
Bob Johnson and his family are presently at Oklahoma City; Bob is attending school and his family is enjoying the weather... When Bob's class is over, they are going on PL 737.



As the month draws to a close, plans are underway for a big facility barbecue at North Nenana on Memorial Sunday. Should be away from the mosquitoes at that altitude!!





To start off this chapter of Trapline I'd like to mention a few of the oddities that took place during Spring warm-up.


