



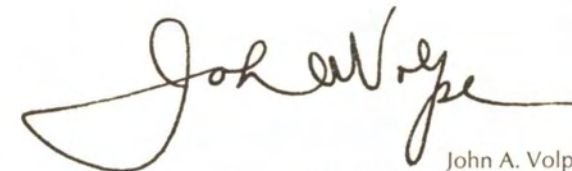

secretary's awards

for distinguished military service

The Secretary of Transportation is authorized to award military decorations to officers and enlisted personnel of the Coast Guard under similar criteria as that prescribed by the Secretaries of the Army, Navy, and Air Force for their respective military personnel. The Secretary may also present certain foreign decorations to members of the Coast Guard awarded by countries friendly to the United States. Today, nine Coast Guard military members are being recognized, including one posthumously, for extraordinary achievement, heroism, and meritorious service in many parts of the world. A listing appears at the end of this section indicating other coast guardsmen who have been decorated for heroism or distinguished service in the past year.

For extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight on the night of 4 March 1971 as pilot of Coast Guard HH-3F 1470 helicopter engaged in assisting the distressed fishing vessel GANNET located 68 miles southeast of Nantucket Island, Massachusetts.

Despite Petty Officer DUKE's courageous efforts, he was unable to return to safety as both men were lost in the unyielding sea.

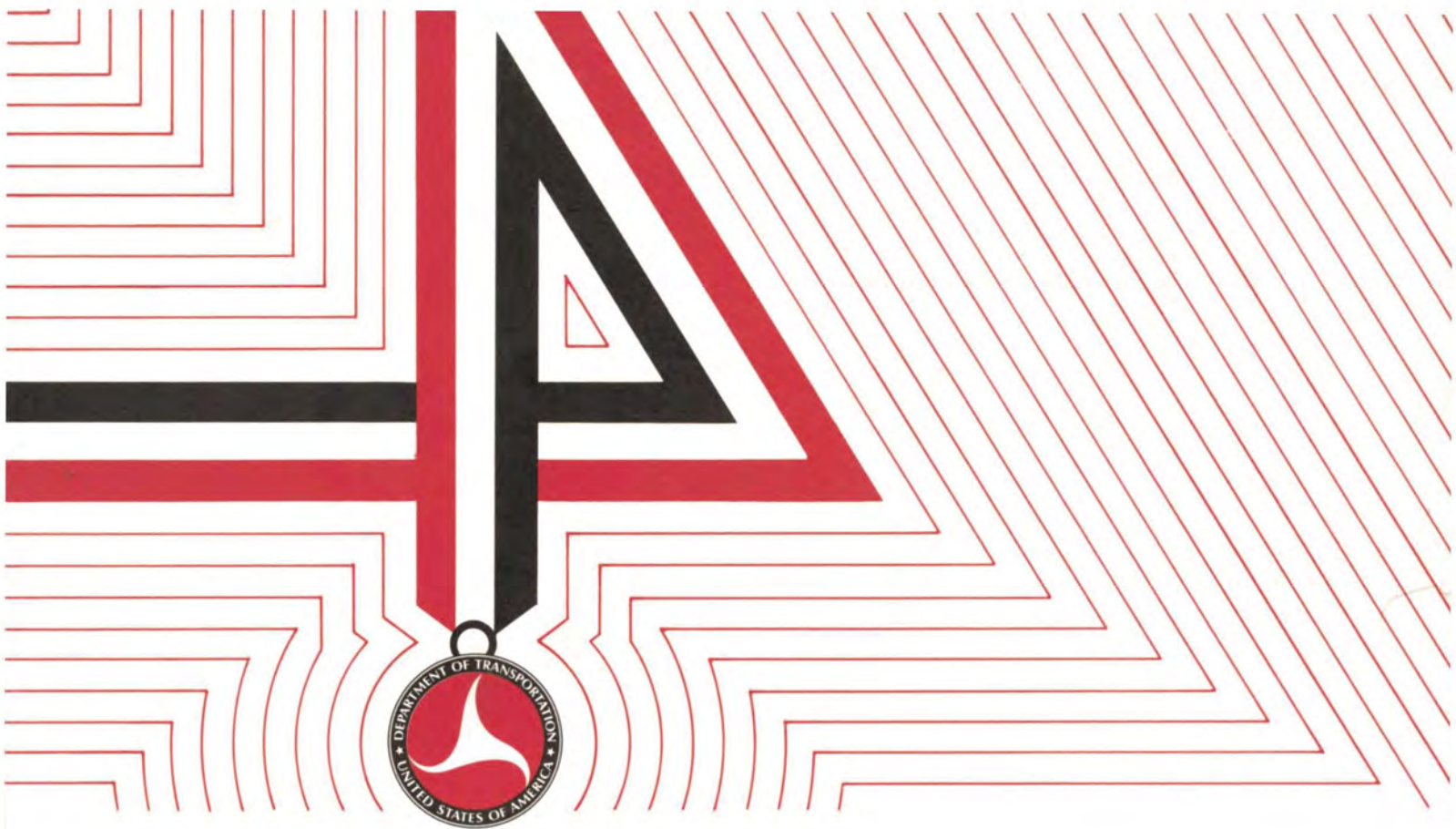
