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1.INTRODUCTION

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1.1 INTRODUCTION TO AIRS

THE AIRPORT INFORMATION RETRIEVAL SYSTEM (AIRS) IS Δ PROTOTYPE COMPUTER PROGRAM BASED UPON AIRPORT TRAFFIC INFORMATION AND DESIGNED FOR USE BY THE FAA'S CENTRAL FLOW CONTROL FACILITY. THE MONTHLY OFFICIAL AIRLINE GUIDE CONSTITUTES THE DATA BASE, WHICH IS ENHANCED BY REAL TIME ENTRY OF FLIGHT SCHEDULE UPDATES. THE ADDITION OF AIRPORT OPERATIONAL DATA, SUCH AS LANDING CAPACITY ESTIMATES, DELAYS, AND GENERAL AVIATION ESTIMATES AS DEPARTURE PERCENTAGE OF SCHEDULED TRAFFIC, ENABLE AIRS TO PREDICT DEMAND, LANDING DELAYS, AND AIR HOLD COUNTS IN THE AIRS ALSO PERFORMS THE COMPUTATION TERMINAL AREAS. SUPPORTING ADVANCED FLOW CONTROL PROCEDURES (AFCP) AND QUOTA FLOW CONTROL PROCEDURES (QFLOW). IN SUPPORT OF THESE FLOW CONTROL PROCEDURES AIRS PRODUCES EITHER ALLOCATION OR QUOTA TABLES.

A detailed understanding of the AIRS design and data processing capabilities can be obtained from the publication, "Airport Information Retrieval System (AIRS), System Design", by Manuel F. Medeiros and Julie Sussman, July 1973, FAA-RD-73-77.

NOTE!

It is important to note for operational purposes, that the flight data obtained monthly from the R.H.Donnelley's Official Airline Guide tape has been altered when entered into the new data base once a month. Specifically, all gate arrival times have been adjusted to 10 minutes earlier to reflect the approximate wheels-down arrival time. For extremely short duration flights, the adjustment never shortens flight times below 10 minutes. The daily entry of flight schedules by the Airport Reservation Office is not automatically adjusted. The user may alter each flight schedule entry as desired to reflect wheels-down arrival times.

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1.2 INTRODUCTION TO THIS GUIDE

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THIS DOCUMENT PRESENTS THE OPERATIONAL FEATURES AND THE PROCEDURES REQUIRED TO USE AIRS. THE DOCUMENT IS DESIGNED AS A USER'S REFERENCE MANUAL. ALTHOUGH IT IS NOT A TRAINING MANUAL, IT CONTAINS SUFFICIENT INFORMATION TO ALLOW A PERSON UNFAMILIAR WITH AIRS TO USE AIRS.

CHAPTER 2 CONCENTRATES ON THE MECHANICS OF WORKING WITH TIME-SHARING COMPUTER AND THE PROCEDURES FOR THE ACTIVITIES. CHAPTER 3 CONTROLLING THE COMPUTER'S INTRODUCES THE AIRPORT DEMAND REQUEST, WHICH PRODUCES TABULATIONS OF AIRPORT TRAFFIC DEMAND TO SUIT SPECIFIC NEEDS. FURTHER INFORMATION ON THESE TRAFFIC DEMANDS IS POSSIBLE AS EXPLAINED IN CHAPTER 4 (LISTING FLIGHTS) AND CHAPTER 5 (DRAWING PLOTS). CHAPTER 6 PRESENTS THE MEANS OF PRODUCING AIRPORT ARRIVAL DELAY PREDICTIONS. CHAPTERS 7,8, AND 9 CONCENTRATE ON REAL TIME ENTRY OF: AIRPORT LANDING CAPACITY ESTIMATES, FACTORS TO COMPENSATE FOR GENERAL AVIATION DEMAND, AND AIRPORT DEPARTURE DELAY INFORMATION. THE AIRPORT FLOW CONTROL COMPUTATIONS CAN BE ACTIVATED AS DISCUSSED IN CHAPTER 10. UPDATING FLIGHT SCHEDULES AND ADDING NEW FLIGHTS ARE EXPLAINED IN CHAPTER 11, AND CHAPTER 12 CLOSES THE TEXT WITH COMMENT AND MESSAGE INFORMATION. APPENDICES INCLUDE A GLOSSARY OF TERMS AND LISTS OF AIRPORT CODES BY ARTCC, AIRPORT CODES BY FOREIGN GROUPINGS, AND AIRCRAFT CODES BY EQUIPMENT TYPE. THE OFFICIAL AIRLINE GUIDE SHOULD BE USED AS A REFERENCE FOR AIRLINE CODES, AIRCRAFT CODES, AND CITY/AIRPORT CODES. THE UNFAMILIAR USER SHOULD BE ABLE TO BEGIN USING AIRS AFTER READING CHAPTER 2 AND THE FIRST THREE PAGES OF CHAPTER 3.

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2. HOW TO OPERATE THE COMPUTER

2.1 INTRODUCTION

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AIRS IS IMPLEMENTED ON A TIME-SHARED COMPUTER AT THE FIRST DATA CORPORATION IN WALTHAM, MASS. CONNECTION TO THIS COMPUTER IS ACCOMPLISHED THROUGH USE OF A TELETYPE DEVICE OR A DISPLAY TERMINAL SUCH AS THE CONOGRAPH. CONNECTING (LOGGING IN) IS DIFFERENT FOR THESE TWO DEVICES, AS ARE THE KEYBOARDS. SECTION 2.2 IS DEVOTED TO TELETYPE DEVICES AND IS SUBDIVIDED INTO THE CONNECTING OPERATIONS AND THE CONTROLLING OPERATIONS. SECTION 2.3 IS SIMILARLY STRUCTURED FOR THE DISPLAY TERMINAL. SECTION 2.4 IS CONCERNED WITH TROUBLE-SHOOTING ACTIVITIES AND IS APPLICABLE FOR ALL DEVICES. LASTLY, 2.5 DISCUSSES SOME OF THE BASICS IN TALKING TO AIRS. 2.2 TELETYPE DEVICES LOGGING IN: TURN TELETYPE POWER ON SET SWITCH TO FULL DUPLEX DIAL ONE OF THESE NUMBERS: 110 BAUD TELETYPE (E.G. LOGGING OUT:

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TO EXIT FROM AIRS, TYPE 'QUIT'. WHEN A '.' IS TYPED IN THE LEFT MARGIN, TYPE 'K'.

YOU CAN NOW HANG UP THE TELEPHONE AND TURN OFF THE TELETYPE POWER.

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RUNNING AIRS:

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Type 'RUN AIRS'

You have now started the AIRS program. Wait for the "REQUEST=" before entering your commands.

If at any subsequent time a '.' is typed at the left margin, you have exited the AIRS program (see section 2.4, 'TROUBLESHOOTING').

When the screen has been filled, a new page is started by typing the "HOME" key. Then type 'AL' (i.e. control 'L'; depress both the control key and the 'L' key). Although the 'REQUEST=' message might have been erased in starting a new page, the computer is still waiting for your next command. If the computer was in the middle of typing, it will pick up where it left off and continue typing.

LOGGING OUT:

To exit from AIRS, type 'QUIT'.

When a '.' is typed in the left margin, type 'K'.

Wait for the computer to acknowledge logging off and then you can hang up the telephone and turn off the terminal power.

If you are going to use the terminal again in the next couple of hours or so, don't turn it off; instead just put it in local mode by hitting the 'LOCAL' button.

TO OBTAIN HARD COPIES:

Wait until the page you want to copy is finished by the computer, since any computer data sent while a copy is being made will be lost.

When ready for a copy, press 'COPY' button on hard copy unit front panel. A copy of data on the display (small green screen) will be delivered in about 12 seconds.

The hard copy unit is susceptible to paper jams. Be sure to read section 2.4, 'TROUBLESHOOTING'.

TO LOAD/UNLOAD CASSETTE TAPES:

Find the tape cassette you want, hold it with the side you want up (so you can read the label). Rotate the tape cassette until the exposed tape is at your right. Face the magnetic tape unit. Make sure there is no tape loaded in the magnetic tape unit (if so, see unload procedure). If not, insert the cassette into the slot provided. Push it all the way in and, holding it in place, press sharply down. The tape should snap into place. Press the "REWIND" button and wait until the "REWIND" light starts to blink. Tape is now ready to use.

To unload, press black "EJECT" button. Tape cassette should pop partially out of magnetic tape unit. If any trouble, see section 2.4, "TROUBLESHOOTING".

TO USE THE SONIC POINTER TABLET:

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The sonic tablet is called a graf/pen. It consists of the plexiglass square with two raised, buff-colored borders on the top and left, a special ballpoint pen, and connections to the Conograph. When using the graf/pen, the plexiglass should have paper over it, since the pen will mar the surface. When the pen is pressed down, a signal (something like a "CLICK" or "BUZZ" sound) is generated which lets the Conograph track the position of the pen. Tracking of the pen will not happen, however, unless in conjunction with running programs on the computer which activate and use the At the time the tablet is operation. graf/pen The pen activated, the keyboard will be deactivated. position can then be tracked. In tracking the pen, the Conograph displays a cursor (dotted cross) the in relative position as if the tablet were overlayed on the display screen. Moving the cursor involves briefly depressing the pen (it will buzz or click) the at desired tablet positions and then the adjusted cursor position will follow. The screen cursor is faint on the small screen, but easy to see on the TV system (with the "CURSOR" switch of the scan converter in the "ON" position).

When the position desired is attained, the information is transferred to the computer by hitting the "SEND" button at the upper, left of the graf/pen tablet. The computer will then take appropriate action.

2.4 TROUBLESHOOTING

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This section is divided into categories of trouble:

The most common difficulty - typing errors.

Deliberate program interruption techniques to cope with command errors.

Troubles associated with the display equipment.

Troubles in connecting to the computer or unscheduled disconnects.

AIRS program malfunctions.

2.4.1 TYPING ERRORS

It is possible to correct typing mistakes within the current line being typed. Such correction is permitted at all phases of computer operation from log in to log out.

- RUBOUT or DEL: The rubout or delete key is used to delete a single character just typed. The key may be used repetitively to delete more than one character. The computer echoes the deleted character(s) within left slashes "\".
- #U: The control U (i.e. depress both the 'CONTROL' key and the 'U' key) is used to delete an entire line. It must be issued before a carriage return is typed. A confirming control U is printed and the carriage is returned to the left margin by the computer.

After hitting RUBOUT, DEL or 4U, continue typing just as though the error had not occurred; i.e. do not type a space or carriage return.

2.4.2 COMMAND ERRORS

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In some instances, you may wish to abandon an operation already in progress. There are two ways to stop a command once the computer receives its carriage return confirmation:

- f0: Control 0 (i.e. depress both the 'CONTROL' key and the '0' key) suppresses the teletype output. The program continues to run until the next input request. In AIRS, entry of the next request (command) should begin immediately after the '40' (i.e. no 'REQUEST=' will be typed).

