## REDUCED PRICE TRANSPO 72 TICKETS NOW ON SALE

Special TRANSPO 72 tickets priced at \$2.00 per adult and \$0.50 per child (12 and under) are now on sale at all Federal Credit Unions and the Pentagon Ticket Office. Advance tickets are also available at the main and branch offices of the following banks: National Bank of Washington, National Savings and Trust Co., Riggs National Bank, United Bank of Virginia, United Bank of Virginia-People National Bank, First Citizens National Bank, First & Merchants National Bank, First National Bank of Washington, and the Suburban Trust Co.

There will be parking for 50,000 cars during the May 27 - June 4 Exposition at a charge of \$1.00 per car. The 600-bus parking area will cost \$5.00 per bus. There will be 13 spectacular air shows during TRANSPO 72 and grandstand seats are priced at \$2.00 per person, (purchased at site only). Sponsored youth groups, such as the Boy and Girl Scouts, church and school groups, may purchase a special ticket priced at \$0.50 per person.

Advance and other tickets may be purchased by mail. Simply send a check or money order made payable to "Treasurer of the United States--TRANSPO 72" (and either include a stamped self-addressed envelope or add \$0.25) to TRANSPO 72 TICKETS, Department of Transportation, 800 Independence Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20591.

The more than 400 exhibits and other demonstrations will be in operation from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., on May 27, 28, and 29; and June 3 and 4, 1972. These

are the weekend programs. During the weekdays of May 30 and 31, and June 1 and 2, the operating hours are from 12:00 noon until 6:00 p.m.

There are four new traffic entrances to Dulles specifically developed for TRANSPO 72 and a regional traffic control program involving helicopters, State Troopers and other law enforcement groups all tied together by radio will expedite the traffic flow of thousands of visitors expected daily.

## COURTESY TO FELLOW DOT EMPLOYEES IN GARAGE AREAS

With the few exceptions of official visitors, the users of the DOT parking facilities are your fellow workers. Whether they drive a clunker or a Cad, they're probably just as concerned about their car as you are about yours. A little care in driving, parking, opening doors, etc., will reduce the scrapes and bumps that occur, especially with densely stacked parking in both FOB-10A and Headquarters Building. Should you damage another vehicle in the parking area -- despite your efforts at caution -- at least have the courtesy to leave a note on their windshield identifying yourself and report the incident to the parking attendent. The garage rules, issued to you with your permit, requested that you follow this procedure. Please review these rules from time to time for the benefit of us all.

A new law passed by Congress makes it possible for every citizen to vote for President and Vice President, regardless of the length of residence in a particular State or the District of Columbia, or one's location in the world at election time. The two principal features of the new law are:

Length of residence requirements for voting in Presidential elections have been abolished. Previously many States required that a person be a resident of the State for a certain period of time to qualify to register and vote in Presidential elections. Furthermore, in some States there was also a <u>local</u> residence requirement which disqualified those who had recently moved from one part of a State to another. All such requirements have been abolished with respect to Presidential elections.

States may still close voter registration in Presidential elections 30 days prior to the election although they may, and many do, keep registration open longer than this. If you move into a State after its registration has closed you may vote in person or by absentee ballot in the State in which you had previously lived, if you were registered to vote in that State, and for absentee voting, if you satisfy the absentee voting requirement of that State. Absentee voting requires a timely and proper application for an absentee ballot.

If you are moving and know that you will arrive in your new State of residence after its closing date for registrations, you can register to vote in the State you are leaving prior to your departure. If you wish to vote by absentee ballot to avoid having to return on election day, you should find out about that State's absentee ballot requirements. If you are unsure of the closing date in the State to which you are moving, are moving less than 30 days before election day, and wish to be sure you are eligible to vote, you should register in the State you are leaving. If you arrive in the new State prior to its closing date for registration you can vote only at your new place of residence rather than your old residence, and must of course, register in your new State in order to do so. There is no prohibition against registering in two States (voting in two States is prohibited).

Absentee registration and voting requirement. Each State is required to have an absentee registration procedure. If you will be away from your State of residence during the registration period, you should utilize this procedure to register.

Each State is also required to have an absentee balloting procedure for Presidential elections. If you are a registered voter and will be absent from your election district on election day, you should apply for an absentee ballot. Normally, an absentee ballot must be applied for at least seven days before election day. A State may, if it wishes, extend this application period closer to the election, but it cannot end sooner than seven days prior to election day. You must return the ballot to the appropriate election official not later than the time of the closing of the polls on election day.
