CONGRESS ACTS ON FAA BILLS

Las Vegas and Reno Airway Facilities Sectors, via a joint venture, recently completed updating grounding systems for VORTAC and RCAG sites preparatory to receipt of second generation systems. Basically, the effort consisted of hole drilling and ground rod emplacement (nominally nine at each site) at 19 facilities throughout Nevada whose terrain conditions require greater than normal preparation to establish acceptable electrical grounding.

Jack Neely of Reno and Woody Harkcom of Las Vegas, using a rented drilling rig from Lovelock, Nevada, hit the road on April 26 and proceeded site-to-site throughout the state until completion of the last applicable site on May 21. Despite a variety of machinery and site access difficulties, this team, with appropriate assistance from site personnel, accomplished a major effort at a significant cost savings to the agency.

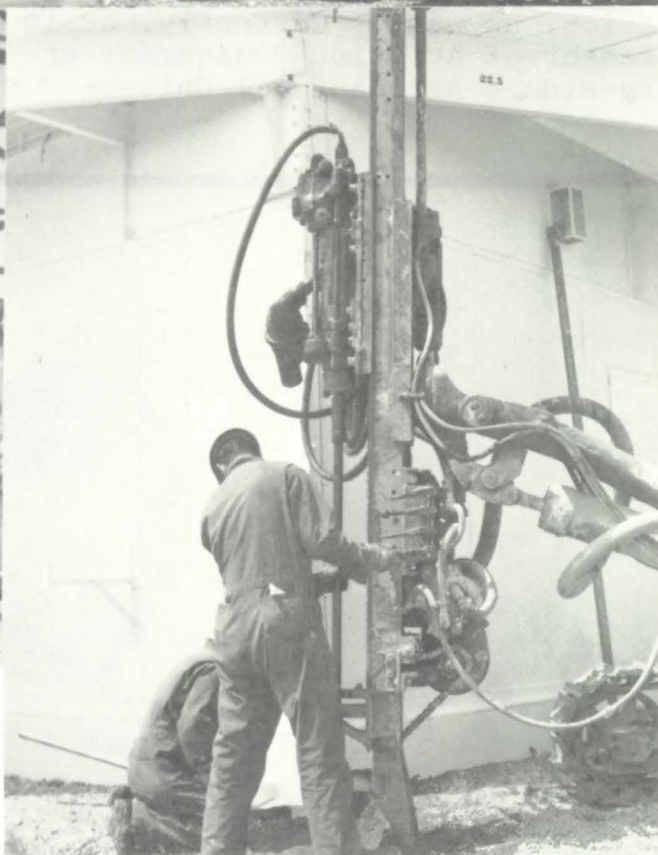
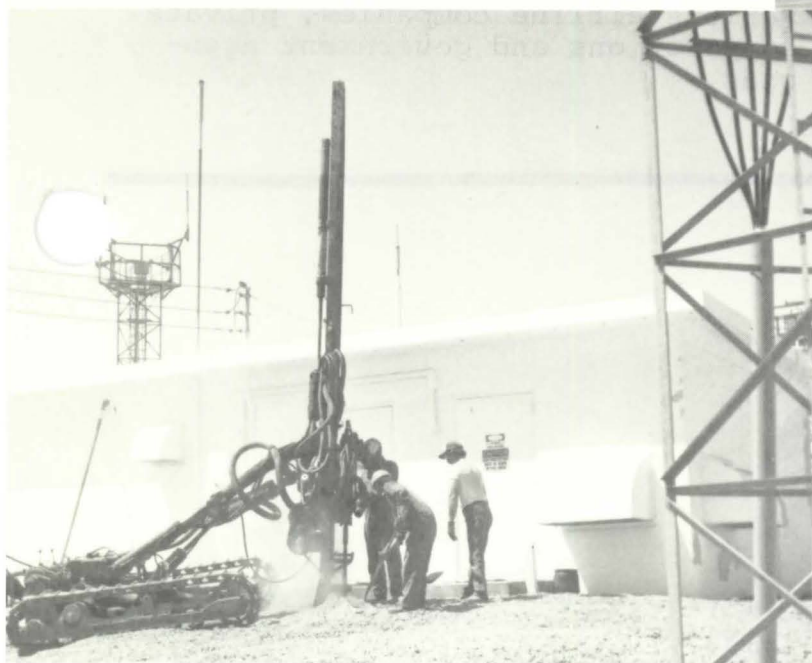
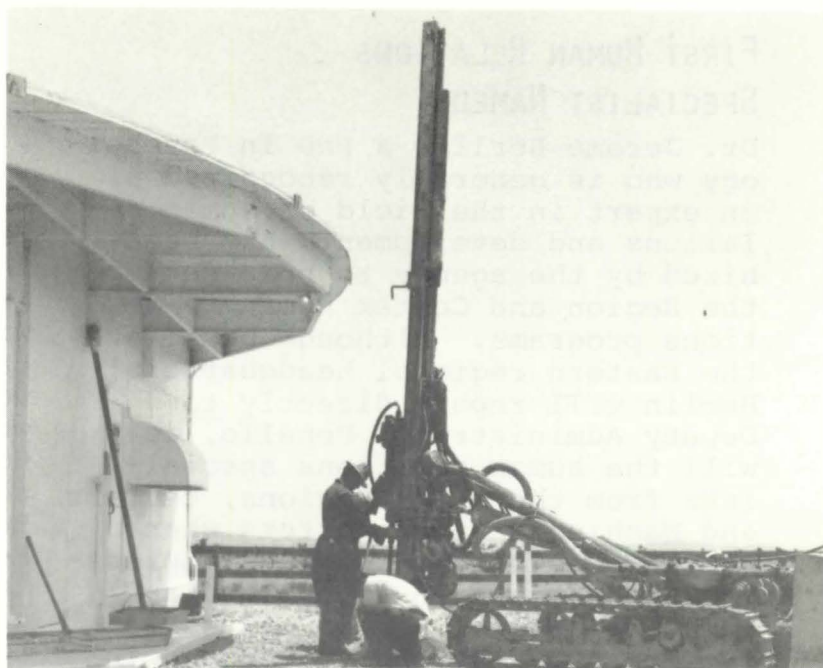

