Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe announced today that 28 urban mass transportation experts from throughout the United States are attending a six-week course at Pittsburg's Carnegie-Mellon University through Government-sponsored fellowships.

Secretary Volpe said that the Urban Mass Transportation Administration's grants total \$125,857. They cover 75 percent of each fellow's salary and expenses with his sponsoring agency providing the remaining 25 percent.

"The real benefactors of this training will be the riding public through improved mass transportation as a result of the managerial and technical lessons learned at Carnegie-Mellon." Secretary Volpe said.

The 28 experts receive four weeks of intensive classroom lectures and seminars in a course called "Professional Program in Urban Transportation." This includes fundamental concepts in urban transportation, transportation planning methodology, management of transportation systems and transportation design and technology. Following the formal program, they will take a two-week lecture tour of Montreal, London, Paris, Stockholm and Hamburg to study and tour mass transportation systems and facilities abroad.

UMTA Administrator Carlos C. Villarreal noted that "the fellows were chosen on proven capabilities and exhibited potential contributions to mass transit solutions."