If the Conograph was plotting when you hit ACAC, you must not continue (i.e. do not type "CONT"). Instead you must do the following: Press "MACHINE CHECK". Press "HOME". Type "TTY PAGE 38".

NOTE: if typing does not appear on screen, type blind (i.e. there will be no visible display of what you are typing): "TTY ECHO" and "AL" (i.e. control "L"). You should then get "." and must restart AIRS (i.e. type "RUN AIRS").

OPTIONS FOLLOWING ACAC:

- 'RUN AIRS'-restarts a fresh copy of the program and awaits your first command.
- 'CONT'-continues the program as if the two control C's had never been typed (unless AIRS was in the middle of plotting, as discussed above). This makes it possible to check if the computer is working properly or the teletype (or display) is still connected. (I.e. ACAC should produce a '.' in the left margin if all is well; if it is, then 'CONT' resumes program operation).

'K'-kills the current computer connection.

2.4.3 CONOGRAPH TROUBLE

The Conograph can signal most troubles with the colored lights on the keyboard. Red lights are serious, yellow lights are less serious, and white lights just show status. The lights may be tested by pushing "WAIT". Most of the indicator lights are function switches and their meanings are as follows:

SIGNAL LIGHTS

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- NAME ON BUTTON MEANING OF LIGHT AND/OR FUNCTION SWITCH
- POWER ON
- On/off Function: Lighted is on
- PARITY 0 Not Used
- PARITY 1
 - Not Used
- KBD DISABLED

Lighted means no input typing by the keyboard is received. Cleared by MACHINE CHECK or by computer program.

LOCAL

TTY

Local/Remote function, determines whether Conograph actions are all self-contained or include computer interaction. Lighted indicates local mode, off means computer controlled.

Controls whether terminal acts like a standard teletype or like a full upper lowercase terminal. Lighted is TTY mode (AIRS operating mode).

PARITY ERROR

Light comes on when Conograph detects garbled data from computer. Push switch to clear light and continue. RCVR DISABLED

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Means no input from computer will be accepted. All computer data sent to Conograph while this light is on is lost. Pressing MACHINE CHECK clears this disabled condition.

MACHINE CHECK

Light means data was received that wasn't garbled but it was an incorrect transmission and didn't make sense. This switch clears entire Conograph. It also terminates graphics operations so if AIRS was plotting during the MACHINE CHECK problem, continuation of the plot is impossible. The user should type: "40" or "INT" Button and a carriage return. AIRS should then return to the previous pre-plot status.

WAIT

Light is on briefly when computer is sending data. It freezes on if bad input occurs - cleared by MACHINE CHECK. Switch lights every light to see if they are all working.

INT

Same as typing "40" (i.e. control "0", not zero)

COMMON PROBLEMS

The following are the most common problems and their remedies. Anything else will require help:

1. Terminal Freezes. No trouble indicating lights come on, but computer program won't respond.

Step 1

Usual cause is that the computer thinks it is at the bottom of the screen. Hit "HOME" key and " $^{L"}$ (i.e. control "L"). If this works, continue with what you were doing. If not, try step 2.

Step 2

Put terminal in local mode (i.e. press "LOCAL" button, which should light). Hit MACHINE CHECK. Test type a few letters. If this doesn't work, the Conograph is broken; call for repairs. If it does work, hit "HOME" key, "LOCAL" button, "AL", "ACAC" (i.e. two control "C"'s), and watch for ".". If none appears, the computer is down. Wait for 15 minutes and login again.

2. "RCVR DISABLED" light comes on or "WAIT" light comes on and does not go off. This means the unit has gone into a mode which will require AIRS program termination. Proceed as follows:

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Put Conograph into local mode (i.e. press "LOCAL" button), hit "MACHINE CHECK", hit "HOME" and hit "LOCAL" again. Then type "ACAC", and "AL". You may need to erase again (i.e. press "HOME" key). At that time, another "AC" should give you a dot. Then type "TTY PAGE 38"; if no typing appears on screen, but you get another dot, type "TTY ECHO". If no dot appears, hit "HOME", then "AL". Try "AC" again to see if it produces the "." response. At this point if a "." was produced, you may continue (i.e. type "CONT") the AIRS processing if it was not a graph request. Otherwise, you must restart AIRS (i.e. type "RUN AIRS").

- 3. "KBD DISABLED" light comes on when it was not expected. Use procedure for 2, except that the user, after hitting "LOCAL" a second time types: "ACAC", "TTY PAGE 38", "TTY ECHO", "HOME", and "AL." This procedure assures that the Conograph is in the typing mode.
- 4. PARITY ERROR or MACHINE CHECK light comes on. In the case of parity error, repeated occurrences indicate a bad telephone line. Hang up and redial as soon as possible. Naturally, parity errors may cause other Conograph error conditions. Parity errors can be cleared by "MACHINE CHECK."

The MACHINE CHECK light does not have to be cleared for some AIRS operations. Certain tape cassette operations and minor errors in the data stream reception will light "MACHINE CHECK" without causing any other problem. In such cases, ignore it, the computer will eventually turn it off. If it does cause trouble, follow the procedure for part 2. 5. Hard Copy Paper Jams. There are three types of paper jams in the hard copy unit. Clearing them requires that you be shown previously how to do it. In the first type, the paper jams where it feeds into the unit. In the second, it jams in the delivery (output) slot. Clearing either one requires that the unit be opened. BE CAREFUL-IT IS HOT INSIDE. The third type of jam is a cutter jam, where the copy paper continuously feeds from the unit.

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In case of the slot jam, you should lift out the black wooden guide immediately inside and above the slot and pull out the paper. Be sure you replace the guide properly or you will have jam after jam.

In cases where the feed-in jam occurs, the paper will probably be pulled partly into the feed rollers (i.e. the rolls closest to the paper supply canister). Lift the processor cover (clearly labeled) and pull the jammed copy back out of the feed rollers. You may have to cycle the unit (i.e. press the "COPY" button) to get all the paper out.

The last type of jam is a cutter jam. In this case, the unit fails to cut off the paper being fed for your copy. The result is a continuous feed of paper. Usually, the cutter will cycle and terminate the paper flow if you just hit the "COPY" button again. If it does not, turn off the unit and call for repair service.

2.4.4 CONNECTION DIFFICULTIES

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THERE ARE TWO KINDS OF CONNECTION PROBLEMS: NOT BEING ABLE TO PROPERLY CONNECT TO THE COMPUTER AND BEING DISCONNECTED PREMATURELY.

NOT ABLE TO CONNECT

- IF YOU DO NOT GET THE HIGH FREQUENCY TONE AFTER DIALING, EITHER THE LOCAL NUMBER IS OUT OF ORDER OR THE COMPUTER IS DOWN. TRY THE OTHER LOCAL OR LONG DISTANCE NUMBER TO SEE IF THE COMPUTER IS UP.
- IF THE COMPUTER DOES NOT RESPOND (NO "." IN RESPONSE TO TWO CONTROL C'S, SEE **ACAC** IN 2.4.2), THIS INDICATES THAT THE COMPUTER IS DOWN. WAIT 15 MINUTES AND DIAL IN AGAIN.

ACCIDENTAL DISCONNECT

WHILE USING THE COMPUTER AN ACCIDENTAL DISCONNECTION MAY OCCUR DUE TO TELEPHONE LINE NOISE OR A COMPUTER FAILURE. ACCIDENTAL DISCONNECT CAN BE DETECTED BY THE CCC TEST - SFE 2.4.2. IF THE PROBLEM IS LINE NOISE, THE OPERATIONS IN THE COMPUTER CAN BE RESUMED BY THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURE IF THE JOB NUMBER (THE NUMBER ASSIGNED BY THE COMPUTER WHEN YOU LAST LOGGED IN) IS KNOWN. FOR EXAMPLE, IF YOUR JOB NUMBER IS 33:

FOLLOW THE LOGIN PROCEDURE (SECTION 2.2 OR 2.3) UP TO THE 'LOG'. INSTEAD OF TYPING 'LOG' AND '57041,1162', TYPE 'AT 33 [57041,1162]' THE COMPUTER SAYS: 'PASSWORD:' AND YOU TYPE THE PASSWORD. IT SHOULD THEN TYPE A '.' IF ALL IS WELL. FINISH THE LOGIN PROCEDURE WITH REGARD TO TYPING 'I DCT500' IF ON THE DCT 500 OR 'TTY PAGE 38' IF ON THE CONOGRAPH. THEN CONTINUE YOUR JOB BY TYPING 'CONT'. ANY RESPONSE OTHER THAN '.' INDICATES THAT THE COMPUTER IS DOWN. WAIT 15 MINUTES, DIAL IN AGAIN, AND LOG IN BY THE USUAL PROCEDURE.

FIRST-HAND INFORMATION ON THE STATUS OF THE COMPUTER CAN BE OBTAINED BY CALLING FIRST DATA CORP. AND INQUIRING ACCORDINGLY.

2.4.5 AIRS MALFUNCTIONS

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MALFUNCTIONS MAY OCCUR DURING THE OPERATION OF THE AIRS PROGRAM. THESE FAILURES ARE OF TWO TYPES. THE FIRST ARE PROBLEMS DUE TO PROGRAM INSTRUCTION ERRORS. SUCH ERRORS CAN BE INTRODUCED WITH EACH PROGRAM MODIFICATION. A BACKUP PROGRAM (TYPE 'RUN BACK' INSTEAD OF 'RUN AIRS') IS PROVIDED, WHICH IS THE VERSION PRIOR TO THE PRESENT AIRS. THE SECOND TYPE OF MALFUNCTION IS DUE TO RANDOM COMPUTER ERRORS WHICH CAUSE FILE DAMAGE OR PROGRAM DAMAGE, MANIFESTED BY VARIOUS ERROR MESSAGES AND RETURNING TO THE MONITOR (I.E. '.' IN LEFT MARGIN).

THE FOLLOWING SERIES OF RESTART ATTEMPTS SHOULD BE SUCCESSFUL IN OVERCOMING THESE COMPUTER MALFUNCTIONS.

FIRST ATTEMPT:

TYPE 'RUN AIRS' AND RE-ENTER THE DESIRED COMMANDS. IF YOU GET THE SAME ERROR MESSAGE, GO ON TO THE SECOND APPROACH.

SECOND ATTEMPT:

TYPE 'RUN BACK' AND RE-ENTER THE DESIRED COMMANDS. IF THE ERROR STILL OCCURS, GO TO THE THIRD ATTEMPT.

THIRD ATTEMPT:

TYPE 'DET' FOLLOW THE LOGIN PROCEDURE (SECTION 2.2 OR 2.3) STARTING FROM 'LOG' (I.E. DON'T DIAL UP THE COMPUTER -YOU ARE ALREADY CONNECTED). TYPE 'RUN AIRS' AND RE-ENTER THE DESIRED COMMANDS.

