

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FAA EMPLOYEES AT CANTON, GUAM, AND WAKE MAY BE GRANTED HOME LEAVE UNDER PROVISIONS OF PUBLIC LAW 86/707 AND REVISED ANNUAL AND SICK LEAVE REGULATIONS

Home leave is earned by service on and after September 6, 1960, as an employee of the Federal Government at a post of duty outside the United States. If an employee is entitled to accumulate 45 days of annual leave, he is entitled to home leave. FAA employees at Canton, Guam, and Wake accrue home leave of 15 days for each 12 months of service. There is no limit to the amount of leave accruable. Home leave accrues at the following rate:

Home leave may not be granted until the completion of 24 months of continuous creditable service outside the United States which begins on or after September 6, 1960. If there is a break in service of one or more work days, or if an employee is assigned (other than a detail) to a position not subject to home leave, creditable service is terminated and may not be recredited.

Home leave may be granted during a period of service outside the United States when it is contemplated that he will return to service abroad immediately, or upon completion of service in the United States. If an employee fails to return to service abroad he will be indebted for the home leave he has used unless he was unable to return for humanitarian reasons or for reasons beyond his control.

HONOLULU IFSS CUTOVER TO DIAMOND HEAD

December 21, 1960, was a day just like any day except SOB -- CHOKE -- YOU ARE THERE! The following personnel called their doctors bright and early in the morning and reported symptoms of everything known to medical science, but after finding out the doctor had fallen asleep in the middle of their tales of woe, decided to report to the Diamond Head station for the cutover: J. MORIN, MIKE BRADDY, TED PRICE, DOUGLAS CHING, CHARLES KAKIGI, RAYMOND YANO, LEONE GAMACHE, JOE KOPP JAY, TOMAS DEBOMA, and SUN CHOY LAM. Special hot-line telephone circuits and teletype circuits were set up between Diamond Head and Ye Olde KVM to pass traffic and information back and forth. FREDDIE TARLTON and a full crew reported in at the old KVM for their last watch assignment at the Honolulu Airport. Numerous observers from Alaskan and mainland stations and regional offices were present to observe the cutover and the operation of the Western Union Plan 59-A Automatic Switching System.

The cutover began 1914Z with the cutover of the landline circuits. At 220044 the radioteletype receive circuits were cut over and at 0220 the transmit side of the circuits were cut over.

Fifteen (15) TTO's and 5 supervisors had, prior to the cutover, attended two weeks of classroom work and familiarization with the equipment. The classes were conducted by BERNICE BARON of the Western Union Company. Terms such as SNI, MWI, COMP CLEAR OUT, OMIT COMP, PARITY, and CODE FAIL became commonplace; however, our real education began after the cutover while working with live traffic. We are still learning, and many of the system's limitations are slowly but surely being overcome.

The equipment itself is made up of five specialized types of send/receive cabinets plus the director which reads the address line, and the allotter which makes your cross-office connections for you. The five types of cabinets are the LINE SEND/RECEIVE

cabinet which handles all of our radioteletype circuits plus the crossroom Circuits 601, 602 and 603. The equipment has means of either automatically or manually routing traffic. The SUPERVISOR CABINET is the Jack of all trades of the switching system. Tapes containing errors in the alignment functions from the multipoint cabinets are automatically switched here for processing. The supervisor cabinet can be used for a spillover position during circuit outages, MX routing, etc. The MX cabinet is fully automatic and all messages entering the switching system, requiring relay to three or more different destinations, are automatically switched to this cabinet for processing. Messages containing errors in the alignment functions of the address line may be manually pushbuttoned to the supervisor cabinet for manual relay. The multipoint cabinet is used for our landline correspondents. It is capable of handling up to 18 tributary stations and is the most complex of all the cabinets. An INTERCEPT/ SPILLOVER cabinet is provided to operate with the multipoint cabinet and provides a means of storing messages for stations on the multipoint circuits that close down for extended periods, or close down for maintenance. Each message entering the system is checked for number continuity, correct ICAO format, and correct address and end of message. Any variation in message format will cause an alarm and must be pushbuttoned to its destination.

All airlines having equipment which terminates in our multipoint cabinets have been given a 3-hour course in the operation of the equipment, with 2 hours of classroom work on what makes the equipment operate and how it operates.

Our next issue of Tradewinds will carry an exciting description of our cutover back to Ye Olde KVM.

NEW CHIEF OF AIRPORTS BRANCH

A relaxed, smiling, genial Southerner, with no trace of the famous southern drawl, is Merle W. (Hemp) Hemphill our new Chief of Airports Branch. Hemp came to us in December from the position of Deputy Chief, Construction Division of Dulles International Airport.

There, in addition to his duties on the \$85 million Dulles project, he had direct responsibility and control of the 70 MPH, 4lane, limited access freeway to the airport. This \$15 million job set a record for the State of Virginia for the speed with which it was handled. Only 15 months after the route had been set, land condemnation proceedings had finished and construction was started. By November 1960, only 9 months later, 13 of the 15 miles had been constructed. Hemp's eyes gleam when he talks about the job, as it takes him back to his early career with the State of Arkansas Highway Department, where he acquired his professional engineer's license in 1940.

Hemp is no stranger to this region, having inspected all our airports in 1955 when he was Deputy Director, Office of Airports in Washington. PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY SAYS--"Career Service A Full Partner"

I welcome the opportunity offered by the Civil Service Journal to direct a message to you.

During the early years of our Nation the President could meet with you personally and discuss program and policy in the easy informality of private conver-

In meeting the grave problems confronting us at home and abroad it is my intention that the Career Civil Service be a full partner. Together we can lead our Nation to new peaks of achievement.

6:00 - 7:00 - Dinner and distribution of special awards to Hui O'Pupule members.






