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U.S. Secretary of Transportation William T. Coleman, Jr., today announced the award of grants worth \$20,837,412 to 47 states, the District of Columbia and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico for direct transit assistance to elderly and handicapped persons.

The grants are being made by the Department's Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) under Section 16(b)(2) provisions of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964 as amended. The legislation provides for grants to private non-profit corporations and associations specifically to assist them in providing transportation services to meet the special needs of elderly and handicapped persons for whom regular transit services are unavailable, inappropriate or insufficient.

These grants are being made to states on behalf of 1,031 nonprofit organizations. As many as 80 applicants are from New York and as few as two applicants each are from Georgia and Nevada.

The largest single grant of \$2,055,588 goes to California, while Nebraska receives \$22,616, the smallest grant. A total of 2,283 vehicles are being purchased to aid the mobility of elderly and handicapped persons. Following is a list of the states receiving funds, the total amount of the award and number of approvals within each state.
