



# OPERATIONAL ERROR CATEGORIZATION



#### HORIZONTAL SEPARATION (miles)

The above graph can be used to determine the category of an operational error. Begin by finding the value of the minimum horizontal separation on the x-axis and then extending a line up to where it will meet a similar line drawn from the minimum vertical separation. In whichever of the three major categories the lines intersect will determine the severity of the error.

#### Some rules of thumb:

You will always have a minor if you have three or more miles, regardless of the amount of vertical separation

The only way to get a major is to have less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile and less than 500 feet.

# FAA TO TEST CONTROLLERS FOR DRUGS

The FAA plans to begin using urinalysis tests soon to check drug abuse by air traffic contollers, pilots and air safety technicians. The agency has already published a formal notice to potential contractors that it will ask for bids before Christmas on a contract to develop and administer a drug testing program. Details, however, have not yet been announced.

The Office of Personnel Management, according to one source, says that "on the issue of safety, there is no question that screening can be done", but it is unlikely that the agency could require all employees to submit to drug testing.

Last October the FAA was prepared to issue a special statement to FAA employees about drug usuage and their responsibility, but twice delayed issuing the statement — once to avoid possible adverse publicity during the presidential campaign, and more recently to avoid interfering with the results of an attitude survey that was recently mailed out to all FAA employees.

# What is the East Coast Plan?

This is a question that many of you are asking and I will attempt to briefly answer it and describe what we believe it means for Washington Center.

Until recently, the plan was mainly designed to improve operations within the northeast corridor through various route, irspace, and procedural changes involving the New York TRACON and the Boston, New York, and Washington Centers. This has recently been expanded to include those facilities associated with flows to Miami, Atlanta, and Chicago. Thus, it appears that this expansion may offer the best means to accomplish some important and meaningful changes that will enable us to expand our traffic handling capacity while possibly reducing complexity in some areas.

Throughout our current planning phase we have attempted to keep the following primary objectives in mind for this facility's operations:

- \* Establish one-way parallel routes between major city pairs that offer the best mileage savings to users. Revised airway/route structure should reflect consideration of the lateral constraints resulting from Conflict Alert.
- \* Develop the necessary modifications to the Washington Metropolitan area's airspace and procedures that is both compatible with the enroute city-pair flows and offers the least restrictive means of handling departures and arrivals. This includes a proposed major change in terminal area concepts which envisions treating all arrivals and departures at the several Washington area airports as one airport, so far as route fixes to/from center airspace is concerned.
- \* Maximize the use of profile descent procedures to reduce pilot/
  controller workload.

- \* Washington Center should manage the south/southwest arrival flows to the New York area and exchange traffic directly with the New York TRACON.
- \* Confine the transitional phase to as few sectors as possible and reduce the multiple functions of sectors where possible.
- \* Confine crossings of <u>major</u> flows to within the terminal airspace (low/slow) or out in the enroute structure <u>after</u> transition is complete.
- \* Realign the sectors/areas along the revised flows in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

As I am sure you will agree, this is a significant undertaking that will require the involvement of nearly everyone in the facility. We are currently awaiting a decision as to whether or not ZDC will directly exchange traffic with the New York TRACON. Phase I of the plan is expected to be implemented in the late Spring of 1985, involving some minor changes in the LGA and EWR routes, while the major portion of the plan is expected to be implemented in 1986.

As soon as it is clear what this facility's mission and tasks are, with regards to the plan, I will inform you and commence regular updates to keep you abreast of significant activities. Of course, we will depend very heavily on your FAB and the supervisors/managers for assistance in developing and implementing the necessary improvements.

I hope that each of you takes a personal interest in contributing input to this plan. To that end, the Airspace & Procedures staff will do its utmost to make information available to you and will be available for considering your suggestions.

#### FACTS

The longest runway is 7 miles in length of which 15,000 is concreted, at Edwards AFB on the bed of Rogers Dry Lake at Muroc, Calif. The whole test center airfield extends over 65 square miles. In an emergency, an auxiliary 12 mile strip is available along the bed of the Dry Lake.

The present 6 runways and 5 terminal buildings of the Dallas/Forth Worth Airport, Tex are planned to be extended to 9 runways and 13 terminals with 260 gates with an ultimate capacity for 150 million passengers annually.

The largest airport teminal is Hartsfield Atlanta International Airport opened Sep.21, 1980, with floor space covering 50.50 acres. It has 138 gates handling 42 million passengers currently but has a capacity for 75 million annually.

The fastest jet aircraft is the USAF Lockheed SR-71 reconnaissance aircraft which first flew on Dec.22, 1964 and attained a speed of 2193.167 mph July 1976. It is reportedly capable of attaining an altitude ceiling of close to 100,000 feet. The SR-71 has a wing span of 55.6 feet, a length of 107.4 feet and weighs 170,000 1b at takeoff. Its reported range is 2,982 miles at Mach 3 at 78,750 feet. At least 30 are believed to have been built.


#### FLIGHT DELAYS LOWER

Flight delays dropped sharply last month because of improved weather, and voluntary changes in airline schedules at six busy airports, the head of the FAA said.

FAA Administrator Donald Engen said the number of flight delays of 15 minutes or more nationwide fell from a high of 48,898 in Oct. to 22,244 last month, a reduction of nearly 55%.

The number of delays in Nov. also represented a 16% drop from the month of Nov. a year ago. Nov. was the first month this year in which there were fewer delays than in the like 1983 month.

#### NEW AIR FORCE TRANSPORTS

The Air Force will be leasing 120 new transport aircraft to replace the aging CT-39s. The Air Force expects to save about 132 million dollars by leasing 40 C-12Fs and 80 C-21As. The C-12Fs are new Super King Air aircraft with large cargo doors and can carry 8 people. The C-21s are Gates Learjets. The Air Force will lease the aircraft for five years with the option to lease for three more years or buy the aircraft. Rent and services on the C-12s for five years will be \$86.6 million. The cost for the C-21s will be \$175.4 million.

March 11 - May 3, 1985 Mondays and Wednesdays


College Math for Aviation I History of Aviation