IF THIS DOES NOT WORK, IT MEANS THAT THE MAIN DATA BASE MAY BE DAMAGED AND BE NO LONGER USABLE.

PLEASE NOTIFY ONE OF US DURING THE NORMAL WORK WEEK WHEN PROBLEMS OCCUR.

2.5 BASICS IN TALKING TO AIRS

TYPING

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- 1. Be sure your terminal is set to transmit upper case characters only. AIRS does not understand lower case.
- 2. Correction of typing errors is explained in 2.4.1.
- 3. Nothing on a line is transmitted to the computer until you type a carriage return.

VOCABULARY

- 1. Times are in GMT.
- 2. 3-letter abbreviations (with a period) are used for months and days.
- 3. Standard FAA and Airline Guide codes are used for airports, centers, aircraft types, airlines.
- 4. Special AIRS words and symbols are listed in Appendix A, with references to their explanations in this guide.
- 5. Other words are defined throughout the guide.

REQUESTS

- 1. When AIRS says "REQUEST=", you can type any request except ARO entries.
- 2. When AIRS says "=", you can type any ARO request.
- 3. Normally a carriage return transmits your request and processing begins. To continue a request on another line, type ";" (semicolon) before the carriage return. AIRS will type "=" and accept another line. A single request can use up to 7 lines.
- 4. Punctuation (other than symbols having special meanings, see Appendix A) may be used freely in requests as desired to improve readability.
- 5. Stopping processing or output from an erroneous request is described in 2.4.2.

3. AIRPORT DEMANDS

3.1 INTRODUCTION

REQUESTS

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CONTENT

THE AIRS DATA BASE CONTAINS ALL SCHEDULED FLIGHTS ORIGINATING AND/OR TERMINATING IN THE U.S., PLUS ANY FLIGHTS ENTERED BY THE ARO (SEE CHAPTER 11). REQUESTS CAN BE MADE FOR DEMAND AT ANY AIRPORT (DOMESTIC OR FOREIGN) WITH SCHEDULED TRAFFIC SERVING THE U.S. DEPARTURE DELAYS, AFCP CONTROLS, AND GENERAL AVIATION FACTORS ARE INCLUDED IF APPLICABLE (SEE CHAPTER 9,10,8). A SINGLE REQUEST CAN COVER UP TO A 24-HOUR SPAN FOR ANY DATE IN THE CURRENT DATA BASE. THE DEMAND CAN BE SPECIFIED BY ORIGIN, DESTINATION, AIRLINE, AIRCRAFT TYPE, TIME, ETC. AS DESIRED. SECTIONS 3.2-3.9 DESCRIBE THE WAYS IN WHICH THE DESIRED DEMAND CAN BE SPECIFIED. SECTIONS 3.10 AND 3.11 DESCRIBE WAYS OF IMPROVING RESPONSE UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES.

FORM

REQUESTS ARE FREE-FORM: THAT IS, LEGAL WORDS AND PHRASES, AS DESCRIBED IN SECTIONS 3.2-3.11, CAN BE COMBINED IN ANY ORDER TO FORM A REQUEST. EVERY BEQUEST MUST CONTAIN A PLACE NAME (SECTION 3.2): ALL OTHER PHRASES ARE OPTIONAL. IN GENERAL, THE ORDER OF REQUEST ELEMENTS DOES NOT AFFECT THE MEANING (THE ONLY EXCEPTION IS FOR MULTIPLE AIRPORTS - SEE SECTION 3.2). WHEN IN DOUBT, TRY! SPACES ARE SUFFICIENT TO SEPARATE WORDS IN A REQUEST, BUT COMMAS MAY BE USED TO IMPROVE READABILITY IF DESIRED. REQUESTS CAN BE CONTINUED ON ANOTHER LINE BY TYPING A SEMICOLON (:) AS THE LAST CHARACTER IN THE LINE, THEN GOING ON TO TYPE ANOTHER LINE. A REQUEST MAY BE UP TO SEVEN LINES LONG.

ANSWERS

THE RESPONSE TO A DEMAND REQUEST IS A TABLE SHOWING THE NUMBER OF OPERATIONS SATISFYING THE REQUEST CRITERIA, BROKEN DOWN BY HOUR AND BY ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES. A COLUMN (LABELED G/A) SHOWING ESTIMATED GENERAL AVIATION OPERATIONS IS INCLUDED IF APPLICABLE (SEE CHAPTER 8 -ESPECIALLY 8.1 AND 8.4). FOR MORE DETAILED OUTPUT, SEE CHAPTER 4.

- NOTE: "TAXI" refers to flights of certain airlines, as described above. It does not refer to the user class as entered by ARO. The user class can, however, be listed after the retrieval (see 4.5).

3.10 FASTER RETRIEVAL (XLIST)

If you will definitely not want a listing of the traffic from a request, you may include the word "XLIST" in the request. This will speed up the request, since AIRS doesn't have to remember the flights.

Examples:

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JFK 1300 0500 Regular request for JFK traffic from 1300 to 0500. Listings can be obtained.

JFK 13C0 0500 XLIST Same traffic as above, but faster response. Listings can not be obtained.

XLIST JFK 1300 0500 Same as above. XLIST can go anywhere in request.

3.11 PRIORITY OVER ARO (XARO)

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If your request includes "XARO", ARO entries will be prevented during processing of your request. This may speed up processing by removing some of the competition for computer resources. ARO is locked out until your request is completed and you get a "REQUEST=".

- Note: If your request is interrupted for any reason, you should immediately RUN AIRS again to get a "REQUEST=". Otherwise ARO will be locked out needlessly.
- Note: XARO should only be used if computer response is poor. When response is good, XARO may actually slow you down instead of speeding you up.

4.LISTINGS

4.1 INTRODUCTION

REQUEST CONTENT AND OUTPUT

IMMEDIATELY AFTER DEMAND COUNTS ARE TYPED OUT (SEE SECTION 3.1), DETAILED LISTINGS OF THE DEMAND, CONSISTING OF INFORMATION ABOUT INDIVIDUAL FLIGHTS, CAN BE REQUESTED. SEVERAL LIST REQUESTS MAY FOLLOW A SINGLE DEMAND REQUEST. THE LISTING GROUPS FLIGHTS BY HOUR AND SEPARATES ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES, JUST AS THE DEMAND TABLE DOES. LISTINGS CAN ALSO BE OBTAINED AFTER TEST (CHAPTER 6) AND FLOW CONTROL (CHAPTER 10) REQUESTS, AS DESCRIBED IN CHAPTER 4.6.

THE LISTINGS CAN BE CONTROLLED AS FOLLOWS:

TIME PERIOD OF LISTING (SEE SECTION 4.3, 'LIST')

ORDER OF FLIGHTS LISTED (SEE SECTION 4.4, *SORT*)

COLUMNS OF INFORMATON LISTED (SEE SECTION 4.5, 'INFO')

IF THE ABOVE ARE NOT SPECIFIED, THE DEPAULT LIST HAS:

TIME: THE ENTIRE DEMAND REQUEST TIME PERIOD

ORDER: ARRIVALS IN ORDER OF ARRIVAL TIME, DEPARTURES IN ORDER OF DEPARTURE TIME

COLUMNS: FLIGHT NUMBER, ORIGIN, DEPARTURE TIME, DESTINATION, ARRIVAL TIME

FLIGHT TIMES THAT INCLUDE DEPARTURE DELAYS WILL BE FOLLOWED BY 'D' (FOR DELAY); TIMES THAT INCLUDE FLOW CONTROL DELAYS WILL BE FOLLOWED BY 'C' (FOR CONTROL).

FORM OF REQUEST

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AT MOST ONE 'LIST' PHRASE, ONE 'SORT' PHRASE, AND ONE 'INFO' PHRASE SHOULD APPEAR IN A REQUEST. THE ORDER OF PHRASES IS IRRELEVANT. SPACES ARE SUFFICIENT TO SEPARATE WORDS IN A REQUEST, BUT COMMAS MAY BE USED TO IMPROVE READABILITY IF DESIRED. REQUESTS CAN BE CONTINUED ON ANOTHER LINE BY TYPING A SEMICOLON (;) AS THE LAST CHARACTER IN THE LINE, THEN GOING ON TO TYPE ANOTHER LINE. A REQUEST MAY BE UP TO SEVEN LINES LONG.

- REQUEST=LIST COMPLETE INFORMATION FOR THE JFK DEPARTURES IS LISTED
- REQUEST=LIST INFO IDENT DEST ONLY THE IDENTIFICATION AND DESTINATION OF THE JPK DEPARTURES ARE LISTED
- REQUEST=D LGA THE NUMBER OF DEPARTURES FROM LGA IN THE NEXT 5 HOURS IS TYPED OUT
- REQUEST=LIST ONLY THE IDENTIFICATION AND DESTINATION OF THE LGA DEPARTURES ARE LISTED BECAUSE PREVIOUS INFO REQUEST REMAINS IN EFFECT.
 - REQUEST=INFO LISTINGS FOR THE REST OF THE SESSION WILL BE IN STANDARD FORMAT.

4.6 LIST AFTER TEST OR FLOW CONTROL

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AFTER A TEST REQUEST (SEE CHAPTER 6) OR A FLOW CONTROL REQUEST (CHAPTER 10) THE ARRIVALS AT THE GIVEN AIRPORT ARE AVAILABLE FOR LISTING. 'LIST' REQUEST FORMATS AND OPTIONS ARE AS GIVEN IN THE PRECEDING SECTIONS, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF DEFAULT TIMES. REGARDLESS OF THE TIME PERIOD IN THE TEST OR FLOW CONTROL REQUEST, THE DEMAND FOR THE WHOLE OPERATIONAL DAY (0300 TO 0300 EASTERN LOCAL TIME) IS AVAILABLE FOR LISTING. THIS PERIOD, RATHER THAN THE TEST OR FLOW CONTROL TIME PERIOD, IS USED AS THE DEFAULT TIME PERIOD BY THE 'LIST' REQUEST. TO LIST ONLY THE TEST OR FLOW CONTROL PERIOD, THE 'LIST' REQUEST MUST SPECIFY THAT TIME PERIOD (SEE 4.3).

