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## ALFRED DELLIBOVI TO BE NOMINATED URBAN MASS TRANSPORTATION ADMINISTRATOR

President Reagan today announced his intent to nominate Alfred A. DelliBovi to the position of Administrator of the Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA).

DelliBovi, 41, has served since January 1984 as the Deputy Administrator of UMTA, which is an agency of the U.S. Department of Transportation. He would succeed Ralph Stanley, who left the agency in May to rejoin the private sector.

Secretary of Transportation Elizabeth Dole said, "I welcome this nomination of a dedicated public servant who is familiar not only with the day to day operation of UMTA but also with the issues we face today in mass transportation. He can put his knowledge to work immediately, helping to further define the federal role in this important area."

As UMTA's Deputy Administrator, DelliBovi assisted in the disbursement of more than \$3 billion a year in federal funds to the nation's public transit systems. He also had supervisory authority over the agency's ten regional offices and a field staff of nearly 200 persons. Prior to his appointment as Deputy Administrator, DelliBovi served from 1981-84 as UMTA's Mid-Atlantic Regional Administrator in New York.

DelliBovi was elected to four terms in the New York State Assembly. He is a former high school teacher and has also been a successful real estate investor and developer. A native New Yorker, he is a graduate of Fordham College and earned his Master of Public Administration degree from Baruch College (City University of New York).

He is married to the former Elizabeth Power of Belle Harbor, New York, and the couple and their two children reside in Burke, Virginia.

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
