

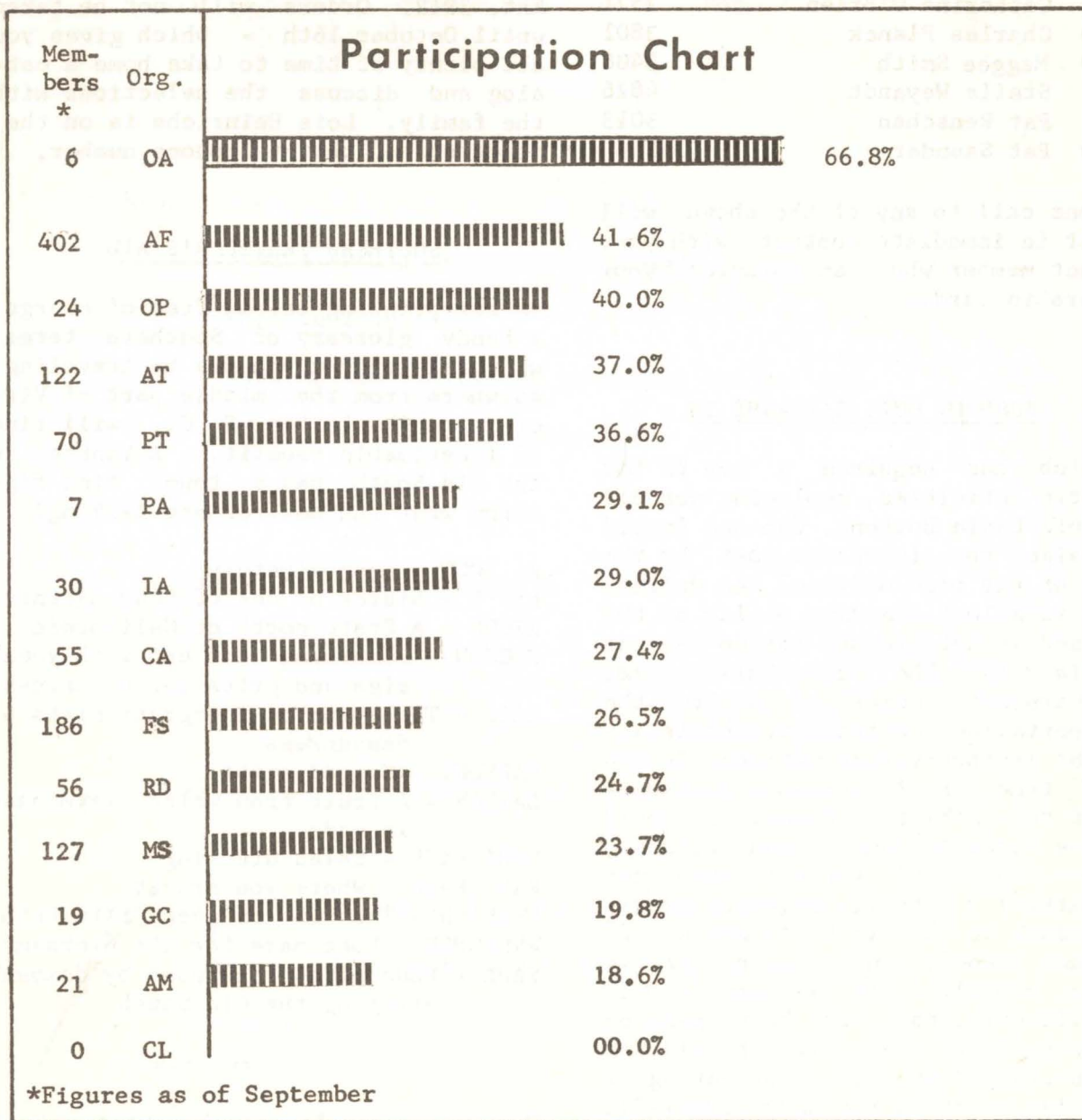

RUSSIAN FOR BEGINNERS

This course is a 10-week program for beginners that will help the student understand the spoken word and read basic-scientific Russian texts. The program will be taught by Mr. Stambul-Sheik, a member of the Aviation Facilities Service and a former professor of the State Schools of Engineering in Europe. This Course will start on Oct. 19, in Room 2022, T-3 Building.

The course gives the student a total of 30 classroom hours of instruction for a very low cost of \$20.00 per student. A basic text will be included in the course price. You will learn to write a short story in Russian, ask directions, and be able to translate Russian texts.
