# DISCOUNT ADMISSION TICKETS

The FA Club can buy daily admission tickets at a discount price to the New York World's Fair by ordering them before February 29, 1964. After that date, these tickets, by mail or at the Fair, will cost \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children (2 thru 12). By ordering now, we get adult tickets for \$1.50 and children's tickets for \$.75. This admission is to enter the Fair ground only. Inside there is much to do and see which is free; however, certain shows, rides, etc. will have an admission fee (there is no discount offer for these).

These tickets will be good any time during the 2-year period of the Fair. If you're going or planning to go (you can sell them if you don't go) get your admission tickets now. Each day you attend, you need an admission ticket. The order form must be returned on or before February 25, 1964.

TRAVEL NEWS ...... EUROPE..... MIDDLE EAST

Early vacation planners are asking for travel plans. Here is the scoop for 1964 on FA Club activities.

CHARTERED PLANES. The Club will have two BOAC jet planes. One leaving Dulles Airport for London August 26 and returning from London on September 30. The other leaves Dulles August 27 and returns October 1. Fare for trans-Atlantic round trip is \$210. No reservations accepted yet. Members will be notified.

CONDUCTED TOURS. Members may take the flight only or take one of the conducted tours offered by the Club. Cost of conducted tours include trans-Atlantic airfare, other transportation in Europe, hotels with private baths, all meals usually, sightseeing, tips, tax, porterage and transfers, services of couriers and local guides and special entertainment. Conducted tours have the advantages of known costs, carefully planned itineraries, professional couriers and guides, congenial groups with mutual interests and the greatest luxury of all-carefree travel.

CHANGE OF PACE TOUR. Leaves August 26 returns September 30, includes England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, Price to be announced later. Last week of this tour is free for you to travel as you please.