IF THE REQUEST WAS FOR FLOW CONTROL AND CONTROLS WERE RECOMMENDED:

ESTIMATED FLIGHT TIMES LISTED WILL INCLUDE THE RECOMMENDED CONTROLS

IF A GENERAL AVIATION FACTOR WAS APPLIED, THE LIST WILL INCLUDE MAKE-BELIEVE GENERAL AVIATION FLIGHTS USED IN CALCULATING DELAYS. THESE WILL HAVE AIRLINE 'XX' AND NO FLIGHT NUMBER, AND THEIR ORIGIN AND DESTINATION WILL BOTH BE THE FLOW CONTROL AIRPORT. 5.PLOTS

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5.1 INTRODUCTION

THE PLOT OPTION IN AIRS IS INTENDED TO PROVIDE FLOW CONTROLLERS WITH A GRAPHICAL OUTPUT OF THE DATA ACCESSED USING AIRS. THE PLOTTING SECTION OF AIRS IS IN A STATE OF CONSTANT REVISION AND UPDATE. THEREFORE, THE USER SHOULD TAKE PRECAUTION TO BE FULLY INFORMED AS TO THE CURRENT OPTIONS AND STATUS OF THE PLOT SECTION.

THE USER IS ALSO CAUTIONED TO READ, CAREFULLY, THOSE PARTS OF CHAPTER 2 PERTAINING TO USE OF THE CONOGRAPH. SECTION 2.4 ON TROUBLESHOOTING IS ESPECIALLY VALUABLE.

CUPRENTLY PLOTS ARE DIVIDED INTO TWO SECTIONS. ONE IS THE PLOTTING OUTPUT AVAILABLE FROM DEMAND REQUESTS. THE OTHER IS THE OUTPUT AVAILABLE FROM FLOW CONTROL REQUESTS SUCH AS TEST, AFCP AND QFLOW. 5.2 DEMAND PLOTS

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The demand plotting programs are set up to produce plots of the data obtained from the last demand request. This information exists when you make an actual demand request and it also exists when you make a request like QFLOW or TEST, where AIRS itself retrieves demand data. When the data in the demand area of AIRS is valid, then it is always permitted to PLOT it.

Several plots may be requested for data from the same demand request.

PLOT REQUEST

The request must start with the key word "PLOT".

A time period may be included if desired. Method of specifying times and defaults if they are not specified are as described in section 4.3 for "LIST" requests.

5.3 DELAY PLOTS

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In the case when the user has called on the delay prediction capabilities of AIRS (i.e. when the user has entered a "TEST" (Chapter 6), "QFLOW" or "AFCP" (Chapter 10) type request), several additional graphics can be provided. The procedure for obtaining a delay plot is given below.

In the course of processing a user's request for AFCP flow control delay information, the computer will type:

'I'SSUE ALLOCATIONS, 'P'RINT ALLOCATIONS, 'L'IST FLIGHTS, 'T'EST ISSUANCE, 'S'UMMARY DATA, (S=CTL PEAKS, S2=ORIGINAL TRAFFIC, S4=CONTRL TRAF), "G"RAPHICAL OUTPUT, OR 'R'ETURN TO AIRS?=

This question (or a similar one for 'QFLOW') is explained in chapter 10. Access to the delay plots is by typing the answer 'G' to the above question. In the 'TEST' request, the plot is accessed by an affirmative answer when asked if graphs are desired.

The delay graph routine is controlled by answers to a series of questions. They are:

QUESTION #1: NEED HELP (Y=YES, N=NO)?

If yes, each question is explained briefly before it is asked. Also, a list of the computer names for different graphs is typed out. Thus you can get a short version of this explanation as you go along.

OUESTION #2: 'S'TOP PLOTTING OR 'C'ONTINUE?

The answer to this question is "S" or "C". In case of "S", the computer returns to the general question. If it is "C", the computer proceeds with the plot.

OUESTION #3: NUMBER OF GRAPHS =

You may have from one to four graphs plotted on screen at once. Enter the desired number.

QUESTION #4: GRAPH #1 =

After you have given your instructions concerning desired graphs, the computer will plot your graph. It will work for a while, and then begin plotting.

DELAY PLOT EXPLANATION

The graph produced by the delay plotting program is much the same as that for the demand plots. The major difference is that for the delay graphs, you can request several graphs to be plotted on the same axis from the list of thirteen data choices listed above. Thus, you can easily compare various capacity, delay and flow control quantities. For instance, plotting the combined graphs of original arrival traffic, landing capacity and average delay will allow you to visualize the magnitude and duration of delay effects caused when the scheduled landing capacity. the airport's surpasses traffic Plotting average and peak delays together will indicate the fluctuation and therefore the rate of change in the predicted airborne delays.

It is noted that the vertical axis may show numbers of aircraft (such as when capacity, original traffic and original landings are plotted) or it may show minutes of delay when one of the delay graphs is plotted. In some case, both will be required. Then, the left vertical axis will show number of aircraft and the right will show minutes delay. These axes are clearly labeled.

SPACES ARE SUFFICIENT TO SEPARATE WORDS IN A REQUEST, BUT COMMAS MAY BE USED TO IMPROVE READABILITY IF DESIRED.

8. GENERAL AVIATION FACTORS

8.1 INTRODUCTION

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GENERAL AVIATION FACTORS CAN BE ENTERED FOR ANY AIRPORT IN AIRS. EACH AIRPORT MAY HAVE TWO FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH IT - A NORMAL VALUE AND A VALUE FOR TODAY ONLY (SEE SECTION 8.5). THESE FACTORS APPLY REGARDLESS OF TIME OF DAY OR DAY OF WEEK. THE G/A FACTOR IS A PERCENTAGE WHICH IS APPLIED TO THE SCHEDULED DEMAND TO ESTIMATE THE UNSCHEDULED DEMAND. THUS IF AN AIRPORT HAS A G/A FACTOR OF 10% AND A SCHEDULED DEMAND OF 50 AIRCRAFT FOR SOME HOUR, ITS G/A ESTIMATE FOR THAT HOUR WILL BE 5 AIRCRAFT (10% OF 50).

THERE ARE TWO TYPES OF REQUESTS FOR DEALING WITH G/A - ONE FOR ENTERING FACTORS (SEE SECTION 8.2) AND ONE FOR FINDING OUT WHAT FACTORS ARE IN THE SYSTEM (SEE SECTION 8.3). AIRS AUTOMATICALLY USES G/A FACTORS IN THE RESPONSE TO ANY REQUEST IN WHICH IT MAKES SENSE TO DO SO (SEE SECTION 8.4).

8.4 G/A FACTORS IN ANSWERS TO REQUESTS

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G/A FACTORS WILL BE INCORPORATED INTO DEMAND REQUEST RESPONSES (SEE 3.1) WHENEVER POSSIBLE. INSTEAD OF JUST ONE NUMBER FOR EACH HOUR, THERE WILL BE TWO, LISTED UNDER A/C (SCHEDULED DEMAND) AND G/A (G/A DEMAND ESTIMATE, CALCULATED FROM THE A/C DEMAND AND G/A FACTOR AS DESCRIBED IN SECTION 8.1). THE G/A ESTIMATE WILL APPEAR ONLY WHEN THE FOLLOWING TWO CONDITIONS HOLD.

- (1) THE REQUEST IS FOR A SINGLE AIRPORT AND CONTAINS NO RESTRICTIONS OTHER THAN A, D, OR DATES AND TIMES. (BECAUSE THE FACTOR IS A PERCENTAGE OF THE TOTAL TRAFFIC, IT DOESN'T MAKE SENSE TO APPLY IT TO ONLY THE JETS, ONLY THE ARRIVALS AT JFK FROM MIA, OR ANY OTHER RESTRICTED PORTION OF THE TRAFFIC)
- (2) A G/A FACTOR IS KNOWN FOR THE AIRPORT IN QUESTION.

THE ESTIMATED G/A TRAFFIC IS ALSO USED FOR ARRIVAL DELAY PREDICTION (CHAPTER 6) AND FLOW CONTROL (CHAPTER 10).

8.5 TODAY VERSUS NORMAL FACTORS

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TODAY ONLY FACTORS ARE IN EFFECT FROM 0300 TO 0300 EASTERN LOCAL TIME, WHICH CORRESPONDS TO EITHER 080C TO 0800 OR 0700 TO 0700 GMT, DEPENDING ON THE SEASON. NOTE: TODAY FACTORS DO NOT CORRESPOND TO GMT DAYS. THIS IS SO THAT THE TODAY FACTOR WILL APPLY THROUGHOUT A NORMAL CFCF WORK DAY AND NOT GO OUT OF EFFECT DURING THE EVENING SHIFT. THUS DEMAND COUNTS FOR HOURS BETWEEN 0300 AND 0300 LOCAL TIME WILL USE THE TODAY FACTOR (IF NONE HAS BEEN ENTERED, WILL USE THE NORMAL), AND COUNTS FOR ANY OTHER TIMES WILL USE THE NORMAL FACTOR. FIRST THING EVERY MORNING, AIRS WILL AUTOMATICALLY ERASE THE TODAY ONLY VALUES (SINCE THEY APPLIED TO THE DAY BEFORE), SETTING EVERYTHING BACK TO NORMAL.

9.DEPARTURE DELAYS

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9.1 INTRODUCTION

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DEPARTURE DELAYS CAN BE ENTERED FOR ANY AIRPORT IN AIRS FOR ANY HOUR OF THE CURRENT DAY (0300 TO 0300 EASTERN LOCAL TIME). AIRS WILL INCLUDE THESE DELAYS WHEN ANSWERING REQUESTS.

THE DEPARTURE DELAY FEATURE OF AIRS IS UNREALISTIC IN THAT:

- 1. DELAYS CAN ONLY BE ENTERED FOR WHOLE HOURS, NOT FOR PARTS OF HOURS.
- 2. DELAYS ARE ENTERED FOR ALL FLIGHTS SCHEDULED TO DEPART IN AN HOUR; THERE IS NO WAY TO DELAY ONLY SOME FLIGHTS IN AN HOUR.
- 3. ENTERING DELAYS FOR ONE HOUR DOESN'T AFFECT THE NEXT HOUR. THUS SOME FLIGHTS MAY GET OUT OF ORDER WHEN DELAYS ARE ENTERED.

BECAUSE OF THESE LIMITATIONS, DELAYS WILL ONLY BE USEFUL IN AIRS WHEN REAL WORLD DELAYS ARE EXTREME. WHEN DELAYS ARE LARGE, YOU WILL PROBABLY GET BETTER TRAFFIC ESTIMATES OUT OF AIRS BY ENTERING SOME DELAYS THAN YOU WOULD BY NOT ENTERING ANY.

9.2 ENTERING DELAYS (ENTER DELAY)

9.4 CAUTIONS IN USING DEPARTURE DELAYS

- 1. DO NOT INTERRUPT AIRS WHILE IT IS ENTERING DELAYS. IF AIRS IS INTERRUPTED (I.E. IF THE COMPUTER CRASHES, THE TELETYPE SHUTS OFF, ETC.) YOU SHOULD REPEAT THE ENTER DELAY REQUEST THE NEXT TIME AIRS IS RUN. OTHERWISE THE DATA BASE MAY BE MESSED UP.
- 2. ALL DEPARTURE DELAYS ARE ENTERED FOR THE CURRENT LOCAL C3CO TO 0300 DAY. BE CAREFUL THAT YOUR TIME PERIODS FALL WITHIN THIS RANGE, AS AIRS DOES NOT CHECK.
- 3. DELAYS APPLY TO FLIGHTS ACCORDING TO THEIR SCHEDULED DEPARTURE TIMES. THIS MEANS THAT YOU DO NOT SIMPLY ENTER THE DELAY CURRENTLY BEING EXPERIENCED AT WHEELS UP TIME, BUT MUST ADJUST BACKWARD AND APPLY THE DELAY EARLIER, AT THE SCHEDULED DEPARTURE TIME OF THE DELAYED FLIGHTS.

