trucker across the United States.)

Creighton, Jeff, *Bridges of Spokane*, Images of America, Arcadia Publishing, 2013. (Photographic collection in the Images format depicting the "City of Bridges.")

Cribb, John, *A Field Guide to Interstate 95*, Madison Books, 1989. ("The Traveler's Companion to the History, Geography & Trivia that Lie Beneath the Nation's Busiest Highway.")

Crosse, Jesse, *The Greatest Movie Car Chases of All Time*, Motorbooks, 2006. (Discusses the craft behind great movie chases and includes the author's Top 20.)

Cruikshank, Dan, *Bridges: Heroic Designs That Changed the World*, HarperCollins, 2010

Davidson, Janet F., and Sweeney, Michael S., *On The Move: Transportation and the American Story*, National Geographic, 2003. (Extensive, well-illustrated companion to "America on the Move," the permanent exhibition that opened at the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of American History on November 22, 2003.)

Davies, Pete, *American Road: The Story of an Epic Transcontinental Journey at the Dawn of the Motor Age*, Henry Holt and Company, 2002. (The story of the 1919 convoy on which Dwight D. Eisenhower learned the value of good roads.)

DeYoung, Bill, *Skyway: The True Story of Tampa Bay's Signature Bridge and the Man Brought it Down*, University Press of Florida, 2013. (The story of construction of the original Sunshine Skyway bridge, its collapse after being struck by the Summit Venture freighter, and the aftermath.)

Dillon, Richard (Text), and DeNevi, Don and Moulin, Thomas (Photo Editors), *High Steel: Building the Bridges Across San Francisco Bay*. Celestial Arts, 1979.

DiMento, Joseph F.C., and Ellis, Cliff, *Changing Lanes: Visions and Histories of Urban Freeways*, The MIT Press, 2013. (The book, according to the book jacket, describes "the evolution of the urban freeway in the United States, from its rural parkway precursors through the construction of the interstate highway system to emerging alternatives for more sustainable urban transportation.")

Dreiser, Theodore, *A Hoosier Holiday*, Indiana University Press, 1997. (This is a reprint of the novelist's 1916 book about his 2,000-mile, 2-week automobile trip from New York to his home town of Terre Haute, Indiana.)

Duncan, Dayton, and Burns, Ken, *Horatio's Drive: America's First Road Trip*, Alfred A. Knopf, 2003. (Companion to a Ken Burns PBS documentary, this book chronicles the adventures of Horatio Nelson Jackson and Sewall Crocker in 1903 as they became the first to travel cross country, San Francisco to New York, by automobile.)

Duncan, Dayton, *Out West: An American Journey*, Viking, 1987. (Following the trail of Lewis and Clark, the road and the history of the Corps of Discovery, told in an interesting way.)

Dunn, James A., Jr., *Driving Forces: The Automobile, Its Enemies, and the Politics of Mobility*, Brookings Institution Press, 1998. (Automobiles, highways, sprawl--it's all here in a challenge to the politically correct viewpoint.)

eXitSource: A Complete Directory of Services, Businesses & Attractions Within a Quarter Mile of Every Exit on Every Major Interstate From Coast to Coast in the United States, Interstate America. 2001.

Exploring America's Scenic Highways, National Geographic Society, 1985.

Fleming, Alice, *Highways into History*, St. Martin's Press, 1971. (Contains history of segments of many U.S. and State highways.)

Flink, James J. *America Adopts the Automobile, 1895-1910*, The MIT Press, 1970. (In addition to discussing evolution of the car, Flink discusses automobile clubs, motor vehicle regulation, roads, and "Motives for Adoption," among many topics.)

Flint, Anthony, *Wrestling with Moses: How Jane Jacobs Took on New York's Master Builder and Transformed the American City*, Random House, 2009. (The Clash of Titans between the autocratic, imperious master builder Robert Moses and the author of the classic *The Death and Life of Great American Cities* (1961) over three Moses developments, including a 4-lane highway through Washington Square and an elevated 10-lane Lower Manhattan Expressway through SoHo, Little Italy, Chinatown, and the Lower East Side.)

Foster, Lynn V., *Fielding's California The Mission Trail*, San Diego to San Francisco, Fielding's Travel Books, 1988.

Foster, Lynn V. and Foster, Lawrence, *Fielding's Spanish Trails in the Southwest*, Fielding's Travel Books, 1986.

Francis, William, *Along the Kirkwood Highway*, Images of America, Arcadia Publishing, 2014. (About a portion of State Route 2 in New Castle County, Delaware, in the heavily illustrated Images of America format.)

Francis, William, *Building Interstate 95 in Delaware*, Images of America, Arcadia Publishing, 2018. (With an emphasis on photographs in the Images of America format, this book is less about construction and more about what was in place before and after the construction, with a lengthy chapter on construction of I-95 in Wilmington.)