An FAA supplemental money bill that the Administrator says could eliminate the need for furloughs has cleared its first hurdle in the House of Representatives. The measure, which was passed by the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, next must be endorsed by the full committee and then approved by a majority of House members in a floor vote. Senate passage also is required. The Administrator said, "My personal confidence is very high that we'll be able to get by without a furlough" but added that this was his opinion and "is not a commitment or guarantee." In other Congressional action, the Senate overwhelmingly approved an amendment that would fund airport and airway system development over the next six years. Airport aid funding was pegged at \$4.789 billion over that period. Similar legislation has cleared committee in the House and is awaiting a floor vote. Concerning pay legislation for controllers and others involved in the operations and maintenance of the air traffic control system, the Senate already has passed a version of the Administration's proposal but action still is pending in the House. The Administrator said, "We haven't backed off" and added that DOT/FAA will continue to press for passage.

FIRST HUMAN RELATIONS SPECIALIST NAMED

Dr. Jerome Berlin, a PhD in Psychology who is generally recognized as an expert in the field of human relations and development, has been hired by the agency to help set up the Region and Center human relations programs. Although based at the Eastern regional headquarters, Berlin will report directly to Deputy Administrator Fenello, as will the human relations specialists from the other regions, centers and Washington headquarters when they are selected. Besides impressive credentials in Psychology and human relations, Berlin brings to the FAA job a strong background in aviation, as well. Currently, he is Professor of Aviation Management at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical Univer-

sity and was heavily involved in pilot training research at Embry-Riddle under contract with the FAA's Technical Center. Moreover, from 1971-1978, Berlin served with the Israeli Air Force as Chief, Training Research and Development, with the rank of Lt. Colonel. In the 1960s, he founded a Human Development Institute in Atlanta, which he later sold to Bell and Howell Co. and then joined the company as Vice President of its Behavioral Science Division. Berlin has written extensively in the field of psychology, human behavior and communications, and has served as a consultant for various airline companies, private corporations and government agencies.