FOR EXAMPLE:

10. FLOW CONTROL ASSISTANCE

AIRS is equipped to aid the users in conducting flow control procedures by computing control quantities for air traffic departure and/or tier center release clearances (i.e. The computation involves predicting traffic guotas). arrival delays and stack sizes, recommending appropriate flow control action, computing the quantities of arrivals air traffic loading at the maintaining desired for destination airport and preparing the applicable control tables. The quality of flow control assistance is dependent upon the user's skill and knowledge about the AIRS flow control operation. The user has the responsibility for conveying to AIRS holding stack status and the impacted earlier time the landing capacity. At an airport's airport's control zones and selected control criteria must have been established by the user. AIRS bases its flow is control results upon these inputs and thus extreme care formulatng the input data and control warranted in specifications.

Section 10.1 is designed to give the user a detailed understanding of the AIRS flow control processing in order to obtain maximum aid from AIRS. The subsequent sections of this chapter describe the command forms and data entry for structuring, controlling and the operation of AIRS flow control.

10.1 UNDERSTANDING OF AIRS FLOW CONTROL PROCESSING

OVERVIEW

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The flow control procedures implemented in AIRS produce four categories of output:

- 1) Recommendations for implementation
- 2) Arrival delay predictions
- 3) ARTCC arrival hour allocations or tier ARTCC quotas
- 4) Listings of individual flight information

AIRS FLOW CONTROL

AIRS flow control can be applied to any airport known by AIRS. The procedures can only be applied for the current operational day (0300 to 0300 eastern local time). Control zones may be entered for each airport by utilizing the "EDIT" mode. Landing estimates are entered for the current day (see "ENTERING LANDING CAPACITIES", Chapter 7) and if desired, general aviation can be factored in (see "GENERAL AVIATION FACTORS", Chapter 8, and section 10.3, question 4). Departure delays are included in flight arrival time

estimates (see "DEPARTURE DELAYS", Chapter 9). Updates and additions to flight schedules are utilized in flow control computations (see airport reservation entry, Chapter 11). Once flow control is implemented, allocations or quotas can be issued in increments in order that status changes can be factored into the next issuance.

The approach used in computing the flow control recommendations varies between QPLOW and AFCP. The variation is not in the computational method but in the criteria used to manage the flow of traffic. For example, AFCP normally attempts to minimize excessive air delays by employing ground delays, while QFLOW attempts to present excess holding stacks in the impacted center by distributing the air delays into the conters. As a result of the differences between the control criteria and zone structures for AFCP or QFLOW, it is impractical to structure an airport for both procedures since AIRS currently can store only one set of flow control criteria per airport. This does not present a problem since QFLOW superseded AFCP as the approved flow control procedure. However, AFCP remains operational in AIRS if and when ground delay flow control is desired (for example, if the conservation of fuel becomes critical).

An understanding of the AIRS flow control processes requires knowledge of the scope, algorithms and operational aspects of these processes.

SCOPE

Any airport known to AIRS may be flow controlled. Applying flow control for the first time to an airport requires that the user specify control criteria and/or set up the appropriate zone structure before AIRS can assist in the procedure. See 10.3 for tailoring the airport's flow control data.

In the event that the flow controlled airport does not have ARO schedule updates, AIRS can use the airport's GA factor (see chapter 8) to improve predictions of arrival delays and computations of control quotas. When the airport is supported by ARO daily updates, the GA factor may also be specified for application only during the non-ARO hours.

AIRS accuracy of the the improve TO further predictions, two additional areas of adjustment are included in the flow control processing. The first is consideration of known stack size, specifically the number of airborne (holding) aircraft in the impacted center at a given time AIRS uses this information to align the (see 10.2). computed stacks to the specified size at the specified time, thus improving the accuracy of the subsequent stack variations. 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producing airports) can improve the flow control prediction and control accuracy.

The AIRS flow control processes can only be applied within the current twenty-four hour period from 0300 to 0300 local eastern time zone. The 0300 time was selected because it represents about the lowest traffic volume time in the eastern United States. The twenty-four hour limitation was determined by two factors: 1. a single flow control problem would not exceed this period; and 2. this discrete period simplified programming requirements. The current 0300 to 0300 period is consistent with the experience that airport flow control problems are individual current day situations. Longer range flow control management is impractical with regard to AFCP or QFLOW operations.

ALGORITHMS

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The flow control algorithms used in both AFCP and QFLOW are predicated on first-come-first-served equitability. The scheduled arrival order is the order used in computing the flow controls. This order is preserved within the accuracy of the procedures. Since flow control is administered by allocations or quotas, not flight identification, some minor reordering is unavoidable even though the AIRS flow controls are rigidly computed using flight identifies to assure the first-come-first-served ordering.

Using first-come-first-served ordering, the predicted landing slots (at the flow controlled airport) are applied to the flights as they arrive or are taken from a holding stack. When the impacted center's flow control threshold for stack size and/or air delay is exceeded, the algorithm either computes allocations based upon ground delays for excess AFCP aircraft or computes quotas which detain the excess aircraft in the tier center under quota flow procedures.

The flow control threshold is set by the user (see 10.2 and 10.3) and can be structured to consider air delay, stack size or a mix of these as threshold criteria. The threshold is formulated through four values. The first value is that of maximum air delay, primarily used for AFCP. This value does not play an important role in QFLOW because impacted center air delay is not the control criterion but rather Maximum stack size is the second maximum stack sizes. This value is a required entry during QFLOW dialog value. and it becomes the "CONTROL LEVEL" at the impacted ARTCC. In AFCP this value can be used as a further restriction on the controlled arrivals to avoid exhausting the arrival ARTCC's holding capacity. The third and fourth values are extra threshold regulating criteria and are best understood as desired or minimum levels of air delay and stack size as opposed to maximum levels intended by the first two values. Instead of controlling to maximum conditions flow control can be instituted to produce control to desired levels, with the threshold maxima being applied only when the maxima would be exceeded by application of the desired levels. In current flow control situations, however, the desired levels are normally set equal to the maximum levels. Thus threshold formulation simply becomes maximum stack size for QFLOW and maximum air delay for AFCP. Since both criteria must be set whether AFCP or QFLOW, care must be given to negate the unimportant criterion (i.e. in QFLOW the maximum air delay should be set very large to let the stack size be the controlling factor and in AFCP, the maximum stack size should be set very large to let the air delay be the controlling factor).

OPERATIONAL ASPECTS

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using AIRS flow control assistance, several When operational aspects must be understood. During the processing of an AFCP request (not a "TEST AFCP" request) the AIRS data base is automatically locked with regard to the entering of ARO updates. This locking is required to insure the continuity of data used and modified in the issuance of AFCP allocations. If ARO were permitted to change the files during AFCP computation, serious damage to the data base could result. After the issuance of AFCP allocations and the returning to AIRS ("REQUEST") mode, the data base is automatically freed for ARO updates. Storing AFCP control data (e.g. controlled departure times) with each issuance of allocations is essential if AIRS is to factor the knowledge (or history) of the previous flow control delays into the next issuance period. For example, some aircraft may be AFCP ground delayed and can not be considered as having departed on schedule in computing revised arrival delay predictions. In the application of since aircraft are not ground delayed, QFLOW. it is reasonable to assume that they departed as scheduled. Thus QFLOW does not require data base retention of flow control data (e.g. controlled departure times) and does not lock the data base during any of its computations.

One further operational aspect must be discussed. AIRS computes the AFCP and QFLOW controls based upon all aircraft being controllable (i.e. capable of being delayed in arriving). In reality, not all aircraft are controllable. For example, under AFCP the domestic flights which have already departed for the AFCP airport are no longer capable of being ground delayed. If AFCP is computed in advance of any flow control departure delays, there is no problem in flight controllability. But if AFCP is implemented in the midst of the arrival congestion problem, only those on the ground can be expected to be ground delayed (foreign arrivals excepted). To cope with this late initiation situation, the AIRS flow control processing has been designed to determine the controllability of flights with regard to the current time of day. The user must instruct to consider (10.3)"EDIT" mode through the AIRS controllability of flights in computing flow controls. With regard to QFLOW, the controllability of flights is not important since aircraft are normally flow controlled the end of their flight. air delays near through Essentially they are controllable by QFLOW until cleared into the impacted ARTCC. In summary, the AIRS default mode of considering all flights controllable is consistent with QFLOW operations and with early AFCP implementation. The optional flight controllability determination is available for late AFCP implementation purposes.

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10.2 REQUEST ENTRY AND DIALOG

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The flow control request initiates the AIRS flow control processing. Its content specifies which process, AFCP or QFLOW, is to be activated and whether editing of control criteria is desired. It also can contain optional override times and a stack size for a given time. When QFLOW is requested, a special short dialog follows to acknowledge the landing capacity estimates and to set the stack control level before the processing begins. After several minutes of computation AIRS produces a flow control recommendation. This recommendaton can be preceded by an editing dialog if the keyword "EDIT" was used in the request (10.3). Any editing of the control criteria or zones which precedes the recommendation is used in the current flow control processing. It is noted that such edited control criteria can also, if desired, be made permanent and will be used for subsequent flow control requests for the airport. Editing zones always produces permanent modification to the zone structure for the airport.

Following the flow control recommendation, AIRS asks one or more questions. The user's answers produce further processing of selected outputs or the return of processing control to the normal AIRS "REQUEST=" mode, terminating flow control assistance.

10.2.1 REQUEST ENTRY

CONTENT

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A QFLOW request must contain the keyword "QFLOW". An AFCP request must contain the keyword "AFCP". The request must also contain a single airport code. Optionally the request may include implementation times (overriding the computer's recommended times), an arrival stack size (terminal area airborne count), and the key word "EDIT". In AFCP Requests several additional keywords are permitted (BEGIN, CONT, TEST). The request implicitly covers the arrivals for the 24-hour local day (eastern local time) from 3:00 a.m. today to 3:00 a.m. tomorrow.

Examples: REQUEST = QFLOW ORD REQUEST = TEST AFCP JFK

FORM

QFLOW requests must begin with "QFLOW" while AFCP requests can begin with either "TEST", "AFCP", "BEGIN", or "CONT". The remainder of the flow control request is free form; that is, legal words and phrases, as described in the following sections, can be combined in any order to completely specify the request. Spaces are sufficient to separate words in a request, but commas may be used to improve readability if desired. Requests can be continued on another line by typing a semicolon (:) as the last character in the line, then going on to type another line. A request may be up to seven lines long.

