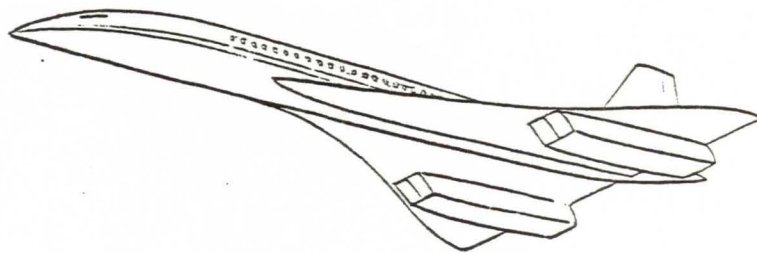

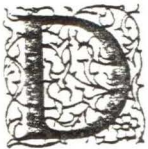

CONTROLLER CHAIRS- On July 17, 1984 Administrator Engen wrote a letter to Ray Kline, acting administrator of GSA requesting the controller chair replacement program be expedited, with priority. Mr. Engen stated, "We request your help in establishing a priority status for the controller chair replacement program. In addition, sufficient effort should be exerted to hold the program to a schedule so that our maintenance efforts can be tailored to cover the period from now through final delivery of the new chairs. This program must be kept moving forward. If problems develop, they must be overcome without delay." GSA has informed the FAA that solicitation for bids on this project was advertised on July 24th and has promised delivery would begin by February 1985. It is gratifying to know the administrator is aware of problems such as this and is personally doing something about it.

A high-level task force on federal employee morale has suggested that President Reagan use his weekly radio show to deliver a pep talk for the civil service.

Under the proposal, Reagan would brag about the contributions of the federal work force he usually loves to skewer.

The idea — discussed before Reagan's off-the-air "joke" about nuking the Russians — got a warm reception but no White House commitment, according to sources.

The group also is drafting a presidential directive that would tell department and agency officials to cooperate with federal employee organizations and to do more to recognize worker accomplishments.

Underlying these actions, sources said, is the consensus expressed at a recent task force meeting: As morale goes, so goes productivity.



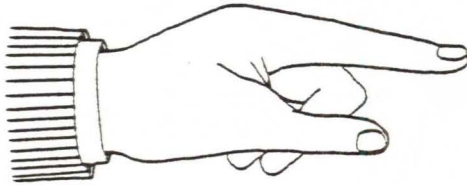

ANDREW (ANDY) LEWIS passed away on Thursday, September 20. Andy was the cartographer at Washington Center until his retirement in January 1981.

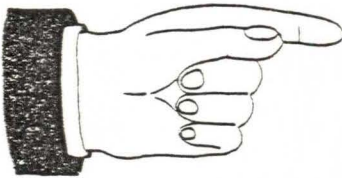
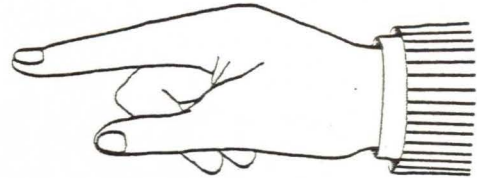


ZDC-510: PLANS & PROGRAMS

EDWIN McVAY has been selected to fill the position of Airspace & Procedures Specialist.



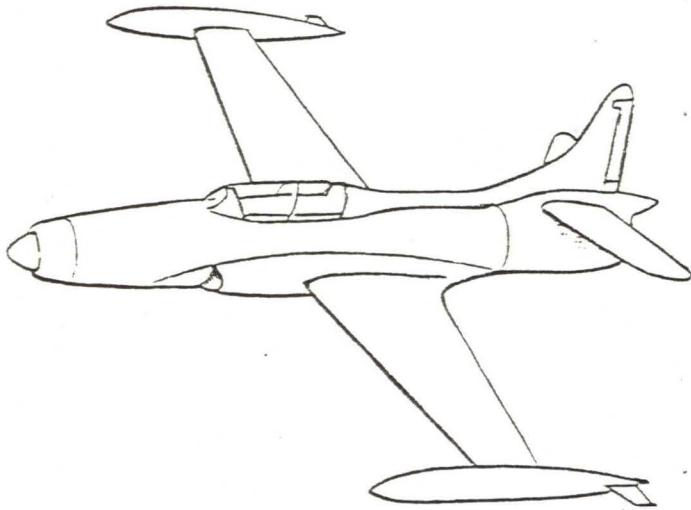

Remember, this is EVERYONE'S coupon box. You may use the coupons even if you don't remember to bring us your coupons.

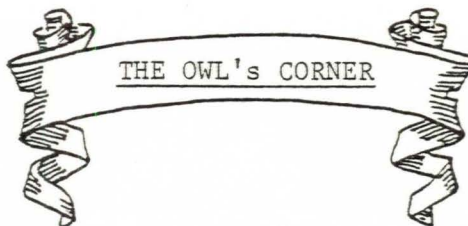

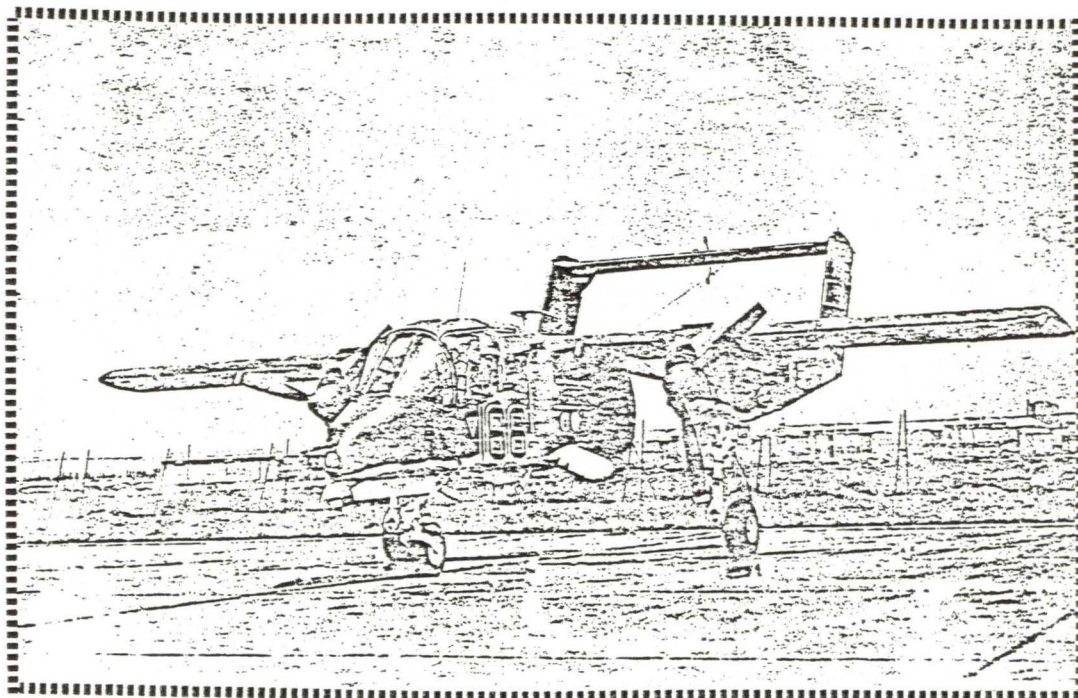