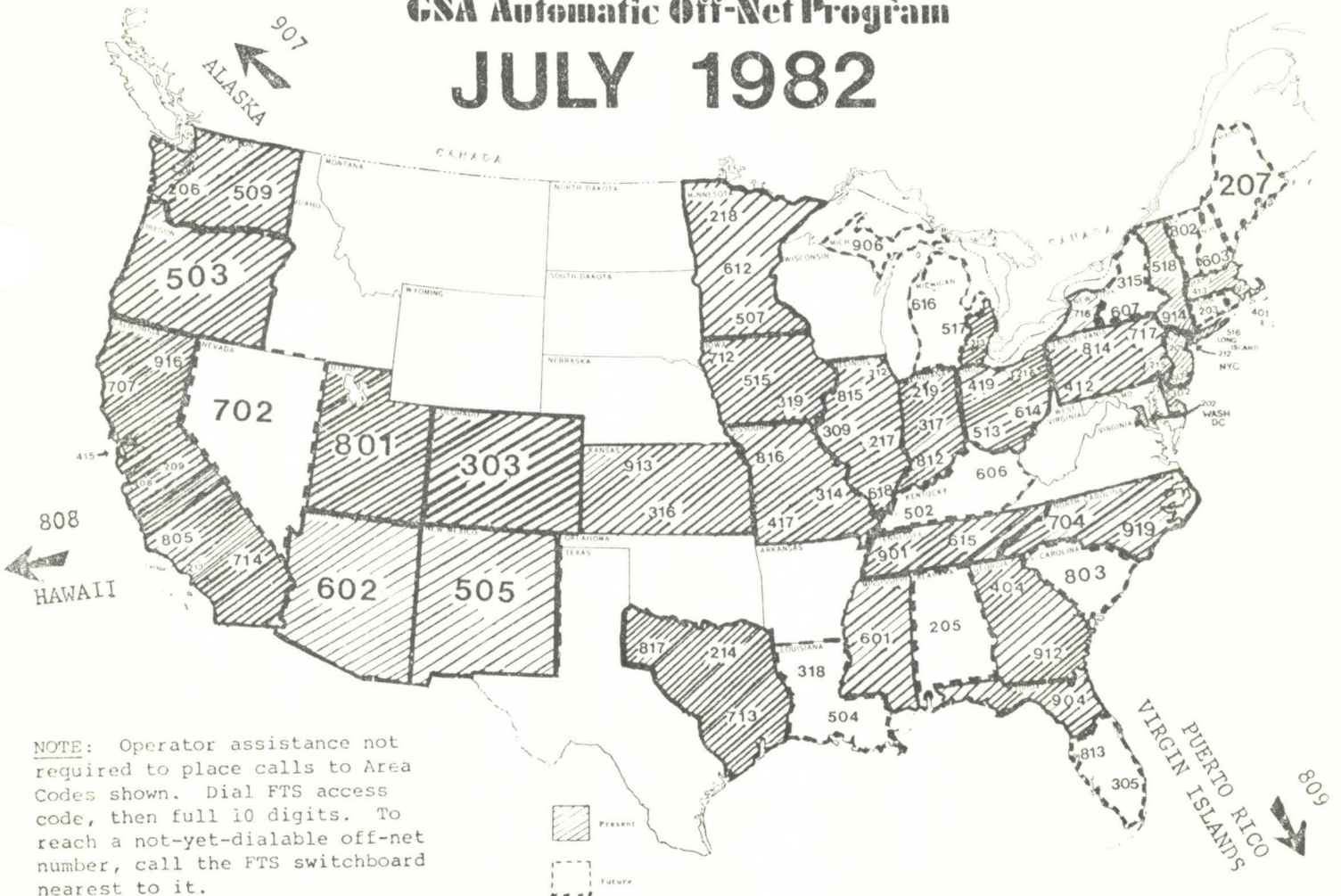

The FAA Women's Club of Hawaii was organized nine years ago under the guidance of Mrs. Jack Webb, wife of the then Director of the Pacific-Asia Region and, through the years, has been an instrument for social and philanthropic activities. Membership was open to all FAA employed women, wives of employees, wives of retirees and wives of deceased employees. Members paid annual dues of ten dollars and met monthly, scheduling additional meetings and functions at their discretion. Their monthly meetings were devoted to lectures on interesting, educational and cultural matters; tours of historical and interesting places; arts and craft shows; and fund-raising activities. Twice each year they sponsored all-FAA social functions.

Most of the proceeds from the club's fund-raising efforts were channeled through the Hawaii Aerospace Education Association and the Education Through Aviation Association, for scholarships to students for aviation education, and, in the form of workshops, to teachers who motivated such students to continue their education. Smaller amounts were given to various community health and welfare organizations. Over the years, a total of \$11,500 was contributed.