KEYWORDS

- QFLOW: This word specifies quota flow control procedures are to be computed.
- AFCP: This word specifies Advanced Flow Control Procedures are to be computed.
- TEST: This may be used with AFCP requests to prevent accidental implementation (i.e. prevents data base updating of controlled traffic). This keyword does permit the modification of the zoning and the control criteria when used in conjunction with the keyword "EDIT".
- BEGIN: This word will insure the AFCP request is treated as a new startup for the procedures. If the procedures were implemented earlier that day, this

command word will make the program ignore the earler controls. This keyword is implicit (default) in the first AFCP implementation request for a given airport that day.

- CONT: This word indicates a continuation of the controls implemented earlier in the day. If no previous AFCP request has been entered for that day and that airport, this keyword is automatically replaced by "BEGIN". If an AFCP implementation had been requested earlier the keyword "CONT" would be assumed (default) even if omitted from the current request.
- EDIT: This word produces a dialog between the controller and the computer prior to performing the desired flow control computation. This dialogue is the means for entering or changing zones and control criteria. Entry of control data can be effective for the duration of the current request or can be saved (filed) as a permanent (until changed) set of criteria for the given airport. Each airport can have its own special criteria and zones (see "Structuring Airport Flow Control Assistance", section 10.3).

AIRPORT

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Three-letter codes - e.g. JFK

STACK SIZE

1600 STACK 20 1600 HOLD 20

Order is as follows: give the time, the keyword 'STACK' or 'HOLD' and then the number of aircraft holding in the terminal area. Caution: the time entered with the stack size should be an adjusted time, adding to the time at which the count was made the time required to travel from the holding fix to the runway. This will provide better delay predictions by adjusting stack times to correspond to the wheels down times of the data base. If the time is omitted from the stack phrase and there is a starting time given in a time phrase (see following paragraph), then the starting time is automatically used for the time of the stack size.

IMPLEMENTATION TIME PERIODS

NO TIMES GIVES

AIRS computes the need for flow control today. If it determines implementation is required, it computes the times to start and to terminate controls.

COMPLETE TIME PERIOD GIVEN

There are four ways to specify a time period:

1800-0200 1800 0200 1800 TO 0200 FROM 1800 TO 0200

Specifying the complete time period forces the program to implement flow controls for the specified duration even if the delays or stack size conditions do not warrant controls. Entering a time period produces a direct override of the computer's evaluation of the required implementation period.

OPEN-ENDED TIME PERIOD GIVEN

There are two forms of entry:

FROM 1800 TO 0200

AIRS calculates the start and terminate times for flow control implementation. If a start time (FROM) has been entered it overrides the computed start time, and similarly the end time (TO) overrides the computed terminate time. The program then recommends flow controls for the resultant time period.

PRIORITY OVER ARO (XARO)

If faster response is required, you may lock out ARO entries by including "XARO" in your flow control request.

See 3.11 for explanation and warnings.

NOTE: AFO is locked out until you get back to a "REQUEST=", so if you use XARO and spend a long time getting flow control reports, ARO is locked out the whole time.

10.2.2 FLOW CONTROL DIALOG

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPLEMENTATION

Peak values of arrival delay and arrival stack size are given along with the times of occurrence. Based on these uncontrolled delays and the threshold conditions of maximum stack size, a delay and/or air maximum recommendation is given to implement or not to implement If control is recommended, delay and flow controls. stack size predictions are given for the intervals when the procedures start and end. Whether or not control is recommended, further reports can be obtained. In the case of AFCP, if control is not recommended, the user must continued processing by specifically request this answering 'Y' to the question "DO YOU WISH ADDED DATA?". An answer of 'N' terminates the flow control processing, returning to a "REQUEST=".

SELECTIVE DESIRED REPORTS

If further reports are to be given (see above), one of two general questions is asked to determine the desired outputs.

QUESTION WHEN AFCP

*I'SSUE ALLOCATIONS, 'P'RINT ALLOCATIONS, 'L'IST FLIGHTS, 'T'EST ISSUANCE, 'S'UMMARY DATA, (S=CTL PEAKS, S2=ORIGINAL TRAFFIC, S4=CONTRL TRAF), 'G'RAPHICAL OUTPUT, OR 'R'ETURN TO AIRS?=

ANSWER "P"

In QFLOW this answer will result in printing the flow control quotas. These quotas are given by zoned groups and by time interval in two-line sets; the first line gives the release quantity (i.e. the number of flights to be released during the interval), the second line gives the number of detained flights. Before printing the quotas, the time range for the report is requested and your choice of zones is requested. In addition, you can print these quota tables for the flow controlled traffic or, for comparison, for the original uncontrolled traffic. The time intervals for the

zone groupings are automatically adjusted by boundary times entered by the user when structuring the airport's zones (See 10.3).

In AFCP this answer will print out the arrival hour allocation tables for the AFCP implementation. These tables can be printed out completely or in part by time period and/or by zoning criteria. The tables contain by zone, the ARTCC allocations. These allocations are subdivided by arrival intervals (intervals can be specified from one an hour to six an hour; see section 10.3 question 4). Unzoned allocations are tabulated by domestic, foreign, and general aviation.

ANSWER "S2"

This answer produces the same report in either QFLOW or AFCP, a table of predicted arrival delays and stack sizes. Specifically, the report gives original arrival traffic statistics (normally by hours) and contains the following columns of data: number of arrivals, number landed, average number of flights holding, average air delay, peak number holding and peak air delay. In addition the landing capacity estimates and the GA factor used are given. (This "S2" summary report is exactly the same as that produced by the "TEST" request -Chapter 6).

ANSWER "S4"

This answer produces the same kind of report as the "S2" report described above. The difference is that the "S4" summary report is for the flow controlled traffic while the "S2" is for the original traffic flow.

ANSWER "S"

This answer produces the same report as "S4" but without the average number of flights holding and the average delay columns.

ANSWER "G"

This answer initiates a dialog to produce graphs of the data contained in both the "S2" and "S4" summary reports above. See section 5.3 which discusses user commands and data inputs required to specify the desired plots.

ANSWER "L"

This answer is meaningless to AIRS at present since the listing feature within AFCP has not been implemented to date. Flow control flight listings can be obtained by returning to AIRS with the "R" answer and making the normal "LIST" request to AIRS (see section 4.6).

ANSWER "R"

This answer exits the flow control procedure and returns the user to the normal AIRS "REQUEST=" mode. As stated in the previous paragraph, flight listings may be obtained of the flow controlled aircraft similar to the listings requested following a demand request.

ANSWER "I"

This answer produces the AFCP allocation tables by interval and selected zone breakdown. The user is asked to set the time of issuance (i.e. from the program supplied AFCP initiation time or last issue time up to a user specified firm issuance time). Issuance should be made in small steps (one or two hours at a time), so that continued AFCP's will factor into the next issuance the latest user supplied landing capacity estimates and/or ARO updates of flight schedules. The allocation tables are produced as in the "P" answer discussed above. unseen operation which is performed when The "I"ssue is selected is that the flow control delays for all flights, up to the latest issue time, are stored in the master schedule file for continuity in the subsequent continuation or termination of AFCP's.

ANSWER "T"

This answer produces the same outputs as the answer "I" above. But updating of flow control data on the master sheedule file is inhibited. This answer gives the user the opportunity to preview the allocation tables without affecting the files.

10.3 STRUCTURING AIRPORT FLOW CONTROL ASSISTANCE

GENERAL COMMENTS

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The entry of the keyword "EDIT" in any flow control request initiates a dialog permitting the controller to add, change, or remove zones and control criteria for the The extent of the dialog is referenced airport. controlled by answers to questions. Most questions have provisions for controlling the scope of editing or terminating editing and going on to the flow control The following paragraphs describe the computations. dialogs for entering and editing all of the flow control parameters. The order of editing specific parameters does not matter. Choose the editing desired, do it, and exit the editing phase. In exiting the edit phase, the last question asked is:

UPDATE CONTROL FILE? 'Y' OR 'N'=

An answer 'N' (NO) restricts all the AFCP control criteria changes or additions (except for zones) to the present flow control request. An answer 'Y' (Yes) saves all the changes and additions for automatic application any time that airport is used in a flow control request. Zones are permanently changed whenever you edit them.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWER CHOICES

1. ANY PROCEDURAL CHANGES, 'Y', 'Y*', OR 'N'?=

- 'N'-(No) terminates the editing session. The flow control request is processed following the choice of "UPDATE CONTROL FILE?" discussed in the previous paragraph.
- 'Y'-(YES) allows selected editing of the key flow control parameters by going to question 2 below.
- 'Y*'-(Yes, detailed level) allows editing of all the flow control parameters by going to question 3 below.
- 2. WHICH? 'P'RINT, 'S'TACK CONTROLS, 'D'ELAY CONTROLS, 'Z'ONES, '*', OR 'N'ONE?=
 - 'N'-(None) terminates editing session.
 - '*'-(More detailed level) enters the more detailed level of editing by going to question 3.

- 'P'-(Print current control criteria) types out the airport's key control parameters as they exist at that instant (i.e. including editing just performed). Outputs are: maximum stack, maximum air delay controls, flow control allocation interval (intervals per hour), and the number of zones for that airport. Further information is available by way of question 3 (see 'P' answer under question 3 below).
- 'S'-(Stack control) permits the entry of the maximum stack size control criterion (i.e. number of aircraft held in terminal area). This editing has no effect in QFLOW because the stack criterion ("CONTROL LEVEL") is entered each time QFLOW is requested (see 10.1).
- Do-(Delay control) permits the setting of the maximum air delay criterion (i.e. maximum terminal area air delay in minutes.
- 'Z'-(Zone editing) initiates a dialog permitting zone specifications and/or zone modifications. Caution! any use of zone editing dialog which adds to or changes the zones, replaces the previous version of zoning for that airport. The following dialog results if the 'Z' answer is given:

FIRST QUESTION: "N'EW OR "E'DIT?=

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- 'N'-(New) destroys any previous zone structure for the airport (i.e. starts with a clear unzoned structure). Entry of zone 1 structure is then permitted.
- 'E'-(Edit) Enters the existing airport zone structure for printout, additions, or modifications.

SECOND QUESTION: *L'IST, 'P'RINT ALL, 'R'EPLACE ZONE, 'A'DD ZONE?=

Note: A carriage return answer will return control to question 2 (or 3).

'L'-(List of zone) produces an inquiry of which zone to list (by number), and proceeds to list the ARTCC's and special place groups (expanded list of all airport and center codes in the group).

