Soon we should be getting a visit from someone belonging to the barge company, who's Tug boat went down last month in Summer Strait. Their life boat and life rings washed up on the back side of Level Island, and Mel recovered them at the Coast Guards request. Three men perished in the incident, but one was rescued by the Coast Guard. That happened on one of our rough water and windy days, when such things usually happen.

Gail Lewis and I became weather observers last summer. We take turns doing the observations, switching once a week. For us it's been a long winter. Our first two observations and our last two, are taken when it's

dark, so we can't wait for the longer days, and more daylight. At least it got us out of the house more often this winter. It let us get more of that good Alaska fresh air into our lungs and clean rain on our brow while we gazed into the sky.

Well so much for this month. I probably used up all the news we'll be having for a long time. Happy Spring to all. --- Renate Suko, Level Island.
