UMTA SELECTS 23 PROPOSALS FOR RESEARCH GRANTS

Twenty-three research proposals from 21 transportation agencies have been selected for future funding by the Department of Transportation in two programs emphasizing new technology and innovative techniques in mass transportation.

The programs are administered by DOT's Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) which selected the 23 proposals from more than 110 submissions. UMTA will provide more than \$6 million in federal funds for these projects, representing 75 percent of the total cost. Participating local agencies will provide the remaining 25 percent.

UMTA Administrator Ralph Stanley commented, "This program is particularly valuable because it encourages new ideas and moves them from the drawing boards and planning departments into revenue service. The proposals selected today are eligible for funding. It is now up to the local operators to submit formal grant applications."