- 'P'-(Print all zones) produces a list by zone of all the ARTCC codes and airports.
- 'R'-(Replace a zone) produces an inquiry of which zone to replace (by number), clears all previous information in the specified zone, and then allows entry of the new zone structure. (See following paragraph for description of zone data entry).
- 'A'-(Add a new zone) allows the entry of a new zone the current airport zone structure. A to question is asked: "CONTROLLABLE ZONE? 1=NO, $\hat{2}$ =YES, 3=YES WITH ETE CUTOFF=". An answer "1" means that centers and airports in this zone are exempt from controls; the answer '2' means that controls are applied in this zone; and answer '3' means that the controls are applied (in this zone) only on those aircraft with flight times less than a given duration (see answer 'E' to question 4 below below for information on ete cutoffs). Following your answer, the computer the "CENTERS=". You can now enter types appropriate ARTCC 3-letter codes, separated bv The carriage return commas. spaces or line and generates another the terminates "CENTERS=" for more inputs. If you are finished center codes, give an extra the entering carriage return. "GROUP TITLE=" is then typed out and allows entry of a heading (used later in the allocation tables). Following the entry of this heading (limited to 5 characters), the user is asked "BOUNDRY TIME=". This time, expressed minutes, is intended for use in QFLOW in procedures. In order to properly compute OFLOW release quantities by time interval for each group, AIRS must compensate for the flight time from point of release (i.e. tier ARTCC) to wheels down. This boundary time serves to adjust the quotas for each group to an imaginary boundary or area associated with the group's release point. Zero boundary times are legal answers when no adjustment is desired. At this point the group may be defined in response to To define the group the "=" typed by AIRS. constituents you can now enter ARTCC codes and/or airport areas (e.g. ZEUR, see section 3.2 and appendix C) into this specific group. Α carriage return ends a line and starts another. An extra carriage return will permit entry of another group title, etc. If no (further) group

titles are to be entered, a carriage return will bring you back to the second question, "'L'IST....".

The zone structuring for QFLOW requires that a group be entered for each of the directional traffic groups. A group is set up to contain the proposed departures from the impacted ARTCC. This group might be titled by the ARTCC's code preceded by "PR" (e.g. PRZAU), and would contain the ARTCC code to be entered in the subsequent "=" definition. For each of the tier ARTCC's proposed groups are produced similar (e.q. PRZID, PRZKC) each defined as the PRZOB. center code. associated Lastly, the through-traffic associated with each tier ARTCC is entered for each tier center. The groups might be titled with the tier center's code preceded by "TH" (e.g. THZOB, THZID, THZKC). Each of these through-traffic groups must be defined in their definition dialog as consisting of the origin ARTCC's and foreign airport areas (e.g. ZEUR, ZSAB) whose traffic is likely to transit the tier center enroute to the flow controlled airport. The order of entering the effect the flow control groups does not procedures but is the order by which the groups are tabulated in the quota reports. This order should be selected to facilitate administration of the procedures (for example, define the proposed and the through-traffic groups for the same ARTCC in order before defining the next ARTCC groups).

3. CHANGE WHICH? 'P'RINT, 'Z'ONES, 'S'TACK CONTROLS, 'D'ELAY CONTROLS, 'O'THER CONTROL PARAMETERS, OR 'N'ONE?

'N'-(NONE) terminates editing session.

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'P'-(print current control criteria) - types out detailed control parameters as applicable and as they exist at that instant. Outputs are: maximum stack; maximum air delay; minimum (desired) stack size; desired delay; stack variance allowable (between computed stack size and given stack size); air,borne control status (i.e. control foreign airbornes): allocation interval (number of intervals per hour); number of zones; ete cutoff in minutes; departure cutoff, domestic cutoff, landing cutoff (a cutoff, in minutes, is the time threshold used to consider a flight has entered the next phase, such as a flight on the departure ramp is committed to depart and not able to be ground delayed when he is within the departure cutoff of his scheduled departure time); user entered flow control start and/or end times overriding computed times; last AFCP issuance time; (omitted on QFLOW or if beginning AFCP); general aviation factor; ARO reservation time period (during which no GA factor is used); and stack size and time if entered previously.

'Z'-(zone editing) see question 2 answer 'Z' above.

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- 'S'-(stack controls) permits entry of the maximum stack size and the minimum (desired) stack size. (Under question 2, the 'S' answer automatically sets the minimum stack size equal to the maximum stack size.) This editing has no effect in QFLOW because the stack criterion ("CONTROL LEVEL") is entered each time QFLOW is requested (see 10.1).
- 'D'-(Delay controls) permits entry of the maximum terminal area air delay and the desired air delay. (Under question 2, the 'D' answer automatically sets the desired delay equal to the maximum air delay.)
- 'O'-(Other control parameters) initiates a dialog controlled by question 4 below.
- 4. CHANGE WHICH? "A"IRBORNE CONTROLS, "E"TE CUTOFF, "I"NTERVAL FOR CONTROLS, "G"EN/AV USAGE, "L"ANDING CUTOFF, "S"TACK VARIANCE, "C"ONTROL ALL OPTION, "D"EPARTURE LIMITS, "N"ONE, OR "M"ORE =

Note: After the first typeout of question 4, retyping of the complete question is suppressed to "CHANGE WHICH?=".

'N'-(None) terminates editing session.

'M'-(More editing) returns to question 3.

'A'-(Airborne controls) permits you to specify whether airborne flights (foreign and/or domestic) are to be considered controllable and therefore delayable. In particular, AFCP might consider domestic airborne flights as uncontrollable while for QFLOW all airborne flights should be specified as controllable. The user's choice to this airborne controllability option has an effect only when the editing under "C" (discussed below) specifies that not all flights are controllable.

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- 'E'-(Ete cutoff) permits setting of cutoff flight times for use primarily in AFCP control zones with controllability option 3. All flights in such zones within the specified flight duration will be considered controllable. This parameter should not be employed (i.e. no zone controllability option 3) for QFLOW.
- "I"-(Interval for reports) permits setting the AFCP allocation and the "S" reports to be tabulated by time interval from 1 to 6 per hour. In QFLOW the user selects a separate report interval in the dialog associated with printing quota tables.
- 'G'-(General aviation) permits the use or omission of the general aviation factor (see chapter 8) in predicting delays and computing flow controls. If GA factors are to be used, entry of an ARO reservation period during which GA factors are not used, is also permitted.
- 'L'-(Landing cutoff) permits specification of a cutoff time within which an arrival flight is considered on final approach or landed and therefore not air delayable.
- 'S'-(Stack variance) permits the specification of a deviation allowance for comparisons between the computer's predicted stack size and a given stack size entered in the flow control request.
- 'C'-(Control all option) permits the setting of a master mode switch which considers all aircraft (airborne or not) as controllable by flow control procedures. If the user specifies that not all flights are controllable, the computer program checks controllability with regard to current time and flight status in determining whether delays can be assigned.
- 'D'-(Departure limits) permits entry of departure cutoffs for foreign and/or domestic flights (in minutes). These limits are used to consider when an aircraft is committed to depart and no longer ground delayable by AFCP. This parameter is meaningless under QFLOW.

11. AIRPORT RESERVATION OFFICE

11.1 INTRODUCTION

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THE AIRPORT RESERVATION OFFICE (ARO) SECTION OF AIRS ALLOWS THE ADDITION AND CANCELLATION OF FLIGHTS. THESE MODIFICATIONS ARE MADE TO THE CENTRAL AIRS DATA BASE, UPDATING THE ORIGINAL AIRLINE GUIDE SCHEDULES. ENTRIES CAN BE MADE EITHER MANUALLY OR VIA PAPER TAPE. THE FOLLOWING SECTIONS TELL HOW TO BEGIN AND EXIT THE ARO SECTION (11.2), HOW TO USE PAPER TAPE (11.3), HOW TO ENTER FLIGHTS (11.4), HOW TO CANCEL FLIGHTS (11.5), HOW TO RETRIEVE ARO-ENTERED FLIGHTS (11.6), AND HOW TO GET HELP (11.7).

NOTE: THE ARO SECTION OF AIRS TYPES JUST "=" INSTEAD OF THE USUAL "REQUEST=" WHEN READY FOR INPUT.

NOTE: ALL TIMES MUST BE IN GMT, NOT LOCAL TIME.

NOTE: ENTRIES CAN ONLY BE MADE FOR DATES BETWEEN YESTERDAY AND 3 WEEKS IN THE FUTURE. 11.2 ENTERING AND EXITING ARO.

ENTERING ARO

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FLIGHTS CAN ONLY BE ENTERED OR CANCELLED BY THE ARO SECTION OF AIRS. TO ENTER THIS SECTION, TYPE 'ARO.' AS AN AIRS REQUEST. NOTE THAT THE '.' IS NECESSARY. THE ARO SECTION TYPES '=' WHENEVER IT IS READY FOR A REQUEST.

EXITING ARO

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- WHEN DONE ENTERING FLIGHTS, EXIT THE ARO PROGRAM BY TYPING EITHER:
 - QUIT EXITS THE AIRS PROGRAM. THE COMPUTER TYPES "." AND YOU THEN HAVE THE OPTION OF EITHER STARTING AIRS AGAIN (RUN AIRS) OR LOGGING OFF THE COMPUTER (K). (SEE CHAPTER 2)
 - AIRS EXITS THE ARO SECTION AND RETURNS TO THE REGULAR AIRS SECTION. THE COMPUTER TYPES 'REQUEST=' AND ANY AIRS REQUEST CAN BE TYPED.

11.3 PAPER TAPE OPERATION

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ARO DATA ENTRY MAY BE ACCOMPLISHED THROUGH PREPUNCHED PAPER TAPE. IN LOCAL TELETYPE MODE AN EIGHT HOLE (ASCII) PAPER TAPE MAY BE PREPARED CONTAINING ANY NUMBER OF ARO ENTRIES. THE FOLLOWING SECTIONS EXPLAIN HOW TO PREPARE THE TAPE (11.3.1), HOW TO USE THE TAPE (11.3.2), AND HOW TO TROUBLESHOOT IF THE PROGRAM IS INTERRUPTED (11.3.3). 11.3.1 PREPARING PAPER TAPE

WHAT TO PUNCH

RESERVATION AND CANCELLATION REQUESTS (11.4, 11.5) MAY BE PUNCHED.

EACH LINE SHOULD END WITH A CARRIAGE RETURN AND A LINE FEED INSTEAD OF JUST THE CARRIAGE RETURN.

THE LAST REQUEST (LINE) ON THE TAPE MUST BE ONE OF THE FOLLOWING:

KEY - RETURNS CONTROL BACK TO THE KEYBOARD AND THE PROGRAM REMAINS IN THE ARO SECTION, READY WITH AN "=" TO ACCEPT REQUESTS FROM THE KEYBOARD. IF YOU WISH TO ENTER ANOTHER TAPE YOU MAY PUT IT IN THE READER AND SIMPLY TYPE "TAPE" ON THE KEYBOARD.

