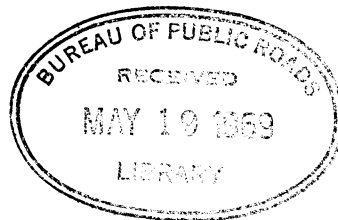

INTRODUCTION

In this publication are presented selected data on highway toll facilities in the United States in operation, under construction, or proposed at the beginning of 1968. Table T-1 lists all known toll facilities in operation or under construction as of January 1, 1968. Table T-2 lists those projects considered to be under serious consideration, awaiting completion of financing arrangements. Table T-3 lists proposals for new toll projects that may or may not become realities, depending upon such factors as legislative approval, financial feasibility, completion of plans, etc.

For each of these facilities is reported, to the extent known, the name, financing or operating authority, ownership, location and termini, feature crossed, length, road system, and—for facilities located on the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways—the Interstate System route number.

This is not intended to be a complete reference volume on toll facilities, nor is it intended to duplicate data that are published elsewhere. Information such as width and clearance on bridges, type of structure, load limits, year built or put in service, cost, toll rates, or annual traffic volumes, are not included. Neither is information on the number and capacity of ferry boats or the seasonal and hourly operating schedules.

Nearly all of the publicly owned toll authorities publish monthly and/or quarterly, semi-annual, and annual reports which give much of this information. In most instances copies can be obtained direct from the authorities. Most of them are also on file in the Bureau of Public Roads' library, or offices of the Bureau's Highway Statistics Division. Monthly and annual data on traffic volumes are also maintained for many public toll facilities by the Bureau's Current Planning Division.

Information on revenues, expenditures, and outstanding indebtedness for public toll facilities is contained in "Highway Statistics," an annual publication of the Bureau of Public Roads. At the time of this publication, the Bureau of Public Roads was also in the process of compiling information on all bridges in the United States, both toll and free, classified by age and by carrying capacity.

Other organizations also compile data relating to toll facilities: The International Bridge, Tunnel and Turnpike Association, Inc., with offices at 900 Woodward Building, 15th and H Streets, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20005, maintains an address directory of its membership and serves as an information clearing house and research center; conducting surveys and studies, and publishing a variety of reports, statistics and analyses.

The American Automobile Association, 1712 G Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006, compiles a directory of toll facilities containing such current information as rates, load limits, frequency of service, etc.

Other useful references to toll facilities include "Highway Bond Financing . . An Analysis 1950-1962" published by the Bureau of Public Roads, which compares the methods of financing toll and free road projects through borrowing. Also, in 1966, hearings were held before the Special Subcommittee on the Federal-Aid Highway Program, and the Subcommittee on Roads, of the House Committee on Public Works, on the "Relationship of Toll Facilities to the Federal-Aid Highway Program." The transcript of the hearings, together with a subsequent report (House Report No. 597, 90th Congress, 1st Session) were printed by the Committee on Public Works and contain a vast amount of information on toll facilities.

Most of the data for the present publication were obtained by the field offices of the Bureau of Public Roads in cooperation with the State highway departments. The material was analyzed and organized in the Highway Statistics Division under the direction of Thomas W. Cooper, and the data prepared for publication by Miss Virginia Moyer, Miss Susan Coy, Mrs. Brenda Powell, and Miss Margaret Paterick.

THE TOLL STORY

In ruling on the distinction between a highway tax and a highway toll, the courts have held that tolls, in the accepted sense, are a proprietor's charge for the passage over a highway, bridge, or ferry, exacted when and as the privilege of passage is exercised. Taxes levied on highway users in the form of registration fees and motor-fuel taxes are not tolls in this sense, because they are levied without reference to the use of any particular highway, and thus are marked as demands of sovereignty and not of proprietorship.^{1/}

This distinction of tolls as a proprietary charge is, in a real sense, a heritage of our past, since the first toll bridges and ferries in the United States were privately owned, as were most of the toll roads.

As early as 1654 a toll bridge had been built across the Newbury River at Rowley, Massachusetts and by the end of the 17th Century a toll bridge had been erected across what is now Spuyten Duyvil Creek at the northern end of Manhattan Island. During the 18th and early 19th Centuries, numerous toll bridge charters were granted in the New England States, in New York, and in Pennsylvania.

