Why Use RDA?

Resource Description and Access (RDA) is a new cataloging standard, which is the successor to the Anglo-American Cataloguing Rules (AACR2).

Pros


- International Standard
- Many libraries and OCLC increasingly using RDA
- Looking to the future

Cons

- Cost of training
- RDA still in development
- Legacy records

Noticeable Differences

- New MARC fields (264, 33x, etc.)
- Transcription of core elements
- Access points
- Relationship designators
- Fewer abbreviations






Adding a New Tag in EOS

Add it to the...

- Tags list
- Staff side
- OPAC
- Title list display
- Easy MARC




For each of these categories, the tag must be added to both the MARC and OCLC databases.

Background

- The NCDOT library collection began primarily as a place to store NCDOT Board Minutes.
 Other items were subsequently donated by staff as well as materials from transportation memberships.
- Dr. Moy Biswas, the manager of the Research & Development Unit, at that time, envisioned a fully functioning library.
- Some minor cataloging had been done by the State Library of North Carolina but the broad collection of approximately 6000 items remained largely unorganized and uncataloged.
- September 2010 Lamara Williams-Jones was hired as librarian with the goal of getting the library organized and promoting its services to DOT customers state-wide.

Background(cont.)


- A library peer exchange was organized in June 2011 to solicit ideas from other National and State DOT agencies who had already established their own library services.
- Several recommendations were made but three specific items kick started the revamping of the library.
 - 1. The NCDOT Library joined the Transportation Library Connectivity Pooled Fund Study, TPF-5(237).
 - 2. Renewed a Memorandum of Understanding during the Summer of 2011 with the State Library of North Carolina to resume their cataloging of the newer library materials.
 - 3. Hired Contract Cataloger Christine Mulder in October 2011 to work exclusively on the cataloging backlog.

Problems



- Broad Collection on shelves by accession number which resulted in identical items in different places and had never been weeded...NOT EVER.
- Items from collection were also located in **three** other rooms on a parallel hallway some 50 yards from the stack area and librarian often had to look in several areas to locate items.
- Building where library is housed suffered water damage due to a leaking room damaging one of the rooms where library material were housed and leading to mold and mildew.
- Another of the storage rooms
 had become an equipment
 graveyard with an assortment of
 discarded items from people's
 offices.

- Library supplies of the sort
 needed to create a library didn't
 exist, all the library had was a
 large stack of barcodes and one
 old beat-up brown book-truck.
- An office needed to be organized for our newly hired contract cataloger as well as getting her access to cataloging tools that she would need.
- A space was needed for customers to use for research or reading when visiting the library.
- A space was needed for staff to work on books and other archival materials as well as process incoming and outgoing materials.



Planning and Implementation

Short-Range Goals Accomplished

- Ordered supplies and equipment
- Organized office for Contract
 Cataloger, Chris Mulder
- Created an informal collection development policy to guide us as we started weeding the collection
- Set up Voyager Cataloging
 Module as well as other online
 cataloging tools for both the
 librarian and the cataloger
- Cleaned out ancillary repurposed one as a library work area and the other as a reading room for customers



Long-Range and other **Goals Accomplished**

- Extensive weeding and cataloging and organizing of library collection including shelf labeling
- More library visibility via newly developed unit page which includes an information section on the library
- Created Unit Newsletter featuring articles and updates about the library
- · Hosted library open house during National Library Week in 2014



New Name

Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) → Federal Transit Administration (FTA)

Support grew. In 1964, President Lyndon Johnson signed the act creating the Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA), which was charged with providing federal assistance for mass transit projects.

In the 1970s, UMTA's role – and resources – was broadened. The 1974 National Mass Transportation Assistance Act created an annual formula grant program. That expansion helped transit agencies, in a general decline across the country, to restore and expand service. Legislation in the late 1970s elevated the role of transit by addressing it with highway funding, recognizing public transportation as an important part of America's overall mobility.

In 1991, the agency was renamed the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to reflect its reach into rural areas and on ensuring mobility for all Americans, including people with disabilities.

About Us

Since its inception following the 1970 Census, the Gaston MPO has had the sole task of planning and monitoring transportation systems in areas defined within the Gaston Urban Area. In 1962 Congress enacted federal law that first established MPOs and initiated a requirement that a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive (3-C) transportation planning process be established for all urban areas over 50,000 in population in order to qualify for federal transportation funds. Since its inception the Gaston Urban Area MPO expanded in 2013 to include all of Gaston County as well as Cleveland and Lincoln Counties to become the Gaston – Cleveland – Lincoln MPO (GCLMPO).