QUIT - SAME EFFECT AS IN SECTION 11.2

AIRS - SAME EFFECT AS IN SECTION 11.2

NOTE: DO NOT PUNCH MORE ENTRIES AFTER THE QUIT, AIRS, OR KEY ON THE SAME TAPE.

HOW TO PUNCH

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TAPES ARE PUNCHED WITH THE TELETYPE IN LOCAL MODE (NOT ATTACHED TO THE COMPUTER).

EACH REQUEST MUST BE TERMINATED BY A CARRIAGE RETURN AND A LINE FEED.

IF YOU MAKE A TYPING ERROR, YOU MAY DELETE THE ENTIRE CURRENT LINE BY TYPING †U (CONTROL U - HOLD DOWN THE CONTROL KEY AND TYPE 'U'). THIS WILL NOT SHOW ON YOUR TELETYPE PAPER, BUT WILL MAKE THE COMPUTER IGNORE THE CURRENT LINE. NOW CONTINUE AND RETYPE THE REQUEST.

IMPORTANT NOTE!! THE RUBOUT KEY HAS NO EFFECT WHEN PREPARING TAPES. IT DOES NOT ERASE THE PREVIOUS CHARACTER(S). 11.3.2 USING PAPER TAPE

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DIAL THE COMPUTER, RUN AIRS, AND ENTER THE ARO PROGRAM AS USUAL. YOU ARE NOW IN THE KEYBOARD MODE.

TO READ FROM TAPE, PUT THE TAPE IN THE READER AND WHEN AIRS SAYS '=', TYPE 'TAPE'.

REQUESTS WILL BE AUTOMATICALLY READ FROM THE TAPE INSTEAD OF THE KEYBOARD.

WHEN READING FROM PAPER TAPE, THE PROGRAM DOES NOT ALLOW INTERACTION. THAT IS, IT DOES NOT ASK YOU ANY QUESTIONS, BUT SIMPLY REJECTS ANY REQUEST IT IS NOT SURE ABOUT, GIVING AN APPROPRIATE ERROR MESSAGE.

DUPLICATION CHECKING ('VERIFY')

When you start a tape, AIRS will ask whether you want to "VERIFY".

If you answer "N" or "NO", AIRS will not check for duplicate reservations (see 11.4).

If you answer "Y" or "YES", AIRS will ask how many entries to verify.

If you answer "O" or carriage return, all entries on the tape will be checked.

If you answer a number, that number of reservations will be checked, then checking will stop.

Duplication checking is time-consuming, so you will usually not use it except as described in the next section under "BACKING UP TAPE".

11.3.3 TROUBLESHOOTING

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IF THE TAPE IS NOT READ TO COMPLETION BUT YOU ARE STILL ATTACHED TO THE COMPUTER (E.G. IF YOU TYPE TWO CONTROL C'S OR THE TAPE IS PHYSICALLY STOPPED), YOU WILL FIND THAT NOTHING YOU TYPE APPEARS ON THE TELETYPE. TO FIX THIS, DO THE FOLLOWING:

TYPE $\uparrow C \uparrow C$ (HOLD DOWN CONTROL KEY AND TYPE 'C' TWICE).

TYPE AS (HOLD DOWN CONTROL KEY AND TYPE 'S').

TYPE 'TTY ECHO' FOLLOWED BY A CARRIAGE RETURN. (NOTE - THIS WILL NOT PRINT, BUT AFTER YOU TYPE IT, THINGS SHOULD BE BACK TO NORMAL).

YOU CAN NOW RUN AIRS AGAIN IF DESIRED.

BACKING UP TAPE

If tape processing is interrupted (as above, or due to a computer crash), you should back up the tape part way before telling AIRS to process it. This is because the computer reads ahead, and may have moved the tape beyond what it has processed. If you don't back up, entries may be lost. When you restart the tape, you may use the "VERIFY" option (see previous section) to avoid duplicate entries if the tape is backed up too far.

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If there are errors in the request, a message is typed and the request is rejected.

DUPLICATION CHECKING

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If the reservation was typed manually, or if the reservation was on paper tape and you said to "VERIFY" when you started the tape (see 11.3.2), AIRS will check for duplicate entries.

If the flight already exists (same flight ID, same origin and destination, same date and hour of departure), the computer types out the duplicate entry.

If the entry was on tape, AIRS will reject it.

If the entry was manual, AIRS asks:

ENTER FLIGHT ANYWAY? ('Y' OR 'N')

If you type 'Y' (YES), the flight will be entered. If you type 'N' (NO), the flight will not be entered.

Duplication checking is not done for entries on tape if you say not to 'VERIFY'.

11.5 CANCELLING FLIGHTS

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A FLIGHT CAN BE CANCELLED BY GIVING EITHER: ITS ID, ORIGIN AIRPORT, AND DEPARTURE TIME (CANCEL DEPARTURE REQUEST); OR ITS ID, DESTINATION AIRPORT, AND ARRIVAL TIME (CANCEL ARRIVAL REQUEST). ITS OTHER AIRPORT MAY ALSO BE GIVEN TO SPEED PROCESSING.

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CXD, CD - CANCEL DEPARTURE

EXAMPLE: CKD N122H LGA 171900 CD N122H LGA 171900 CD N122H LGA 171900 HPN

THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION MUST BE GIVEN:

1.FIRST WORD MUST BE 'CXD' OR 'CD' (CANCEL DEPARTURE)

2.SECOND WORD MUST BE FLIGHT ID, FROM 1 TO 7 LETTERS OR NUMBERS WITH NO EMBEDDED BLANKS.

3. THIRD WORD MUST BE AIRPORT OF ORIGIN.

4.FOURTH WORD MUST BE DATE AND TIME OF DEPARTURE. FIRST TWO DIGITS GIVE DATE (NO WAY TO SPECIFY MONTH), LAST FOUR GIVE TIME (MUST BE GMT). ONLY THE HOUR NEED BE GIVEN. E.G.IF THE FLIGHT DEPARTS ON THE 18TH AT 1925, ONLY 181900 NEED BE GIVEN. THE DATE NUMBER MAY RANGE FROM YESTERDAY UP THROUGH THREE WEEKS INTO THE FUTURE.

5.FIFTH WORD IS OPTIONAL IF INCLUDED, MUST BE DESTINATION AIRPORT. IF AIRS DOESN'T RECOGNIZE 2ND AIRPORT, IT IGNORES IT. INCLUDING 2ND AIRPORT SPEEDS PROCESSING, SINCE IT HELPS AIRS FIND THE FLIGHT TO CANCEL.

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CXA, CA - CANCEL ARRIVAL

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EXAMPLE: CXA N122H HPN 172100 CA N122H HPN 172100 CA N122H HPN 172100 LGA

THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION MUST BE GIVEN:

1.FIRST WORD MUST BE 'CXA' OR 'CA' (CANCEL ARRIVAL)

2.SECOND WORD MUST BE FLIGHT ID, FROM 1 TO 7 LETTERS OR NUMBERS WITH NO EMBEDDED BLANKS.

3. THIRD WORD MUST BE DESTINATION AIRPORT.

4.FOURTH WORD MUST BE DATE AND TIME OF ARRIVAL. FIRST TWO DIGITS GIVE DATE (NO WAY TO SPECIFY MONTH), LAST FOUR GIVE TIME (MUST BE GMT). ONLY THE HOUR NEED BE GIVEN. E.G. IF THE FLIGHT ARRIVES ON THE 18TH AT 1925, ONLY 18190C NEED BE GIVEN. THE DATE NUMBER MAY RANGE FROM TODAY UP THROUGH THREE WEEKS INTO THE FUTURE.

5.FIFTH WORD IS OPTIONAL

IF INCLUDED, MUST BE ORIGIN AIRPORT. IF AIRS DOESN'T RECOGNIZE 2ND AIRPORT, IT IGNORES IT. INCLUDING 2ND AIRPORT SPEEDS PROCESSING, SINCE IT HELPS AIRS FIND THE FLIGHT TO CANCEL.

NOTE: Airports must exactly match those entered for the flight, or it cannot be cancelled. For example, "ZZ" codes (see 11.4) should not be used in a cancellation unless they were used in the reservation. The "ZZ" codes are imaginary airports; they do not represent all airports in the corresponding center. If the flight cannot be found (same ID, same airport(s), same date and hour), the message "**FLIGHT NOT FILED" is typed.

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If the flight cannot be uniquely found, the matching entries are typed out.

If the cancellation was typed manually, AIRS asks you which one (if any) to cancel.

If the cancellation was on paper tape, AIRS does nothing.

11.6 RETRIEVING ARO-ENTERED FLIGHTS

AIRS does not distinguish in its data base between ARO-entered and Airline Guide flights. Thus there is no direct way to retrieve them separately. However, there is an indirect way to separate them, based on the fact that, in practice, ARO does not enter aircraft types. If they entered types, the method below would not work.

Method

All flights which come from the Airline Guide have real aircraft types.

Flights entered by ARO generally have the imaginary type "NONE", since ARO omits the type (see 11.4).

Thus the type "NONE" can be used to distinguish ARO-entered flights. See 3.7 for use of types in demand requests.

Examples:

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REQUEST=LGA NONE LGA Adving type NONE. I.e. ARO-entered LGA demand.

REQUEST=LGA -NONE Demand for LGA excluding those with type NONE. I.e. LGA demand excluding ARO-entered flights.

11.7 HELP

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THE REQUEST "HELP" WILL TYPE OUT SOME OF THE FORMAT INFORMATION IN THIS SECTION OF THE MANUAL.

12.AIRSMAIL

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12.1 COMMENTS

TO TYPE A COMMENT (WHEN AIRS TYPES 'REQUEST='): TYPE 'C', THEN A SPACE, THEN YOUR MESSAGE. TO CONTINUE ON ANOTHER LINE, TYPE A ';' JUST BEFORE THE CARRIAGE RETURN, THEN CONTINUE ON THE NEXT LINE. A SINGLE COMMENT MAY USE UP TO SEVEN LINES.

COMMENTS SHOULD BE USED TO TELL TSC ABOUT PROBLEMS WITH AIRS, GIVE SUGGESTIONS FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO AIRS, ASK QUESTIONS ABOUT AIRS, TELL US WHY YOU ARE MAKING YOUR REQUESTS (FOR TRAINING PURPOSES, FOR REAL PROBLEMS, FOR DEMONSTRATIONS, ETC.). LIBERAL USE OF COMMENTS IS ENCOURAGED SO THAT WE CAN BETTER MEET YOUR NEEDS.

12.2 MAIL

TO RECEIVE MESSAGES FROM TSC, TYPE 'MAIL' WHEN AIRS TYPES 'REQUEST='. MAIL WILL BE USED TO ANSWER YOUR COMMENTS, TELL YOU ABOUT NEW AIRS FEATURES, ETC. IF THERE IS MAIL, AIRS WILL TELL YOU SO WHEN YOU RUN IT.