Frick, Karen Trapenberg, *Remaking the San-Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge: A Case of Shadowboxing with Nature*, Routledge, 2017. (The 25-year saga of replacing part of the historic bridge damaged by the 1989 Loma Prieta Bridge.)

Gandy, Matthew, "Technological Modernism and the Urban Parkway," *Concrete and Clay: Reworking Nature in New York City*, The MIT Press, 2002. (The parkway section includes chapters on "Automobilization of the American Landscape," "Robert Moses and the Radiant City," "The Demise of Technological Modernism," and "Fractured Cities.")

Garreau, Joel, *Edge City: Life on the New Frontier*, Doubleday, 1991. (A pragmatic look at a phenomenon of the late-20th century, edge cities spurred by the Interstate System.)

Gass, Anne B., *We Demand: The Suffrage Road Trip*, Maine Authors Publishing, 2021. (A novel based on the true story of a transcontinental automobile ride by three women bound for Washington, D.C., with petitions demanding a constitutional amendment on voting rights for women. Book cover blurb: "A thrilling cross country road trip by three remarkable women.")

Gies, Joseph, *Bridges and Men*, Doubleday and Company, 1963. (The history of bridges, from the early logs across streams to the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge.)

Gillespie, Angus Kress, *Crossing Under the Hudson: The Story of the Holland and Lincoln Tunnels*, Rivergate Books, Rutgers University Press, 2011.

Gillespie, Hugh M., *A Century of Progress: The History of Hot Mix Asphalt*, National Asphalt Pavement Association, 1992.

Goddard, Stephen B., *Getting There: The Epic Struggle Between Road and Rail in the American Century*, Basic Books, 1994. (The epic struggle as told by an author who wishes the railroads had defeated the "high and mighty" road builders.)

Goddard, Stephen B., *Colonel Albert Pope and His American Dream Machines: The Life and Times of a Bicycle Tycoon Turned Automotive Pioneer*, McFarland & Company, 2000. (Biography of a pioneer of the Good Roads Movement, the bicycle industry, and the automobile industry.)

Gordon, Jan and Cora J., *On Wandering Wheels: Through Roadside Camps from Maine to Georgia in an Old Sedan Car*, Dodd, Mead and Company, 1928.

Gruskin, Paul, *Rockin' Down the Highway* (Voyageur Press, 2006). The book jacket describes this book as a heavily illustrated "history of the long and winding interplay between rock & roll and the automobile."

Gudis, Catherine, *Buyways: Billboards, Automobiles, and the American Landscape*, Routledge, 2004.

Haddad, Paul, *Freewaytopia: How Freeways Shaped Los Angeles*, Santa Monica Press, 2021. (Chapters tell the story of each Los Angeles freeway as a way of exploring how social, economic, political, and cultural demands created the freeways that had come to symbolize the city.)

(Kussy, FHWA's Deputy Chief Counsel, describes the relationship between the growth of transportation systems and administrative law in the United States, with reference to zoning, contracting, and environmental requirements.)

Labatut, Jean, and Lane, Wheaton J., editors, *Highways in Our National Life: A Symposium*, Princeton University Press, 1950. (An oft-cited survey on all aspects of highways.)

Lackey, Kris, *RoadFrames: The American Highway Narrative*, University of Nebraska Press, 1997 (The jacket explains: "In a lively discussion of books written as early as 1903 and as recently as 1994, Kris Lackey reveals the crucial roles the highway and automobile travel have played through generations of American writing.")

Lay, Max G., *Ways of the World: A History of the World's Roads and of the Vehicles That Used Them*, Rutgers University Press, 1992. (Detailed history of road development throughout the world.)

Lerner, Barron., *One for the Road: Drunk Driving Since 1900*, The Johns Hopkins University Press, 2011. (This history of efforts to stop drunk driving, according to the dust jacket, "provides crucial historical lessons for understanding the ongoing epidemic of drunk driving.")

Longhurst, John, *Bike Battles: A History of Sharing the American Road*, University of Washington Press, 2015. (Tells the story of how America adapted to the bicycle in the late 19th century, lost interest, then tried again beginning in the 1960s to the present.)

Macy, Sue, *Wheels of Change: How Women Rode the Bicycle to Freedom (With a Few Flat Tires Along the Way)*, National Geographic Society, 2011. (Written for ages 12 and up, this book tells how the Bicycle Craze of the late 18th century allowed women to break through the many restrictions on their lives to "ride into a new world full of all sorts of freedoms," as the book jacket puts it.)

Mair, George, *Bridge Down*, Stein and Day, 1982. (Beginning with the collapse of the Silver Bridge and Sunshine Skyway, Mair discusses the condition of the Nation's bridges in an alarmist text.)

Margolies, John, and Yorke, Jr., Douglas A., *Hitting the Road: The Art of the American Road Map*, Chronicle, 1996.

Margolies, John, *Home Away From Home: Motels in America*, Bulfinch, Press, 1995.