The history of toll roads in the United States began about 1785 when Connecticut, Maryland, and Virginia enacted legislation authorizing the collection of tolls in order to repair and maintain existing roads.^{2/}

Virginia initiated the first public toll road project in the United States when it authorized the erection of gates on what was later to be known as the "Little River Turnpike" in 1785. Because maintenance costs were so high on this heavily traveled road, toll gates were erected to ease the burden on local inhabitants. The 1785 legislation instructed the commissioners to place the toll gates near Alexandria and any where else needed between Alexandria and Snigger's and Vesta's Gaps in the Blue Ridge Mountains.^{3/}

Following the Revolutionary War there opened a new era of activity with many people recognizing the need for adequate transportation facilities. Growth of commerce required more and better highways. However, the great cost was beyond the limited means of the war impoverished local and State governments. Thus, unable to finance these needed road facilities on their own, many States adopted the new method of financing road projects through private enterprise under State authority. Private capital was used to construct roads on which users would pay a toll charge to defray operating costs and in time retire the outstanding debt. It was customary in creating most of these toll road corporations to make them subject to dissolution when the initial investment, plus 12 percent interest, had been repaid. Other than this provision, no limit was generally placed on the length of time the corporation could operate.

In 1794, the first privately owned turnpike was opened; the Lancaster turnpike from Philadelphia to Lancaster, Pennsylvania. Operating for over a century, the Philadelphia and Lancaster Turnpike Road Company was finally dissolved in 1902.

The turnpike movement rapidly gained favor in this era. Between 1800 and 1850, 434 road corporations were granted franchises to construct or operate toll roads in the New England States alone. In addition, Maryland, New Jersey and Virginia granted similar toll operations. In 1822, Congress attempted to levy tolls to maintain the Cumberland Road, but the bill was vetoed by President Monroe on grounds of unconstitutionality.

With the advent of the railroad era in the 1840's, the decline of the turnpike began. Although briefly stimulated with the advent of plank-road construction between 1845-1857, the competition became too great, and most of the private roads had become public property by the end of the 19th Century. A few lingered on until the early 1900's; and one of the last appears to be the Frederick and Woodsboro Turnpike, purchased by the Maryland State Roads Commission in 1921.

According to Dr. Durrenberger, the original purpose of toll roads was two-fold: 1) To persuade private capital to assist the State in supplying lines of communication to a rapidly expanding country; and 2) to shift the burden of maintenance from the local inhabitants to those who used the roads.^{4/} As the States grew in population and wealth, the need for assistance from private enterprise diminished, as it became possible to build public highways free to all.

Toll bridge companies followed a parallel pattern of decline, that was not to be halted until the advent of the automobile age and the revived interest in road building in the early 1900's. Between 1900-1920, no more than three toll bridges were built on the average in any one year, but the number increased rapidly thereafter, and at the time of a special survey conducted by the Bureau of Public Roads in 1927, there were 233 toll bridges in operation, of which 191 were privately owned, and 42 were publicly owned.

Subsequent surveys made by Public Roads in 1939, 1948, and 1968, show the following changes since the 1927 survey:

As these surveys show, the number of toll bridges reached a peak in the late 1930's; declined thereafter during and immediately following the war years; but since 1948 have again increased in number. Most significant, however, has been the steady decline in the number of privately owned facilities which, if the trend continues, will have virtually disappeared in a few years.

The oldest operating ferry in the United States appears to be the Oxford-Bellevue Ferry in Talbot County, Maryland which dates back to 1659. In the Talbot County records for 1661, which is the first year of county records on the eastern shore of Maryland, the following entry appears:^{5/} "Johnathan Hopkins, inkeeper of Wye, agrees to keep a ferry for horse and foot this year to Long Point, on Mr. Courcsey's land, and to Island Point and to Mr. Phil Steevenson's Point, and from said places to his house -- for 2800 tobacco to be paid him at next levy by this county in 1671."

Purportedly, this ferry had been in operation two years before the above entry was made on the county records, thus placing the ferry operation beginning around 1659. The Oxford-Bellevue Ferry has therefore given continuous service for 309 years.

The use of toll ferries flourished during the 18th and 19th Centuries, chiefly because they frequently operated at remote places, or across wide bodies of water where the flow of traffic was not great and the construction of a bridge was uneconomical or impracticable. The bridging of streams with both free and toll structures during the past four decades, however, has caused the rapid disappearance of the highway ferry. Although no survey of toll ferries was made in 1927, the subsequent surveys show the following changes:

Here again, the private ferries have shown the largest decline, with nearly 500 having disappeared between 1939 and 1968.

