I AM APPROVING TODAY THE CONSTRUCTION OF INTERSTATE 90
BETWEEN SEATTLE AND BELLEVUE IN WASHINGTON STATE.

THIS SEVEN-MILE SECTION OF FREEWAY HAS BEEN UNDER

DELIBERATION FOR SEVERAL YEARS. I HAVE DECIDED TO APPROVE

IT FOR THREE REASONS:

TRANSPORTATION NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY CAN BE BETTER

SERVED. THE NEW HIGHWAY WILL INCLUDE TWO CENTER

LANES FCR THE USE OF HIGH-OCCUPANCY VEHICLES (BUSES

AND CARPOOLS) AND TRAFFIC FROM MERCER ISLAND. HOWEVER,

ONE CONDITION OF THIS APPROVAL IS THAT PUBLIC TRANSIT

WILL PERMANENTLY HAVE PRIORITY OVER GENERAL MERCER

ISLAND TRAFFIC.

- -- SECOND, UNDER THIS PROJECT A SAFETY HAZARD
 ON THE BRIDGE ACROSS LAKE WASHINGTON WILL BE
 CORRECTED. IN FACT, GETTING RID OF THE DANGEROUS
 "BULGE" SECTION OF THE BRIDGE WILL BE THE FIRST
 ORDER OF WORK.

 CONSISTENT WITH THE ECONOMIC, SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL

 OBJECTIVES OF THE PRESIDENT'S URBAN POLICY.

THE EXTENSION OF I-90 HAS BEEN CAREFULLY PLANNED AND

TRAFFIC GROWTH PROJECTIONS INDICATE THAT THE ROAD'S INCREASED

CAPACITY WILL BE NEEDED BY 1990. I BELIEVE THAT BY PROCEEDING

NOW ACCORDING TO AN ORDERLY AND CAREFULLY CONTROLLED PLAN WE WILL

SERVE THE NEEDS AND THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE URBAN COMMUNITY.
