

London, Paris, Jerusalem..wherever you were in Europe last September, you found some happy FA Clubber sightseeing, shopping, and fully enjoying the delights of European travel the FA Way. 236 FA members traveled to Europe on the chartered flights; some were from as far away as Honolulu. All had one thing in common - they had a marvelous time. Many have written telling us the highlights of their trip and praising the Club for the opportunity. We can't say which of

the trips were the most popular, but for the first time we have employees asking when we will have the itineraries ready and when we will accept reservations.

So you can get an early start planning your vacation, here is what is in the mill to date: The Club will charter another Boeing 707 Jet, leaving Dulles for London August 29 and returning from Paris October 1. 34 days of vacation, requiring 22 days of leave. Price for the trans-Atlantic round trip: Approximately \$210 (based on occupancy of the plane). The 10=Country Tour, Iberian Tour, and Middle East Tour will be repeated, and one new tour added this year. Final itineraries and prices have not been determined but Members will receive flyers when the details are available. Individual tour leaders will answer inquiries but please refrain from calling them during office hours.

CONDUCTED TOURS - Members can take the flight only, or a conducted tour, the price of which includes motorcoach and other transportation in Europe, hotels with private bath, three meals a day usually, tips, taxes, portage and transfers, sightseeing with fees paid and a courier or local guide. These tours have the advantages of known cost, congenial groups, and time for exploration and shopping, plus special features and the luxury of being entirely carefree.

CLUB TOUR - London, Lucern, Rome, Paris and a dozen other large cities - a Gondola ride in Venice - a trip to Sorrento and the ruins of Pompeii; the French and Italian Rivieras, shopping in Paris, and four days in London. A truly memorable trip for the experienced or "first time" tripper. Traveling in your own deluxe motorcoach you can relax and spend your entire time enjoying new experiences in all the historic and scenic places you have read and thought about.
