On January 8th., we sent you, with covering letter, the publication entitled "What Can We Expect of the Drivers' License Law?", "Weeding Out the Worthless Driver", and notes on Act III (the text of the Uniform Motor Vehicle Operators' and Chauffeurs' License Act).

THE MODEL MUNICIPAL TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

The Model Municipal Traffic Ordinance was prepared by the Committee on Municipal Traffic Ordinances and Regulations in response to a general demand for such an ordinance. It provides for cities and towns a form of ordinance in conformity with the fourth Act, (Regulation of Operation of Vehicles on Highways) of the Uniform Vehicle Code designed for state enactment. Progress made in the adoption of both this Act and the Ordinance is shown in the pamphlet, "Shall We Go All the Way?" which was sent you several weeks ago.

The Model Municipal Traffic Ordinance is comprehensive, yet sufficiently elastic to meet the needs of all communities both large and small. In its provisions may be found solutions to features of the traffic problems with which communities all over the country have been coping with varying degrees of success.

We are sending you herewith several pamphlets in explanation of the Ordinance. The folder entitled "Twenty-five High Points of the Model Municipal Traffic Ordinance", as its title implies, summarizes briefly the principal provisions of the Ordinance. The article by Mr. C. W. Stark, entitled "The Model Municipal Traffic Ordinance" shows how some of the principal provisions of the Ordinance will operate to remedy the confusion due to the present variety of regulations in the different cities. The article by Mr. Elmer Stevens entitled, "Untangling Our Traffic" describes the manner in which Chicago has dealt effectively with the traffic problem. The complete text of the Model Municipal Traffic Ordinance with the explanatory report appended has not been included but will be sent on request.
