#### HOME STUDY ENROLLMENTS INCREASE; CHANGES IN COURSES ARE NOTED

Total enrollment in Directed Study courses has jumped to a total of 1401 with 530 new registrations received with in the past four months, a better than 130 per month average. Largest increases were in the DS-100 Mathematics and Electronic fundamentals course but all courses show substantial gains.

A new practice has been established of mailing "reminder" letters to everyone who has been inactive for three months or more. These are mailed immediately after each quarterly period with emphasis on the suggestion that students CHOOSE A DEFINITE TIME for home study and STUDY WITH SOMEONE ELSE if at all possible.

The Radiation Patterns course in the DS-200 series has now been completed and the last assignment - Chapters 6, 7 and 8 - has been sent out, together with the last examination to men who have already covered previous assignments. The examination is not lengthy, covering about 20 questions on typical radiation patterns of ILS and VOR facilities. With DS-201 now complete, there remains only Amplitude Modulation, DS-208, not as yet available. In the DS-1 course on Basic Electricity all material for this section of the course will have been covered with the completion of Chapter XXI. The last few chapters of the section will be as follows: Chapter XVII (now being printed), Special Use Transformers; Chapter XIX, Polyphase Generators; Chapter XXI PolyphaseSystems; Chapter XXI, AC Motors.

Notice is given of an important change in DS-100, making Chapter 4, which coverabe 14 weeks long. Beginning with Class some applications of calculus, an optional requirement for completion of the couse. Men now enrolled in DS-100 may indicate their intention and request issuance of additional lesson assignments. The subject material of Chapter 4 will later be expanded into considerably greater coverage of differential

and integral calculus with special applications to circuit and concepts actually encountered in CAA facilities. It will not be a part of DS-100 but instead will be offered as an optional course in advanced applied mathematics.

#### OVERLAPPING CLASSES BEGIN SOON IN FACILITIES RESIDENT SCHOOLS

The overlapping of classes in various Facilities Branch schools will begin soon With the arrival of ASR/PAR Class Ill on May 28 the radar school is on a two-class basis, with class quotas set at 16 men per class until Class 113 convenes on August 27, at which time the quotas will double to 32 men per class throughout the FY-57 program.

Also convening May 28 were DME Class 115 and ILS/WOR Class 116. DME classes are not scheduled to overlap but ILS/VOR groups will be doubled up starting with Class 117 which arrives July 2.

> LATEST TELETYPE IS INSTALLED IN COMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT SCHOOL

Seven of the latest type Model 28 printers with built-in "stunt boxes" have been installed in the Communications Equipment school in preparation for the expected expansion in this area of training at the Center. With three of the older type Model 28's the new lineup of printers will make possible increased emphasis in this section of the course. Twelve new sets of UHF equipment, multichannel and single-channel, are also installed for the next Communications Equipment Class which will henceforth include the two weeks in UHF Phase V. Start ing with Class 66 on May 7, the Communications Equipment course will therefore 67 - August 13 - class quotas will include new employees from continental Regions in addition to International Region and Region 5 quotas.

ATC REORGANIZES: GREWELL PROMOTED. BOLYARD AND MITCHELL NAMED CHIEFS OF AIR ROUTE AND AIRPORT SECTIONS

Jack W. Grewell, Chief of the ATC Branch for several years, moved up to GS-13, and two instructors were promoted into recently authorized positions heading the new Air Route Traffic Control and Airport Traffic Control Sections, last April, following expansion of ATC training at the Aeronautical Center.

Grewell came to the Center from Denver, Air Route Traffic Control Center, as one of the original group of five men who began ATC training of USAF officers in January, 1951. Grewell began his 15 years with ATC in airport traffic control - for five years - before transferring to air route traffic control "for good." He has been Branch Chief here since 1952.

Perry S. Bolyard started his CAA career in the Las Vegas, Nevada, airport traffic control tower. He was in the Navy during World War II. After the war, he was assigned to Oakland Air Route Traffic Control Center, from which he transferred to Oklahoma City as an instructor, in 1951. His work here earned an "Outstanding" rating in 1955 (BEACON, May-June, 1955). He was selected in April to fill the new position of Chief, Air Route Traffic Control Section.

Maurice J. Mitchell served in several "old Region Seven" towers before coming here from the Seattle-Tacoma airport traffic control tower. He was one of the "first five." From 1953 until his return in April, this year, he instructed when he was promoted to Chief, Seattle

in ATC procedures at the ICAO Training Centre in Mexico City. He was selected for the position of Chief. Airport Traffic Control Section, upon his return to Oklahoma City, and will begin his new duties in August, when he returns from ATC refresher training at Tacoma Radar Approach Control Center, at McChord Air Force Base, Washington.

CAA BEGINS TRAINING OF ENTRANCE-LEVEL TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS FOR ATC FACILITIES

Basic training of air traffic control personnel needed to fill vacancies in ATC facilities began here last February when sixty men started their training in the Air Traffic Control Branch, Most of the first group, comprising three 20-man classes, will be assigned to facilities in Regions 1 and 4. A second group of sixty, temporarily doubling the training program, began studies on April 16 and will be graduated June 22. The third group, which will include eighty men, will begin work here on June 11, after the first group completes the ten-week course.