Of the 12 toll highway tunnels in operation at the end of 1967, only the Detroit-Windsor international tunnel was privately owned. Among the others, those in the Chesapeake Bay area are complex toll facilities involving not only tunnels, but elevated structures as well. For this study, however, these crossing facilities are listed simply as tunnels.^{6/}

Although the toll road as a commercial enterprise had disappeared around 1921, a scattering of privately owned scenic or resort roads continued in operation; but none of these offered service to through traffic.

The modern turnpike age may be said to have started in 1937 when the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission was created. However, in 1939, a year before the Turnpike was opened, the Connecticut legislature authorized the collection of tolls on the Merritt Parkway at Greenwich, and on the Wilbur Cross Parkway at Milford. These tolls, plus five percent of net income from State road-user tax revenues constituted a fund to help amortize bonds issued to construct an extension of the Wilbur Cross Parkway. Later, in 1953, legislation was enacted to continue tolls on these parkways after the debt was retired to provide additional revenue for highway construction elsewhere in the State. Connecticut thus became the first State to adopt the principle of perpetual tolls as a part of the basic highway tax structure.

Table A shows the change in status of operating toll facilities between 1948 and 1968. It will be noted that 119 new toll bridges were constructed during this period, but that 91 also were freed. A few were dismantled or abandoned, and a significant number changed from private to public ownership, as several States followed an aggressive policy of purchasing and then subsequently freeing toll bridges long held in private hands.

A few new ferries were put in operation during the 1948-1968 period, but a far larger number were discontinued, in most instances being replaced by bridge or tunnel facilities, or in some cases being abandoned because of lack of traffic, or rerouting of highways.

Most of the toll roads were, of course, built since 1948, and only one (Denver-Boulder Turnpike) of the publicly owned ones has been freed. The few private toll roads are short, scenic routes that, in most instances, provide a seasonal service.

For this study, a toll road is defined as a highway for travel subject to the payment of a special fee for using the road itself. On numerous roads that serve resort or scenic areas, a charge is collected at some point along the highway, but is in the nature of an entrance or permit fee for use of services within an area connected with or served by the highway. Typical of such are National parks and monuments, bathing beaches, picnic areas, and playgrounds. Roads of this type are not considered to be toll roads, although admittedly the distinction at times is difficult to draw.

The National Park Service, for example, maintains a schedule of fees for automobiles, house trailers, and motorcycles, upon entrance to National parks and monument grounds. The fees are collected on an annual or daily permit basis. Under the circumstances, such charges would not constitute tolls in the accepted sense. The 11 private toll roads included in this study are undoubtedly on the borderline insofar as the above definition is concerned.

Table B compares the number of existing intra-State, inter-State, and international toll facilities as of January 1, 1968 with the number existing January 1, 1948. Almost all of the new facilities since 1948 have been in the intra-State category. Excluding toll ferries, the number of intra-State toll roads, bridges and tunnels has increased by 69 facilities or 70 percent since 1948. On the other hand, inter-State toll bridges and tunnels have declined by 6 during the same period while international bridges increased by 3—practically offsetting each other.

There are 4,500 miles of toll facilities in operation in the United States as of January 1, 1948 according to table C. Nearly 55 percent of these miles are on the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways. An additional 293.5 miles are on other Federal-aid systems, for a grand total of 2,757.5 miles of toll facilities on Federally designated highway systems. The above mileage includes certain sections on which ingress and egress is permitted without incurring a toll charge (203 miles). The remaining toll miles are located off the Federal highway systems on State and local county road or city street systems.

Of course, toll roads account for the largest portion of the total in table C (3,742.2 miles). In addition, part 4 of table T-1 reports that certain toll roads excluded from the above totals were under construction as of January 1, 1968. Of the 250 miles then under construction, nearly all were located in the States of Florida, Kentucky and Oklahoma and off the Federal-aid systems.

The inclusion of toll facilities on the Federal-aid systems is not to imply that they are eligible for Federal-aid funds. Under certain conditions and restrictions, Federal-aid funds may be approved for construction of toll bridges, and for approaches to toll roads on the Interstate System. Otherwise, Federal-aid funds may not be expended for construction or improvement of toll facilities. The sections of roadway permitting ingress and egress without payment of toll may be eligible for construction with Federal-aid funds if adequate bypass routes are available whereby the remaining toll sections can be avoided.
