PORTFOLIO PLANNING

On March 17, 1960, five persons were enrolled in the first FA Club Portfolio Planning Course. This is a six-sessions training course on personal investment. Mr. Lawrence Conant, A Registered Investment Adviser, is conducting the series. Its purpose is to acquaint the members with the various kinds of information available to investors and show how such information can be interpreted and used in the development of their own portfolio. The first session ends on April 21, 1960, with a second session to begin on April 28, 1960. The sessions cover the following subjects:

- Session 1: Investment Possibilities; Inflation; Sources of Information.
Session 2: Specific Problem: What Security Would You Select Today To Invest 25% Of Your Available Funds?
Session 3: Evaluation of Possibilities: (a) Selection of "Growth" or "Cyclical" Companies.
Session 4: Evaluation of Possibilities: (b) Consideration of Market Forces -- The "Technical" Factors.
Session 5: Solving Your Individual Investment Problem: Investing 25% Of Your Funds.
Session 6: Final Evaluation of Selections; Plans for Taking Action If Desired.

As this course is being conducted as a workshop, there is a limitation on the size of the group. Anyone interested in a future session of this course should contact J. F. Teunisson, FM-110, by note.

FA CLUB BY-LAWS AMENDED

Due to the fact that many employees of FAA have misinterpreted the meaning of Section 1 of the Club By-Laws, a special meeting of the Board was held for the purpose of amending the By-Laws to clarify the meaning and intent of this Section. In the second sentence the word "members" has been changed to "employees." In the schedule of dues the words "Date of Membership" has been changed to read "Date of Entrance on Duty." As a result of amending Section 1, Section 2 was also amended to delete the word "annual." The amendments are effective April 11, 1960. All members should correct their copies of the By-Laws accordingly. These changes should make it clear that the reduced dues apply only to new employees entering on duty during the periods shown in the schedule.

YOUR FAA BLOOD DONOR PROGRAM

Whom would you contact if you or an immediate member of your family needed whole blood in a hurry? The FAA Blood Donor Program has the answer to this question as well as many others on the Blood Donor Program.


All types of blood can be furnished to FAA employees. Employees do not necessarily have to be donors themselves. The only requirement is that he be an employee of the FAA in the Washington area. The FAA has its own Blood Donor Program and its quota to meet on a monthly basis. This works much like a bank. We get our deposits or donations from employees and likewise employees are entitled to make withdrawals. If you have not contributed to this program and wish to do so, you should contact the Blood Donor Contact Member for your bureau or office. If you do not know the name of this individual, you should call the FAA Blood Donor Chairman on Extension 4051 or 4651 and you will be advised the name of the person in your bureau whom you may contact.

Employees donate blood on each Thursday of the month on a regular scheduled basis. Here are some of the things that you should know about your Blood Donor Program:

1. The program is available to all FAA employees.
2. Blood will be made available by a request to the Chairman of the FAA Blood Donor Program, Extension 4051.
3. Any employee can donate blood if they are healthy and of legal age. (Personnel under 21 years of age must have their parents' permission.)
4. Not only can the immediate family of the donor receive benefits from this program but also members of his immediate family such as mother or father or mother-in-law and father-in-law, or any relative living in the same household who is dependent upon the employee.
5. Your friends or other members of your family may contribute to this program. All they have to do is to advise the Red Cross at the time of the donation that it is for FAA.

The FAA participates in local programs, such as heart surgery at various hospitals, the blood plasma program of the city and emergencies that require special types of blood which are not readily available. The Agency needs you as individuals to participate in this program. You should advise your fellow employees of the benefits of this program and encourage them to participate for the protection of you and your family.

If you desire additional information about the program, you should contact your Blood Donor Contact Member, the Blood Donor Chairman or the District of Columbia Chapter of the American Red Cross, 2025 E Street, N. W., Washington 6, D. C.
